The work of paralegals is to support mostly girls to secure their education without being forced into coerced early marriages, forced labor and sexual exploitation.</p> <p>A total of 232 girls and 60 boys benefited from the paralegal support services, and 6 additional girls and 2 boys during the medical camp intervening and legally addressing abuse cases. M	Ajabu Healthcare Services Diagnostics and Doctors' Plaza in partnership with AHF	<p>This is an upcoming program AHF partnership with Ajabu Healthcare Center for diagnostics, doctors' plaza, pharmacy, infusion center, and day surgery operating rooms. There is no diagnostic center in Homabay, thus a lack of evidence-based practice. Patients have to travel a 4-hour ride for diagnostics. The rooms have been divided, and a local public health license has been obtained. The project is pending national licenses, diagnostic machines and partnership. The diagnostic center will provide diagnosis, and healthcare center for the community and generate income for AHF</p>
