### Adjusting to a New Era at the Spotlight.

Not just a whingebut facing some hard facts!



Since the Spotlight re-opened just a couple of months ago, the commercial programme of mainly tribute bands seems to be doing really well, considering that the cost of living has shot up and food banks are overstretched. Most shows seem to be playing to nearly full houses, or at least to more than *half* full.

For local theatre and community groups, the picture isn't *quite* as rosy. Most groups' memberships have *declined* since the pandemic, while *costs* have increased substantially.

BArts and many of our member groups have been regular users of the Spotlight since it first opened in 1976, have used their box office for ticket sales and relied on being able to display their publicity in the main public areas, as well as in What's On.

- Now, many well-established practices have changed
- Venue hiring costs have increased
- The café bar is to be kept free from posters and those in the foyer are now mainly for professional events and much smaller than they used to be.
- Art exhibitions are no longer allowed, so a large chunk of BArts' annual programme has collapsed. There are no proper art galleries in the borough.
- The box office is open only Monday to Friday and closes at 2.00 pm.
- The café/ bar is open only when there is an event and offers just biscuits, crisps and occasional cakes.

- For anything more substantial, an *outside* caterer would have to be brought in.
- We have been advised that it is *impossible* for a *regular* catering provision by the Spotlight to make an adequate profit.

Since the Spotlight is meant to be for the *community* as well as commercial, the loss of facilities in the long term may have a serious detrimental effect on *all* of us.

The expression 'If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen' ie if you don't like the situation, go somewhere else, has occasionally been suggested by people who don't really understand the problems.

- There *is* nowhere *else* with the same capacity and facilities.
- If the Spotlight *isn't* used, then the events won't go into What's On and ticket sales will be down.
- Lack of proper theatre facilities in a more modest hall—lighting, sound etc— will affect the quality of the performance. Audiences much prefer somewhere with a proper bar.
- Most school halls just aren't good enough these days.
- If technical elements are *imported* to an ordinary hall, the cost is prohibitive.

BArts' 'brief' from the borough has always been to provide a programme of events that they **couldn't**, or wouldn't **want** to provide. **ie** music *beyond* tribute bands, art exhibitions, plays, lectures, cream teas, back stage tours...

If we are no longer able to do this, who will?

If voluntary arts groups *aren't* able to survive, the whole community will be the poorer.



Can you imagine the uproar, if *sport* were to be similarly affected?

#### **Lowewood Museum Trust Has Completed Its First Year!**

One part-time *paid* member of staff, *nine* Trustees, around *fifty* volunteers, a substantial number of Friends of Lowewood and several successful bids for funding. It looks as though everything is heading in the right direction and there are some exciting plans and

projects for the *second* year, with the emphasis on community involvement. Lowewood Museum celebrates its 40th birthday in July, with a garden party, some special activities and entertainment.

The museum gift shop and cafeteria have exceeded expectations in terms of visitors and sales.

There's a good range of teas and coffees available, plus chocolate, biscuits and cakes. On Saturdays, when there is a special event, cream teas are served and proving very popular.









### Broxbourne Summer Festival?!

No Arts Centre, No Art Galleries, No independent theatre, No classical music (except for Hoddesdon Music Club). Shouldn't we be trying to *remedy* the situation instead of just grumbling? Our area seems to be better at *retrograde* steps, rather than positive *improvements*! Unity is strength! We managed to rescue the borough museum. What *more* could we achieve with some concentrated, co-ordinated effort?

In the latter decades of the C20, there was a **Broxbourne 'Midsummer' Festival**, organised by a local entrepreneur, Richard Lorimer, who, sadly. has just died aged 92. I took over from him in 2000 and, with BArts, continued the festival until 2005.

Amazingly, there were as many as 49 different events that came under the Festival 'umbrella' and included opera, an orchestral concert, several instrumental / vocal events, jazz, a talent competition, open-air Shakespeare, art exhibitions, events for children, street entertainment etc. The major stumbling block wasn't getting the events together, but the problem of adequate publicity—large posters on key sites, a festival atmosphere in the town centres etc, due to restrictions on posters, bunting etc.

**The subject of festivals has recently cropped up** again during several different meetings I've attended. Why *couldn't* we have a **Broxbourne Festival in Summer 2023**? It could actually be a little *easier* to put together than it has been in the past.

Rather than having to devise and afford lots of *special* events, if local organisations simply 'pooled' their usual / normal / chosen summer events and activities, say during June and July, just think what an impact that could have as a 'festival'.

**Involvement,** *ideally, could* / *should* **include**: BArts and our member groups, the Borough, the Spotlight, Lowewood Museum, Love Hoddesdon (just look at what they've achieved with collective responsibility), street markets, shops, pubs and restaurants, local performers and artists, local church / school fetes, flower festivals, garden parties, events in local parks, important cricket / tennis matches, cream teas......



So... what do we need to do to make it happen?

- Agree in principle
- Designate June / July
- Sign up to participate
- Notify your usual / special activities during the period, together with your publicity
- Attend a few meetings, via Zoom if necessary.

#### **Potential Benefits**

- Improved sense of 'community'
- Publicity and appreciation of your group
- New opportunities for co-operation, initiatives
- Increased income
