
Lowewood Museum

Around BArts' Groups

Although, in *theory*, the performing arts and entertainment venues are now permitted to resume their activities, the *practical* issues

are overwhelmingly complex. Social distancing may be just about possible, but the cost and operation of cleaning before and after each event is enough to put off most organisations. If you have managed to overcome the problems, we'd be interested to hear how you did it!



What the groups have been up to....

Sadly Hoddesdon Music Club has cancelled *all* the concerts for next term and I also the rearranged quiz on Oct 3rd.

Lea Valley Art Society is one group whose members can still participate in isolation.

Visit their website and spend an uplifting few minutes looking at the amazing paintings being produced.

Equally impressive is the **Hoddesdon Camera Club's** website gallery, but meetings are still suspended.

Although *most* of the up to date information appears on their social media sites, the theatre schools **Jason**, **Mayhem**, **Step 2 Step**, **Stoller** and **Vallé** have managed to offer some 'virtual' opportunities and experiences on—line.

One or two of BArts' performing arts groups have lively social media sites, too, with links to other groups, but their *main* websites have very little *positive* information to offer to the general public while so much uncertainty remains over all performances and venues.

Professional companies and performers are trying hard to remain positive and active, adapting their plans where possible, but if you saw the **First Night of the Proms** on TV last week, with socially distanced musicians and an empty auditorium, the bold endeavour was still rather *depressing* to watch—an unfortunate reminder of what has been *lost*.

Broxbourne, Cheshunt and Lea Valley Branches of the U3A



Although there are some branch variations, details of which may be checked via websites, the three local U3As have used Zoom to operate some main meetings with a speaker and some group activities. Speakers for the meetings have specially adapted their material and also made it available on-line for a short period after the meeting.



Several *outdoor* groups have resumed operations within government regulations. Groups

that had trips and theatre visits booked, however, have been struggling to get *refunds*, since some organisations are trying to find loopholes in the small print to justify their refusal. *Performance* events still can't be envisaged as *viable* within the current restrictions, so credit notes for an indefinite period are really not acceptable.

Each of the branches' Newsletters, which are available to read on their websites, continue to offer puzzles, quizzes, cartoons and irreverent verses as well as vital news. Additional Chairman's Bulletins or Zoom chats have proved useful in the Lea Valley U3A

With numerous AGMs looming, nominations and voting procedures have been adapted to allow postal / on-line versions and, in some cases, the *current* annual membership period has been extended to credit for the inactive months from March.

Lea Valley members *without* e-mail have been specially targeted by telephone calls, to check that they are not suffering in isolation and have all the practical support needed.

Several of BArts' groups have tried to find alternative venues to the Spotlight. For the U3As, this is easier said than done, since main meetings may attract as many as 200 of their members. Lea Valley made a tentative booking for a *live* meeting at the Hoddesdon Conservative Club in September, but with social distancing and restricted numbers still crucial, this has now been cancelled. If their *committee* attended, only 19 other ordinary members could! Tricky, with a membership of round 700.





Websites v Social Media

Maintaining websites seems to be a time-consuming, universal

problem, which has become even worse since the pandemic. So many groups now channel all their news via Facebook, Twitter or Instagram etc, which is great for the *members*, or *already* initiated, (*preaching to the converted!*) but it

doesn't necessarily work so well for someone *new* looking for easily accessible, up-to-date details about activities and events and people who *don't* subscribe to social media are *excluded*.



Some websites seem to BEFORE FACEBOOK have been abandoned,

as if *nothing at all* has been happening since March, when the social media sites clearly indicate otherwise. Perhaps some material could appear on the *main* website as well?

<u>Ed's Note</u> Doing on-line research recently, it's been really frustrating to find a website that offers very limited information before directing you to Facebook and more of a scattergun gossipy approach!




