Broxbourne Council was <u>Successful</u> in an application to the Arts **Council for the Government's Culture Recovery Fund.** The Spotlight was granted £133k and Lowewood Museum £50k!

This welcome news ties in very happily with plans for the Spotlight to re-open in April 2021 instead of October and with Lowewood Museum's newly formed Trust as a CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation) to be in operation by April next year.

All plans are, of course, dependent on the prevailing Covid regulations, which are *impossible* to predict, and it is not known whether a full programme will be on offer at the Spotlight, or to what extent social distancing may limit the type of event or capacity.

A workshop and a meeting to agree plans for Lowewood were held in the Broxbourne council chamber on October 8th. Five trustees have agreed to serve, including two council nominees, and a draft three-year budget and SLAService Level Agreement—are now in preparation.

The workshop included encouraging presentations by two successful independent museums, Havering and Ware, both of which are staffed mainly by volunteers, and some input from Gemma Papineau, Museum Development Officer for Hertfordshire and Jamie Everitt, Regional Museums Development Manager of SHARE Museums East. Their comments highlighted the professional advice and support that is available for local museum development and the meeting that followed the workshop discussed ways of developing a dynamic programme of on and offsite events and activities that will reach out to a wider audience base.

Creative use of Lowewood's rather limited space was also discussed and the need for theme-focused, *changing* displays rather than static, permanent exhibitions.

It is envisaged that the board of Trustees will eventually be expanded from the

initial five people to around twelve-ideally, people with a wide-range of skills.




"When the going gets tough, the tough get going."
