Have you noticed that, within a week of children breaking up from school, the shops are full of new school uniform for *September*? It seems that unless you can bask in the sun *somewhere*, or are busy with the harvest, the month of August may be merely a stepping stone into Autumn... However.....

The new BArts programme for September to January is in the process of being printed, with copies promised before the end of the month. Meanwhile, some of BArts' groups are working extra hard with the theatre schools keeping local children happily occupied with workshops and summer 'camps'.

Way back, thirty or so years ago, before the birth of BArts, it was East Herts Operatic Society who ran the *only* four-day children's musical theatre workshop for the borough... Fifty assorted children turned up at Cheshunt School on a Tuesday morning and, by Friday evening, were performing a mini-musical for their parents! It was *such* hard work for the team of teachers and leaders (at least *three* of whom now lead BArts) but very rewarding, too, and, in so many cases, the workshops lit a little spark of enthusiasm for theatre and performance in the youngsters that was to become their lifelong interest......At least *two* of those children became professional performers and now run their *own* local theatre schools!

Venues and Vision! ... Food for Thought

Since the establishment of 24/7 television, personal computers, the Internet and mobile phones, the number of theatre buildings in this country has steadily declined. Some have been demolished, some converted to other usage, only a few have been lovingly preserved or restored for continuing use—mostly in provincial towns with a strong sense of community.

Each county, or major borough, however, may have a more modern structure that serves as a multi-purpose venue for a modest programme of professional entertainment, films and a few community events, but there tends to be a lot of 'dark' nights when the place is *closed*. A tight budget is usually blamed for this and limited resources do, clearly, play a major part, but there is a little more to it than that, for it involves the decision making of key staff with their own personal experience and taste and the rare quality of 'vision'... the ability to *imagine* potential and be willing and able to experiment and *deliver*.

The *atmosphere* of a place is difficult to pin down precisely, but. structure, equipment, facilities such as bar and restaurant, colour scheme, lighting, pictures and plants, a warm, welcoming main entrance, plus the *staff* etc, all contribute to the whole, as do the events that happen there. A place *without* atmosphere has limited appeal and may struggle to succeed.

If multi-purpose buildings can manage to be fully occupied most of the week, by providing what the community *needs*, then their chances of success are usually much greater. Regular activities and events such as Jazz / Folk Nights, Easel Art, Exhibitions, Fashion Shows, Flower Shows, Taster Classes, Quiz Nights, Sunday Brunch, Cabaret Evenings, Afternoon Tea with Music, Tea Dances, Picnics

etc—can all help to establish a sense of community. Facilities for local theatre groups to rehearse and perform, or photographers / film-makers to meet, could add an Arts *Centre* dimension to an under-used building. Co-operation with the local museum could allow larger-scale, special exhibitions for mutual benefit.

Looking at venues in Hertfordshire and adjacent areas, *maximising* the use of a building in imaginative and diverse ways seems to increase the chances of success and sustainability. Areas doubling as an art gallery is one obvious, winning idea, with few financial implications. At a venue with gardens, such as Hoddesdon's Spotlight, using the gardens for a Summer Craft Fair, Jousting, Archery/ Fencing Display, Folk Dancing, Nature Discovery, Teddy Bears' Picnic etc could all help to attract new customers without *huge* peripheral costs.
