


negotiation with Herts County Council to install a mural in one of the Hoddesdon underpasses. The idea is to link the proposal with Tove




Open-air touring is one of the most gruelling forms of professional theatre and requires performers of dedication and resilience to sustain a whole season of 'one-nighters'. Getting wet frequently is one of the hazards; spending half your income on take-aways and booze before returning to your dismal lodgings is another, but *real* actors aren't in it for the 'glamour'. Spare a thought for the young assistant stage manager—ASM (otherwise known as 'dogsbody' / 'gofer') who is usually the *first* to arrive at the venue and the *last* to leave, besides being one of the *actors*!

You may not know that..Shakespeare was one of the shareholders in the *original* Lord Chamberlain's men, in the C16 and early C17, as well as being the writer / stage director / bit-part player. Theatre became increasingly *popular* during the Elizabethan period and there were several *rival* companies touring as well as *competing* for the very few London theatres, the first of which wasn't purpose-built until 1576 and just called the *Theatre*. Companies and plays had to be *licensed* and careful to avoid *contentious* subjects, as they could be shut-down overnight if they breached regulations. Shakespeare usually set plays in a *foreign* country if they had material relevant to contemporary England, so it was difficult for the authorities to claim the law had been broken. Outbreaks of plague could close the theatres, sometimes for more than a year! Women weren't allowed to appear on stage until after 1660, so all Shakespeare's actors were *male* and the female parts were played by young boys before their voices 'broke'. Actors had a very bad reputation, often described as 'rogues and vagabonds', accused of indecency and blamed for *all* the ills of society! The idea of *knighting* them, as we sometimes do now, would have been unthinkable!



The museum *re-opened* in July last year, after a vigorous campaign to save it from extinction, but the beautiful Georgian building's service as a museum dates back to 1982 and it was formerly Hoddesdon's Public Library, then a mini-Arts Centre, run by a voluntary group, before becoming a museum

for the Borough of Broxbourne.
