The Purpose in our Preaching

I Timothy 1:1 Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ by the commandment of God our Saviour, and Lord Jesus Christ, which is our hope; 2 Unto Timothy, my own son in the faith: Grace, mercy, and peace, from God our Father and Jesus Christ our Lord. 3 As I besought thee to abide still at Ephesus, when I went into Macedonia, that **thou mightest** charge some that they teach no other doctrine, 4 Neither give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith: so do.

There is right and wrong doctrine or teaching I Timothy 1:3
 As I besought thee to abide still at Ephesus, when I went into Macedonia, that thou mightest charge
 some that they teach no other doctrine,

- a. Put them in remembrance of these things I Timothy 4:6 If thou put the brethren in remembrance of these things, thou shalt be a good minister of Jesus Christ, nourished up in the words of faith and of good doctrine, whereunto thou hast attained.
 - i. In the last days there will be devilish teachings I Timothy 4:1 Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils;
 - ii. Forbid to marry I Timothy 4:3 Forbidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from meats, which God hath created to be received with thanksgiving of them which believe and know the truth.
 - iii. Forbidding certain foods I Timothy 4:3 Forbidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from

- **meats**, which God hath created to be received with thanksgiving of them which believe and know the truth.
- b. These things command and teach I Timothy 4:11 These things command and teach.
 - i. Living a godly life I Timothy 4:8 For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come.
 - ii. That He is the Savior of all men I Timothy 4:10 For therefore we both labour and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, specially of those that believe.
- c. Give in charge I Timothy 5:7 And these things give in charge, that they may be blameless.
 - i. Be concerned about doctrine I Timothy 4:16 Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee.

- ii. Treat others right in the church I Timothy 5:1 Rebuke not an elder, but intreat him as a father; and the younger men as brethren; 2
 The elder women as mothers; the younger as sisters, with all purity.
- d. Charge them I Timothy 6:17 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;
 - i. Not to be proud I Timothy 6:17 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;
 - ii. To do good I Timothy 6:18 That they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate;
- e. Some are preaching another gospel or false gospel

 Galatians 1:6 I marvel that ye are so soon removed from

him that called you into the grace of Christ **unto** another gospel: 7 Which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ. 8 But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other **GOSPE** unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed. 9 As we said before, so say I now again, If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed.

deceivers are entered into the world, who confess not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. This is a deceiver and an antichrist. 8

Look to yourselves, that we lose not those things which we have wrought, but that we receive a full reward.9

Whosoever transgresseth, and

abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son.

- Many waste time with useless questions and arguments
 I Timothy 1:4 Neither give heed to fables and endless
 genealogies, which minister questions, rather
 than godly edifying which is in faith: so do.
 - a. Characteristics of these time wasters
 - i. They don't even understand what they say I Timothy 1:7 Desiring to be teachers of the law; understanding neither what they say, nor whereof they affirm.
 - ii. Proud know nothings with corrupt minds that are destitute of the truth I Timothy 6:4 He is proud, knowing nothing, but doting about questions and strifes of words, whereof cometh envy, strife, railings, evil surmisings,

- iii. Ever learning but never coming to the truth
 II Timothy 3:7 Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth.
- iv. Teach for money Titus 1:11 Whose mouths must be stopped, who subvert whole houses, teaching things which they ought not, for filthy lucre's sake.
- b. The Disciple's reaction
 - i. Withdraw yourself from them I Timothy 6:3 **If any**man teach otherwise, and consent not to

 wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus
 Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to
 godliness; 4 He is proud, knowing nothing, but doting
 about questions and strifes of words, whereof cometh
 envy, strife, railings, evil surmisings, 5 Perverse
 disputings of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the
 truth, supposing that gain is godliness: **from such**withdraw thyself.
 - ii. Rebuke sharply Titus 1:13-14 This witness is true.

 Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that

they may be sound in the faith; 14 Not giving heed to Jewish fables, and commandments of men, that turn from the truth.

- 3. The purpose or goal of Bible teaching and preaching is to build strong Christian leaders or disciples I Timothy 1:4

 Neither give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith: so do.
 - a. Every person should be perfect or mature in Christ Colossians 1:28 Whom we preach, warning every man, and teaching every man in all wisdom; that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus:
 - b. The goal is to be rooted, built up in him, established in faith Colossians 2:6 As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him: 7 Rooted and built up in him, and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with

thanksgiving. 8 Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ. 9 For in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily. 10 And **ye are complete in him,** which is the head of all principality and power: 11 In whom also ye are circumcised with the circumcision made without hands, in putting off the body of the sins of the flesh by the circumcision of Christ:

- c. Not be easily swayed or deceived Ephesians 4:14 That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive;
- d. Become mature enough to be involved in the work of God Ephesians 4:12 For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:
- e. Every part of the body working effectively Ephesians 4:16
 From whom the whole body **fitly joined**

together and compacted by that which **every**

joint supplieth, according to the

effectual working in the measure of **every** part, maketh increase of the body unto the **edifying** of itself in love.

- 1. Why the commandment? I Timothy 1:5 Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned:
 - a. God wants all men everywhere to know and serve Him I Timothy 2:4 Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth. 5 For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; 6 Who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time. Titus 2:11 For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, Hebrews 2:9 But we see Jesus, who was

made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honour; that he by the grace of God should **taste death for every**man. II Peter 3:9 The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, **not willing that any**should perish, but that all should come to

repentance.

b. God commands us to go to them Mark 16:15 And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. Matthew 28:18 And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. 19 Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: 20 Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen. John 20:21 Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto

you: as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you.

- c. Paul became all things to all men that by all means he might save some I Corinthians 9:22 To the weak became I as weak, that I might gain the weak: I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some.
- d. It should embarrass us that some do not know God I Corinthians 15:34 Awake to righteousness, and sin not; for some have not the knowledge of God: I speak this to your shame.
- 2. Love out of a pure heart I Timothy 1:5 Now the end of the commandment is charity **Out of a pure heart**, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned:
 - a. The world will know we are his because of our love one for another John 13:35 By this shall all men know that ye

are my disciples, if ye have **love one to** another.

- b. We are to have only one debt—to love Romans 13:8 Owe no man any thing, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law.
- c. No matter how much we know or what we do if we do not love it has no value I Corinthians 13:1 Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not **charity,** I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. 2 And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. 3 And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing.
- d. We are told to even love our enemies Matthew 5:44 But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them

- that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you;
- e. Loving people who do not know and love God doesn't hurt my relationship to God
- 3. Do right, be right just don't offend I Timothy 1:5 Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned:
 - a. Live your convictions and obey your conscience Romans 14:21 It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor any thing whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak.
 - b. Don't expect maturity from lost people Psalms 51:13
 Then will I teach transgressors thy ways; And sinners shall be converted unto thee.
 - c. Give them time to grow in grace Genesis 33:13 And he said unto him, My lord knoweth that the children are tender, and the flocks and herds with young are with me: and if men should overdrive them

one day, all the flock will die. 14 Let my lord, I pray thee, pass over before his servant: and I will lead on softly, according as the cattle that goeth before me and the children be able to endure, until I come unto my lord unto Seir.

- d. Remember they are hurting Psalms 142:4 I looked on my right hand, and beheld, But there was no man that would know me: Refuge failed me; No man cared for my soul.
- e. Do not have a Pharisee attitude Romans 2:1 Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things. 21 Thou therefore which teachest another, teachest thou not thyself? thou that preachest a man should not steal, dost thou steal? 22 Thou that sayest a man should

not commit adultery, dost thou commit adultery? thou that abhorrest idols, dost thou commit sacrilege? 23 Thou that makest thy boast of the law, through breaking the law dishonourest thou God?

- 4. Trust God to save and change them
 - a. It is God that does the work Philippians 1:6 Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ:
 - b. God is working in them Philippians 2:13 For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure.
 - c. God will take them on to maturity Romans 8:28 And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to *his* purpose. 29 For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be

conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren.

- d. God will perfect His people Psalms 138:8 The Lord will perfect that which concerneth
 - **me:** Thy mercy, O Lord, *endureth* for ever: Forsake not the works of thine own hands.
- e. He will do it I Thessalonians 5:24 Faithful *is* he that calleth you, **who also will do it.**
- f. Get the word in them and He will do His work in them through His word I Thessalonians 2:13 For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when ye received the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe.

Teachers of the Law

I Timothy 1:7 Desiring to be **teachers of the law;** understanding neither what they say, nor whereof they affirm.

8 But we know that **the law** *is* **good, if a man use it lawfully;** 9 Knowing this, that **the law is not made for a righteous man,** but for the lawless and disobedient, for the ungodly and for sinners, for unholy and profane, for murderers of fathers and murderers of mothers, for manslayers, 10 For whoremongers, for them that defile themselves with mankind, for menstealers, for liars, for perjured persons, and if there be any other thing that is contrary to sound doctrine;

1. What is the law?

- a. A rule laid down for the guidance of an intelligent being, by an intelligent being having power over him
- b. The commandments that God gave through Moses Exodus 24:12 And the Lord said unto Moses, Come up to me into the mount, and be there: and I will give thee

- tables of stone, and a law, and commandments which I have written; that thou mayest teach them.
- c. The Entire Old Testament
- d. The Books of Moses, the law, the Pentateuch- Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy Luke 24:44 And he said unto them, These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were **written in the** law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the
 - i. Moral Law, 10 commandments

psalms, concerning me.

- ii. Ceremonial Law, sacrifices, etc.
- iii. Civil or Political Law, eye for an eye
- 2. Who was the law made for?
 - a. Not for the righteous Romans 6:14 For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace. 15 What then? shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but

- under grace? God forbid. Galatians 5:18 But if ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law.
- b. For the not righteous or unrighteous Galatians 3:10 For as many as are of the works of the law are under the curse: for it is written, Cursed is every one that continueth not in all things which are written in the book of the law to do them. 11 But that no man is justified by the law in the sight of **God**, it is evident: for, The just shall live by faith. 12 And the law is not of faith: but, The man that doeth them shall live in them. 13 Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us: for it is written, Cursed is every one that hangeth on a tree: 14 That the blessing of Abraham might come on the Gentiles through Jesus Christ; that we might receive the promise of

the Spirit through faith.

- 3. Correct use of the law I Timothy 1:8 But we know that the law is good, if a man use it lawfully;
 - a. To make us see how sinful we are Romans 5:20 Moreover the law entered, that the offence might abound. But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound:
 - b. To tell me what is sin Romans 7:7 What shall we say then? Is the law sin? God forbid. Nay, I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet.
 - c. Our schoolmaster to bring us to Christ Galatians 3:24

 Wherefore the law was our **schoolmaster** to bring

 us unto Christ, that we might be justified by faith.

- 4. Mistakes that are often made by Christians with the law
 - a. We become rule keepers or flesh walkers rather Spirit led and guided Romans 7:6 But now we are delivered from the law, that being dead wherein we were held; that we should **serve in newness of spirit, and** not *in* the oldness of the letter.
 - b. They feel that God will love them more if they obey rules and regulations, that He will love them less if they do not obey the rules Romans 5:20 Moreover the law entered, that the offence might abound. But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound: 21 That as sin hath reigned unto death, even so might grace reign through righteousness unto eternal life by Jesus Christ our Lord. 6:1 What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? 2 God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?

- c. We use the law to measure ourselves and compare ourselves with others II Corinthians 10:12 For we dare not make ourselves of the number, or **COMPARE ourselves** with some that **COMMENT themselves:** but they **measuring themselves by themselves**, and **comparing themselves among themselves**, are not wise.
- d. Become judgmental and critical of other Christians based on their rule list Romans 14:4 Who art thou that judgest another man's servant? to his own master he standeth or falleth. Yea, he shall be holden up: for God is able to make him stand.

Message to a young missionary leaving for the field

- 1. It is God who has given you this ministry I Timothy 1:11
 According to the glorious gospel of the blessed God, which
 was committed to my trust. 12 And I thank
 Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that
 he counted me faithful, putting me
 into the ministry;
 - a. He is trusting you with His glorious gospel
 - i. So be careful to not hinder what He would do
 - ii. Be careful to carry the message
 - iii. Learn the language and well
 - iv. Learn the culture because you have been trusted with something great and awesome
 - Remember that you will be able to do the work because
 He has enabled you

- He has watched your life and service and has counted you faithful
- d. He is the one that has put you in the ministry, not the church, not the pastor
- e. You serve at His pleasure and for His purposes, never forget that
- 2. You can go confidently because you know that saving souls is His purpose I Timothy 1:15 This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief.
 - a. He wants all men to be saved I Timothy 2:3 For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour; 4

 Who will have **all men to be saved**, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth. 5 For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; 6 Who gave himself a **ransom for all**, to be testified in due time.

- b. That is why He made Paul a preacher I Timothy 2:7
 Whereunto I am ordained a preacher, and an apostle, (I speak the truth in Christ, and lie not;) a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and verity.
- 3. Hold on to your faith and your good conscience
 - I Timothy 1:19 Holding faith, and a good

conscience; which some having put away concerning faith have made shipwreck:

- a. There will be books to read, people to talk to, and every opportunity to doubt the truth
- b. There will be long, lonely nights when temptation will come but you must do right
- c. Discouragement makes us think we have a right to do things we should never have done
- d. Temptation will be in your face so stay strong
- e. Continue working on your marriage
- 4. Be an example of all that the Lord teaches us to do

 I Timothy 4:12 Let no man despise thy youth; but be

thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity.

- a. The new believers will not know how to act except from what they see in you
- They will not know how a Christian lives out his life except from your example
- c. Show great love
- d. Be above reproach
- heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save

5. Watch your own spiritual life I Timothy 4:16 Take

thyself, and them that hear thee.

- a. Easy to think you have arrived and then crash
- Easy to not care for your spiritual life because you will be so busy doing other things
- c. You will be busier than deputation
- d. The language will make you want to cuss
- e. Be careful to not allow your doctrine to twist or be damaged because you see life like it really is instead of

- 6. Don't get involved with men too quickly I Timothy 5:22 Lay hands suddenly on no man, neither be partaker of other men's sins: keep thyself pure.
 - a. Everyone is going to want to be your friend. They want your money and your influence
 - b. You will want the ministry to get off the ground so quickly that you will not be as careful as you should be
 - c. Remember, the buck stops with you now
- 7. Be happy with whatever the Lord gives you I Timothy 6:6
 But **godliness with contentment** is great
 gain. 7 For we brought nothing into this world, and it is
 certain we can carry nothing out. 8 And having food and
 raiment let us **be therewith content.** 9 But they
 that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into
 many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in
 destruction and perdition. 10 For the **love of money**is the root of all evil: which while some **coveted**

after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. 11 But thou, O man of God, **flee these things;** and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness.

- a. Don't be upset if you can't get the car you want
- b. Don't whine and complain in your prayer letters
- c. Don't want so much
- d. Learn to live and give
- e. Be happy with how God is blessing you and using you

8. Last words

- a. Love your wife. She is the most important person on this planet
 - i. Spend time with her
 - ii. Be patient with her
 - iii. Be overly expressive of your love
 - iv. Make her comfortable
 - v. Don't let her let you off the hook
- b. Be careful with your daughter
 - i. Love her
 - ii. Watch her

- iii. Train her, she is your most important disciple
- iv. Let her know what a family is by watching you
- v. Let her know how a woman should be treated by seeing how you treat her mom
- c. Wife love your husband
 - i. Be careful to love him and respect him all the time
 - ii. He will be more discouraged than he thinks
 - iii. Believe in him and remind him of that
 - iv. Don't be a weight and bother but a blessing and help
 - v. Learn the language no matter what it takes
 - vi. Accept the people

I Timothy 1:11-14 According to the glorious gospel of the blessed God, which was **committed to my trust.** 12 And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he **counted me faithful**, putting me into the ministry; 13 Who was before a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious: but I obtained mercy, because I did *it* ignorantly in unbelief. 14 And the grace of our Lord was exceeding abundant with faith and love which is in Christ Jesus.

- 1. Our privilege—the gospel has been committed to our trust
 - a. It is a glorious gospel because God is glorified when an undeserving person gets forgiveness and mercy.
 Ephesians 2:7 That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus. Ephesians 1:6
 To the praise of the glory of his grace, wherein he hath made us accepted in the beloved.

Ephesians 1:12 That we should be to the praise of his glory, who first trusted in Christ.

- b. The angels only get to desire to look into this service

 I Peter 1:12 Unto whom it was revealed, that not unto
 themselves, but unto us they did minister the things,
 which are now reported unto you by them that have
 preached the gospel unto you with the Holy Ghost sent
 down from heaven; which things the angels
 desire to look into.
- c. He chose to allow us to be His instruments and used of Him I Thessalonians 2:4 But as we were allowed of God to be put in trust with the gospel, even so we speak; not as pleasing men, but God, which trieth our hearts.
- d. He allows us to participate in changing lives, giving hope, freeing people, caring or feeling for people, etc.
- 2. His power—He enables his workers or gives them the ability and power to do His work

- a. Counted us faithful
- b. Put us in the ministry I Corinthians 15:10 But by the grace of God I am what I am: and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I laboured more abundantly than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me.
- c. Gave us the ability to do His work II Corinthians 12:9 And he said unto me, **My grace is sufficient** for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the **power of Christ may rest upon me.**10 Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's
- 3. In spite of your past—what you were before you met Christ
 - a. Religious, moral, good man ignorantly disobeying God

sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong.

I Timothy 2:9-10

- 1. It is more important to work on beautifying your inner person than your outer man I Peter 3:3-5

 - ii.Not bold or forward; as a modest maid. The word may be thus used without reference to chastity.

- iii.Not loose; not lewd.
- iv.Moderate; not excessive or extreme; not extravagant; as a modest request; modest joy; a modest computation.
- b.With shamefacedness—bashfulness, blushing due to viewing sin as repulsive
- c. With sobriety—seriousness, sound mind, self control
- 4. Men are commanded not to look at a woman and think improper thoughts Matthew 5:22-28
 - a.David fell into sin due to looking and thinking thoughts about Bathsheba
 - b.The prostitute knew how to dress so that men would know who she was and to get the attention of men

The [world's] attitude is if you've got it, flaunt it," she said.

"Leave as little to the imagination as possible. Regenerate

Christian women, I don't believe, leave home with this

attitude. We seek to live godly, holy lives."

Nevertheless, immodest dress is a problem in local churches on Sunday mornings, Mohler said. Women may not have a worldly attitude about modesty, but because of naivete, carelessness, busy lifestyles or cultural pressures, some women unknowingly dress immodestly, she said.

She told how she once visited a church that had a dress code.

"I applaud them that they have the boldness to have a dress code," she said. "It's for members only. But if a strong conservative church like that has a dress code, what does that tell you? It tells you that there are problems even in that setting where people are coming dressed inappropriately to worship."

To make her point Mohler gave several fictitious examples of Christian women dressing immodestly. For example, "Clueless Clarice" simply pulls something out of the closet before going out, not taking the time to examine herself in the mirror. "Disorganized Delores" has three children and says she doesn't have the time to consider what she wears.

"Stylish Stephie" only wears what's fashionable. "Frugal Frances" only wears what's cheap. "Dieting Diane" has one size of everything and often wears clothes that are too small -- simply to reward herself for shedding a few pounds.

"I call these cases accidental immodesty," Mohler said. "It's not deliberate, but the result is the same and what it looks like to the world is, 'These Christian women dress just like we do.'"

Citing Job 31:1 -- where Job makes a covenant with his eyes not to look at a virgin -- Mohler said Christian women should help their male counterparts maintain pure thoughts.

"We must remember what battles men face to stay pure as they are stimulated visually by women," she said. "... They should never have it flaunted in their faces, and to have it done at church is an abomination."

The biblical command to dress modestly, Mohler said, is first found in Genesis 3, where God makes "garments of skin" for Adam and Eve. She pointed out that God found their first attempt at clothing -- fig leaves sewn together --

unacceptable.

"Their remedy was not good enough," she said. "They were not clothed. They were [simply] covered."

Both the apostles Paul and Peter address modesty issues in the New Testament, Mohler said.

Immodesty, Mohler noted, has always been a problem.

"It's a timeless problem," she said. "In biblical times there were problems with how women dressed."

She asserted that, taken together, the passages in 1 Timothy and 1 Peter do not prohibit the wearing of jewelry or the braiding of hair.

"It says their adornments should not merely be external," she said. "So those who force that interpretation have to also say that it says you can't put on dresses either."

Both passages, Mohler said, should be studied by Christian

women.

"Perhaps we need to commit these two definitions [of modesty] to memory and maybe cut them out and ... take them to the dressing room with us to realize [that], 'Yes, there are biblical directives, there are biblical standards, and here's where they are,'" she said.

She gave other examples, including Romans 12:2 ("... do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed ...") and 1 Timothy 4:12 ("... show yourself an example of those who believe ...").

Mohler suggested that women sort through their closet and "throw away some things that really do not pass the test. Does God care how we dress? You bet he does. He cares about every aspect of our life, and we are called to holiness."

Mohler admitted that there are seeker-sensitive issues involved in the issue. In the past, she said, people may have looked down on someone not dressed in traditional Sunday morning attire. But what "started as a well-intentioned move to counter"

that" has gone awry.

"[N]ow the flood gates are open and anything goes. It's going to be very hard for us to recover and to take steps to go back [in the other direction]."

Mohler gave a list of items that her daughter will never be allowed to wear: halter tops, tube tops, skin-tight shirts, low-cut shirts, midriff-exposing shirts, miniskirts, short shorts and anything from Abercrombie and Fitch.

"Do I sound like an authoritarian parent?" she asked. "I hope so. Because I am a parent, and as parents we are given a lot of different jobs, and it's challenging. We are to love our children and shepherd them and nurture them. But we're also to teach them ... because they're still children. They need direction."

Many teenage girls, Mohler said, are allowed to dress immodestly because their parents are trying "to be their daughter's friend instead of being her parent." They try to rationalize how they dress by saying, "She's a good kid. She

doesn't smoke or drink. She's going to use her own money for this."

"We all want our kids to love us," Mohler said. "I want my kids to think I am the greatest mom in the world. But at what cost? We've got to teach them from the early days that they have to stand for something or they're going to fall for everything."

Mohler said when she lectures on modesty, she often receives words of encouragement.

"Whenever I speak on this," she said, "mothers of sons will come and they will say, 'Please continue to proclaim this message wherever you can. What else can we do? We don't have daughters ... but we have sons that are looking at how [other parents'] daughters dress.

"... Men really struggle with this, and it is our job as mothers of daughters to make sure that we don't make the job any harder for them."

This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work. I Timothy 3:1.

It is not natural to want to be a missionary. The thought may cross many people's minds but the truth is that it is only a fleeting thought quickly and easily dismissed by most. It is God who has worked in us both to will (or to put a desire in us that is not natural to us) and do his good pleasure. God placed something in our heart that we could not get away from.

For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure. Philippians 2:13

Many of us were afraid. Many of us doubted but He did something in us. Don't you dare doubt that when the trouble comes. Don't you doubt in the night what God gave you in the light. This desire was so great we couldn't get it out of our

hearts and minds.

Did God place a "necessity" on you? Did you feel the "woe"?

For though I preach the gospel, I have nothing to glory of: for necessity is laid upon me; yea, woe is unto me, if I preach not the gospel! I Corinthians 9:16.

I don't know what happens, but it seems that one day we are happy in our lives and churches and then something just happens. It may have started with a message from our pastor or a Sunday School lesson. It could have started in a missions conference or reading a book. It may have been something that someone said but it happened. It doesn't happen to most folks but it did to you. All of a sudden you felt like you couldn't get away. It may have started as only a passing thought. It was kind of romantic. It was neat to think about but it didn't go away. Almost everyone has thought about being a missionary, but they get over it. You didn't because you are different. You are called of God.

Did your "heart stir you up"?

And Moses called Bezaleel and Aholiab, and every wise hearted man, in whose heart the LORD had put wisdom, even every one whose heart stirred him up to come unto the work to do it: Exodus 36:2.

No one can explain it. It is different with everyone, but something happened. You knew it then and even in the worst of times you will need to remember it. When it gets tough and the Devil is on your back you are going to need to remember this. You didn't choose it. He chose you. He put the unnatural but spiritual desire in your heart. He put a "necessity on you." He put the "woe on you." He "stirred up your heart." Don't let anyone or anything rob you of that. Don't let yourself, a "friend", or the Devil try to explain it away. It is the most precious gift we have in our personal ministry and walk with God. He called me!

You wouldn't be here today unless God had impressed on others that you have been called of God. You had to prove your call. You had to let others see it and they did.

Now you will travel all around the country while literally thousands more evaluate—your call. You will have to believe it or you can't keep telling people over and over. God called me. God called me. Don't you forget it when it gets rough. Never make a major decision during times of discouragement and problems.

I do not want to embarrass my God, my Calling, my Church, my Mission Board. I will stay. I will not allow myself to think of other things. I will not try to rationalize it. I will not try to figure a way out of it. I will get a hold of God.

He sent me He has to help me stay. For 30 years now He has not failed me and He won't fail you. He has a job for you to do and He will give you more grace and help if you will just allow Him to do so

- My part is to do all I know to do based on what the Word of God says until God makes it clear to me all the other details
- God chose to call us. God has allowed us to preach the Gospel. God has entrusted His Word to us. He shed His blood and has entrusted His Holy Word to us.
- Let God Do It Colossians 1:29 Whereunto I also labour, striving according to his working, which worketh in me mightily. I Corinthians 15:10 But by the grace of God I am what I am: and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I laboured more abundantly than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me.
- He Called, He Will Philippians 1:6 Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ:

Remember that a qualification to be a missionary is to pastor your own home well I Timothy 3:1 This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work. 2 A bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach; 3 Not given to wine, no striker, not greedy of filthy lucre; but patient, not a brawler, not covetous; 4 One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; 5 (For if a man know not how to rule his own house, how shall he take care of the church of God?) 6 Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. 7 Moreover he must have a good report of them which

- are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil.
- a. Husband of one wife I Timothy 3:2 A bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach;
- Ruling well his own house Timothy 3:4 One that
 ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity;
- c. Children in subjection with all gravity Timothy 3:4 One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity;
- d. If you can't rule well your own house how will you take care of the church of God Timothy 3:5 (For if a man know not how to rule his own house, how shall he take care of the church of God?)
- 2. You are to treat your wife like Christ treats the church Ephesians 5:25 Husbands, love your wives, even as

Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; 26 That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, 27 That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish. 28 So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies.  with the washing of water by the word,
- c. He is patient with us
 - He loves us in our mistakes
 - ii. He has more grace than we have failures
- d. He will so purify us as to not be embarrassed by us Ephesians 5:27 That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish.
 - i. We should never embarrass our wife in public
 - ii. We should help our wife to have victory
- e. Loving your wife is like loving your own body

 Ephesians 5:28 So ought men to love their wives as
 their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth

himself. 29 For no man ever yet hated his own flesh; but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church:

- Treat her like you want to be treated
- ii. Provide for all of her needs and many of her wants
- iii. Treat her like a queen
- f. We should treat our wives in such a way that every woman would dream of having a husband that loved and adored his wife as much as the pastor or missionary does
 - i. Express your love publicly
 - ii. Express your love privately
 - iii. Make sure that she knows that you know she is around
 - iv. Never compare your wife to another woman
- g. Remember that your wife is unable to share her fears with anyone else without embarrassing you. So let her cry on your shoulder. Be her hero. Let her know that you can, with God's help, defeat Satan and all that challenges her.

- i. Talk to her. Explain what is going on.
- ii. Give her an emergency plan if something were to happen
- iii. Let her know that you have her in all of your plans and that she is your priority
- 3. Help her with her fear
 - a. Listen to her
 - b. Teach her how to trust God
 - c. Teach her how to think Philippians 4:8 Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.
 - d. Take every step possible to help her see that you are providing for her

- 4. Buy her the best appliances that you can afford. Make her home her castle. Let her make choices at the house and feel good about where and how she lives.
 - a. Get a guard, security system, or whatever to make her feel more secure
 - b. Make sure that your wife knows that her insecurities are important to you
 - c. She has to feel like a good mother and home maker
- Do not ever make her do things so you will look good or will not have a bad testimony
 - Easy to fall into the trap of pleasing others and looking good
 - Easy to pressure family into something that will make them bitter
- 6. Don't magnify her sacrifice by making her live like a Spartan. You can be Rambo but do not expect your wife to be!

- a. I know that you do not want to be wasteful and you shouldn't
- b. Be careful to spend on her more than you
- c. Learn to consider the cost over time
- 7. Remember that your wife just likes to be held when she is sad or afraid. Your arms and love will do more for her than your words will do.
 - a. She needs to be able to cry and not be judged for it by you
 - b. She needs to know that you will love her even if she is not as spiritual as you
 - c. She needs to know that she is always accepted
- 8. Work at having date nights and get aways
 - a. You will hear that I didn't do this as I should have and you will be right
 - b. Can you learn from my mistakes or must you be as stupid as I have been

- c. No one will be with you in 37 years but your wife. She is more important than all your ministry
- d. Get her away for a few days every quarter or so and let her forget her problems and insecurities for a few days

- a. Every church you go in they are watching you and everything you do, you live in a glass house
- If you can't make your children mind then leave them at home. If you can't make your children mind, then

- doesn't that indicate you are not ready to be in Christian leadership? Your first disciples are your children and what's the point of going to the mission field to disciple other if you aren't able to disciple you own children.
- c. They determine your level of maturity and your leadership by how your children behave
- d. That is not really necessary if you will do what we are about to discuss
- 2. Real Child rearing starts with your personal relationship to God Genesis 18:17 And the Lord said, Shall I hide from Abraham that thing which I do; 18 Seeing that Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? 19 For I know him, that he will

command his children and his

household after him, and they shall

keep the way of the Lord, to do

justice and judgment; that the Lord may bring upon Abraham that which he hath spoken of him.

- a. God had an intimate relationship with Abraham
- b. He believed in Abraham and his ministry
- c. He fully expected Abraham to live out the example and then command his family to do the same
- d. God knew that Abraham's children would do the right thing
- 3. Second after your personal relationship with God is your marriage and the relationship the two of you have
 - a. Your child will be secure if they know you are going to stay together
 - You believe in and trust each other and your children will know that
 - c. They are your children together and that will be obvious
- 4. Realize your children are a gift from God and you are responsible to Him for how you raise them Psalm 127:3 Lo,

- c. Eli had spoken to his kids but didn't take drastic enough of stand, discipline I Samuel 2:22 Now Eli was very old, and heard all that his sons did unto all Israel; and how they lay with the women that assembled

at the door of the tabernacle of the congregation. 23 And

he said unto them, why do
ye such things? for I hear of your
evil dealings by all this people. 24
Nay, my sons; for it is no
good report that I hear:
ye make the Lord's
people to transgress. 25 If

one man sin against another, the judge shall judge him:
but if a man sin against the Lord, who
shall intreat for him? Notwithstanding
they hearkened not unto
the voice of their father,

because the Lord would slay them.

d. The lack of discipline showed that he loved his children more than God I Samuel 2:29 Wherefore kick ye at my sacrifice and at mine offering, which I have commanded in my habitation; and honourest thy sons

above me, to make yourselves fat with the chiefest of all the offerings of Israel my people?

- e. Some thoughts to consider from this story
 - Honor God more than you do your children
 - ii. Guide them to Christ
 - iii. Instruct them
 - iv. Restrain them
 - v. Make them respect the house of God
- 20. Teach them to have a good attitude
 - They should do what they are told, when they are told,
 with the right heart attitude
 - b. They are not allowed to show a tantrum or rebellion

- c. They are to learn to smile and speak respectfully

 - ant, thou sluggard; Consider her ways, and be wise: 7
 - Which having no guide, overseer, or ruler,
 - 8 Provideth her meat in the summer, And

gathereth her food in the harvest. 9 How long wilt thou sleep, O sluggard? When wilt thou arise out of thy sleep? 10 Yet a little sleep, a little slumber, A little folding of the hands to sleep: 11 So **shall thy** poverty come as one that travelleth, And thy want as an armed man.  - a. Be careful about all the screen time you are using to do your job of parenting
 - b. Teach them to take care of themselves

light by his father or his mother. And all the people shall say, Amen.

- 34. Treat and dress boys and girls like what they are
- 35. Teach them to be content with who they are
 - a. They do not have to be constantly trying to prove themselves
 - b. It is ok to be me
 - c. Example of rabbit, duck, squirrel, and eagle and how they were to live out what God made them to be
 - d. Once upon a time, the animals decided they should do something meaningful to meet the problems of the new world. So they organized a school. They adopted an

- activity curriculum of running, climbing, swimming and flying. To make it easier to administer the curriculum, all the animals took all the subjects.
- e. The Duck was excellent in swimming; in fact, better than his instructor. But he made only passing grades in flying, and was very poor in running. Since he was slow in running, he had to drop swimming and stay after school to practice running. This caused his web feet to be badly worn, so that he was only average in swimming. But average was quite acceptable, so nobody worried about that except the Duck.
- f. The Rabbit started at the top of his class in running, but developed a nervous twitch in his leg muscles because of so much make-up work in swimming.
- g. The Squirrel was excellent in climbing, but he encountered constant frustration in flying class because his teacher made him start from the ground up instead of from the treetop down. He developed "charlie horses" from overexertion, and so only got a C in climbing and a D in running.
- h. The Eagle was a problem child and was severely disciplined for being a non-conformist. In climbing

- classes he beat all the others to the top of the tree, but insisted on using his own way to get there...
- i. The obvious moral of the story is a simple one each creature has its own set of capabilities in which it will naturally excel unless it is expected or forced to fill a mold that it doesn't fit. When that happens, frustration, discouragement, and even guilt bring overall mediocrity or complete defeat. A duck is a duck and only a duck. It is built to swim, not to run or fly and certainly not to climb. A squirrel is a squirrel and only that. To move it out of its forte, climbing and then expect it to swim or fly will drive a squirrel nuts. Eagles are beautiful creatures in the air but not in a foot race. The rabbit will win every time unless, of course, the eagle gets hungry.
- j. What is true of creatures in the forest is true of Christians in the family; both the family of believers and the family under your roof. God has not made us all the same. He never intended to. It was He who planned and designed the differences, unique capabilities, and variations in the Body. So concerned was He that we realize this, He spelled it out several times in His final will and testament (see 1 Corinthians 12)...

- k. God has placed you in His family and given you a certain mixture that makes you unique. No mixture is insignificant! That mix pleases Him completely. Nobody else is exactly like you. That should bring you pleasure, too. When you operate in the realm of capabilities, you will excel, the whole Body will benefit, and you will experience incredible satisfaction.
- I. When others operate in their realm, balance, unity and health automatically occur in the Body. But when you compare...or force...or entertain expectations that are beyond your or others' God-given capabilities, mediocrity or frustration or phoniness or total defeat is predictable.
- m. If God made you a duck, you're a duck, my friend. Swim like mad, but don't get bent out of shape because you wobble when you run or flap instead of fly. Furthermore, if you're an eagle, stop expecting squirrels to soar, or rabbits to build the same kind of nests you do...
- n. ...When you try to, or force someone else to be something you're not, it only leads to exhaustion and frustration. The worst part of all, what little bit of originality or creativity you have will be consumed in that false role you are forcing.

- o. Why not just be yourself? Why try to be like anybody else?
- p. It's OK to be you.
- q. It's OK to let your family members be who they are, even if their outlook or style may be miles different from yours. Rabbits don't fly, Eagles don't swim, Ducks look funny trying to climb, and Squirrels don't have feathers.
- r. Stop comparing. Enjoy being you! There's plenty of room in the Forest.

 - i. As a deacon deals with tough issues he will need to have the power of the Holy Spirit

- v. Do people that deal with the potential deacon feel genuinely loved and treated well when they interact with him
- d. - iii. Does he consider the ideas of others or is he so committed to his own ideas that he will not pay attention Philippians 2:3 Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves.
- 3. He is to be a servant Acts 6:3 Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy

Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business.

- a. They were taking care of the widows, serving the tables
- b. Our goal must be that we are here to serve Mark 10:45
 For even the Son of man came not to be
 ministered unto, but to minister, and to
 give his life a ransom for many.
- c. We are to humble ourselves Philippians 2:3 Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves. 4 Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others. 5 Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: 6 Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: 7 But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: 8 And

being found in fashion as a man, he humbled

himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

d. Are you ready for the menial tasks and duties that get little glory and very little applause

- 1. Ministries our deacons should and can be involved in
 - a. Call on people who are in the hospital.
 - b. Visit new people in the church.
 - c. Meet the needs of hurting people or those going through trials.
 - d. Arrange help for the widows.
 - e. Regularly call on members, reviewing their spiritual condition, devotion and tithing habits.
 - f. Entertain people in the home.

- If you are considering being a deacon you should make sure that you are displaying the servanthood characteristics of a deacon
 - a. Is this man serving others rather than himself?
 - b. Is he helping those in need?

- c. Is he calling on those that need encouragement?
- d. Is he encouraging the leadership?
- e. Is he willing to do the most menial tasks in the church?
- f. Are you looking for power or prestige
- g. Do you realize the amount of work a good deacon should be doing
- h. Where are you already serving
- i. How is your personal daily walk with the Lord Jesus
- How are you leading your family
- k. Is your wife on board and serving just like you and as you intend to serve
- Do you tithe and give to the ministry of Vision
- m. Can you explain Vision's Biblical position on all major issues
- n. How is your marriage, thought life
- o. Can you see how God has prepared you spiritually to serve as a deacon?
- p. Is your pastor enthusiastic about you serving? Remember, this is a team activity. If you have issues with the pastor, it may not be the wisest choice to serve.

- q. Since your wife will be highly involved in hospitality and counseling, is she in complete agreement with you serving as a deacon?
- r. Have other godly men suggested you serve as a deacon?
- s. Have you been through foundations and are you currently involved in foundations with someone
- 3. Do you understand the definition of a church: A local church is an organized body of believers that have been born again by the Spirit through the blood of Jesus Christ, immersed upon confession of faith, and who have banded together to follow Christ, observe the ordinances, fulfill the great commission through evangelism and discipleship.
 - a. Our main purposes are:
 - i. To evangelize the world in our generation
 - ii. Doctrine- the systematic teaching of God's word.
 - iii. Fellowship- interaction between believers.
 - iv. Breaking bread- the Lord 's Supper.
 - v. Prayer- dependence on God.
 - b. God gave the church both pastors and deacons
 - c. As deacons you will lead by:

- vi. Deacons are the caretakers of the membership. The body of believers in the membership would be divided among the deacons. Each deacon would be responsible to care for his membership group.
- d. How can deacons care for our members
 - i. Meet with our people
 - ii. Find out how they are doing in their spiritual lives
 - iii. Get them involved in discipleship
 - iv. Help them have family devotions
 - v. Help them get involved in ministries of the church
- e. Meeting ideas
 - Listen to them
 - ii. Let the person know you believe God has something to say about it.

- 1. Gives you time to think about it and pray.
- 2. Gives you time to consult with the pastor.
- 3. Allows another time to get back with them, building the relationship.
- iii. Things to remember when dealing with problems
 - 1. Recognize reality- most people with problems are not facing the truth.
 - 2. Realize the resources- God has multiple ways to help you.
 - 3. React responsibly- Don't panic. Determine to do the right thing.
- iv. Always give them a portion of scripture to memorize.

 Remember, the Bible promises success to those who hide God's Word in their heart. You cannot beat it.
- v. Realize the power of prayer. I believe that if you and the person counseled will regularly ask for God's help specifically, God will answer that prayer.

- b. Women
 - i. pornography
 - ii. Kindness from a woman can be taken wrong. The woman doesn't even know she is enticing you.
 - iii. Appreciation. When men serve, women respond with appreciation. Sometimes the appreciation at home is taken for granted and not expressed, and this new appreciation can lead to wrong conclusions.
 - iv. This kindness or appreciation leads to infatuation.

 Infatuation is imagining something that is not there. It is letting your mind wander into lustful thinking. The truth is never found in infatuation. This will consume your mind. Beware of the lies of infatuation.
 - v. enjoy the wife of your youth. Make plans to court your wife. This should be part of your life purpose.

vi. Think biblically. Remember, you cannot do better than God's Word says. Follow it carefully.

Because Jesus hates the doctrine of the Nicolaitans
 Revelation 2:6 But this thou hast, that thou hatest the deeds of the Nicolaitans, which I also hate.

 Revelation 2:15 So hast thou also them that hold the doctrine of the Nicolaitans, which thing I hate.

- a. Along with many other bad doctrines and behaviors the Nicolaitans were people who wanted rank and privilege among God's people
- b. The word means to conquer the people
- It seems that they may have been a group that lorded it over the church and stole their liberty in Christ
- d. This is similar to Diotrephes III John 9 I wrote unto the church: but **Diotrephes**, who loveth to have the preeminence among them, receiveth us not. 10 Wherefore, if I come, I will remember his deeds which he doeth, prating against us with malicious words: and not content therewith, neither doth he himself receive the brethren, and forbiddeth them that would, and casteth them out of the church. 11 Beloved, follow not that which is evil, but that which is good. He that doeth good is of God: but he that doeth evil hath not seen God.
- e. The Nicolaitans initiated a false division in the church, clergy and laity.

- f. The anointed and the non anointed
- g. Yet all of God's people are kings and priests I Peter 2:9
 But ye are a **chosen generation**, a **royal priesthood**, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light:

Revelation 1:6 And hath made us **kings and priests** unto God and his Father; to him *be* glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

h. We all have equal access Hebrews 10:19 Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus, 20 By a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, his flesh; 21 And having an high priest over the house of God; 22 Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our

1. A servant doing the biding of another Matthew 22:13
 Then said the king to the **Servants**, Bind him hand and foot, and take him away, and cast him into outer darkness; there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. John 2:5 His mother saith unto the **Servants**, Whatsoever he saith unto you, do it.
 John 2:9 When the ruler of the feast had tasted the water that was made wine, and knew not whence it was: (but the **Servants** which drew the water knew;) the governor of the feast called the bridegroom,

- a. The same word is not necessarily a spiritual word
- b. It is a servant doing a job for another
- 2. The secret to spiritual greatness Matthew 20:26 But it shall not be so among you: but whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister; Matthew 23:11 But he that is greatest among you shall be your Servant. Mark 9:35 And he sat down, and called the twelve, and saith unto them, If

any man desire to be first, the same shall be last of all, and **servant** of all. Mark 10:43 But so shall it not be among you: but whosoever will be great among you, shall be your **minister:**

- a. The same word for deacon is translated minister
- b. Minister means servant
- c. We are embarrassed to be considered a servant
- d. We may want a title but not a duty
- e. We may consider the honor but not the actual use of the word
- 3. Spiritual service to Jesus with promise, and intimacy implied John 12:26 If any man serve me, let him follow me; and where I am, there shall also my servant be: if any man serve me, him will my Father honour.
 - a. The word servant explains what a deacon is
 - b. There is the promise of being with Him and being honored
 - c. But we are but servants

- 4. Government officials are deacons Romans 13:4 For he is the **minister** of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to *execute* wrath upon him that doeth evil.

 - a. This word means not shamelessly greedy for money, not fond of dishonest gain

multitude: and they chose Stephen, a Man

full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Philip, and Prochorus, and

stewards of the manifold grace of God.

And let these also first be proved; then let them use the office of a deacon, being found blameless. Even so must their wives be grave,

not slanderers, sober, faithful in all things. 12 Let the deacons be the husbands of one wife, ruling their children and their own houses well. 13 For they that have used the office of a deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree, and great boldness in the faith which is in Christ Jesus.

- b. Deacons are to be proven I Timothy 3:10 And let these also **first be proved**; then let them use the office of a deacon, being found blameless.
- c. Deacons are to use the office well I Timothy 3:13 For they that have used the office of a deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree, and great boldness in the faith which is in Christ Jesus.
- d. God rewards deacons I Timothy 3:13 For they that have used the office of a deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree, and great boldness in the faith which is in Christ Jesus.

 Jesus Christ Acts 6:3 Wherefore, brethren, look ye out
 among you seven men of **honest report**, **full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom**, whom we
 may appoint over this business.
 - b. He is an example in how he leads his family, gets them to the truth, leads them in obeying God, has a faithful family just like him I Timothy 3:11 Even so must their
 Wives be grave, not slanderers, sober, faithful in all things. 12 Let the deacons be the husbands of one wife,

ruling their children and their own houses well.

- c. He is an example in his fervor for the Lord, that means hating sin, loving God, loving the Bible Colossians 3:23 And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men; 24 Knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance: for ye serve the Lord Christ.
- 2. The godly deacon is an encouragement to the faithful Acts 6:5 And the saying pleased the whole multitude: and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Philip, and Prochorus, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolas a proselyte of Antioch:
 - a. Encouraging the pastor Acts 6:2 Then the twelve called the multitude of the disciples *unto them*, and said, **It is** not reason that we should leave the

word of God, and serve tables. Acts 6:4
But we will give ourselves continually
to prayer, and to the ministry of the
word.

- b. Encouraging those in the pew Acts 6:1 And in those days, when the number of the disciples was multiplied, there arose a murmuring of the Grecians against the Hebrews, because their widows were neglected in the daily ministration.
- c. Encouraging other preachers, missionaries, pastors
 III John 5 Beloved, thou doest faithfully
 whatsoever thou doest to the
 brethren, and to strangers; 6 which have
 borne witness of thy charity before the
 church: whom if thou bring forward on their
 journey after a godly sort, thou shalt do

well: 7 because that **for his name's sake** they

went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles. 8 We therefore ought to receive such, that we might be fellowhelpers to the truth.

- 3. The godly deacon is an equipper of the fold Acts 6:7 And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem greatly; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith.
 - a. He helps **provide** the **tools** needed for the work Acts 6:3 Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may **appoint over this business.**
 - b. He helps prepare others for teaching Acts 6:4 But We will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word.
 - c. He **permits** the **transitions** needed in ministry Acts 6:8

 And **Stephen**, full of faith and power, **did great**wonders and miracles among the people. Acts 8:5 Then

Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them. 6 And the people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Philip spake, hearing and seeing the miracles which he did.

- 4. The godly deacon is an evangelist of the faith
 I Timothy 3:13 For they that have used the office of a
 deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree, and
 great boldness in the faith which is in
 Christ Jesus.
 - a. He invites the lost to church services II Timothy 1:8 Be not thou therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, nor of me his prisoner: but be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God;

- b. He invokes the Lord of heaven to save Matthew 9:38
 Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest.
- c. He instructs the lost I Timothy 3:9 Holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience.
- 5. The godly deacon **edifies** the **family** of God

Ephesians 4:16 From whom the whole body fitly

joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love.

a. He shows grace not rulership Ephesians 4:29 Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of

- edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers.
- b. He sows the seeds of growth I Thessalonians 5:11
 Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify
 one another, even as also ye do. Hebrews 10:24
 And let us consider one another to provoke unto
 love and to good works: 25 Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching.
- c. He seeks godliness I Timothy 6:3 If any man teach otherwise, and consent not to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to godliness;

c. We deceive ourselves when we think that we produced our own wealth Deuteronomy 8:17 And thou say in thine heart, My power and the might of mine hand hath gotten me this wealth. 18 But thou

shalt remember the Lord thy God: for it is

he that giveth thee power to get wealth, that he

may establish his covenant which he sware unto thy fathers, as *it is* this day.

d. The real question is one of responsibility about how we treat God's possessions and what we do with them. Since we are not owners we have no rights. Someone tell the story of the talents.

- 3. As deacons and pastoral staff we must recognize that we are examples of the truth
 - a. An example in our giving and service
 - b. We cannot be covetous
 - God not only owns our resources but our time as well C. so we need to live with the idea of completing His will for our lives Hebrews 12:1 Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set **before us,** Ephesians 5:15 See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, 16 Redeeming the time, because the days are evil.
 - d. Are you responsible before God for how you use your time? Are you using your time like God wants you to use it?

e. Are you managing your money according to Scriptural principles? Are you worshiping God with your time and money?

Ordination or the Laying on of Hands

 - b. We have shared advice and encouragement with him this afternoon

Content One

- The opposite of contentment is covetousness
- Covetousness clenches things in a selfish grip.
- Living without covetousness means living without the love of other things over Jesus
- Covetousness has its root in discontent, i.e. seeking our happiness, peace, and well being in the details of life (money, position, power, possessions).
- Man's life is not how much he has Luke 12:15 And he said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth.

- In his heart he says I must have my way: I'll have that woman or that man if I have to break up their marriage to get them. I'll have that position if I have to kill someone to get it. I'll have my pleasure and my drink, my money, my home, my job, my good times in life and my way, no matter what the consequences!
- Covetousness then, blinds the soul into believing a lie: that
 he has the right to do with himself as he pleases; and he
 says to God, "Don't You get in my way!"
- Covetousness is idolatry Colossians 3:5 Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry:
- Covetousness is an unhealthy desire to have more than one possesses.
- Covetousness is a discontent with what we have and an intense desire for something else, something we believe will make us happy or satisfied.

- Things and the cares of this world will choke out the Word of God in our lives Matthew 13:22 He also that received seed among the thorns is he that heareth the word; and the care of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, choke the word, and he becometh unfruitful.
- Covetousness is the root sin that leads to sexual sin as well as many others
- Not being satisfied with what you have in a partner, money, possessions, even ministry is covetousness
- Covetousness is the mother of all sins
- 1. The first question you must ask to become content is: IS Jesus enough? Matthew 6:24 No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon. ²⁵ Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? ³¹ Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we

be clothed? 32 (For after **all these things** do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have **need of all these things.** 33 But **seek ye first** the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and **all these things** shall be added unto you.

- a. We have to choose what we seek in life

Instructions to the American Church

I Timothy 6:17 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy; 18 That they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate; 19 Laying up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life.

- Defining the words "rich in this world" Matthew 19:23 Then said Jesus unto his disciples, Verily I say unto you, That a rich man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven.
 - a. IF There Were Only 100 People in the World 6 people would possess... 59% of the entire World's wealth and all 6 would be from the United States
 - If you have food in the refrigerator, clothes on your back,
 a roof overhead and a place to sleep...you are richer than
 75% of this world.

- c. If you have money in the bank, in your wallet, and spare change in a dish someplace...you are among the top 8% of the world's wealthy.
- d. Nearly 50% of the world lives on less than \$2 a day

2. Attitude of Trust

- a. Having money and things only makes us rich in this world and is not proof of our spirituality or relationship to God example the rich man and Lazarus Luke 16
- b. Money shouldn't give us an attitude of pride Deuteronomy 8:17 And thou say in thine heart, My power and the might of mine hand hath gotten me this wealth.
- c. Our trust must be in God Proverbs 11:28 He that trusteth in his riches shall fall: But the righteous shall flourish as a branch. Jeremiah 9:23 Thus saith the Lord, Let not the wise man glory in his wisdom, Neither let the mighty man glory in his might, Let not the rich man glory in his riches: 24 But let him that glorieth glory in this, That he understandeth and knoweth me, That I am the Lord which exercise lovingkindness,

- judgment, and righteousness, in the earth: For in these *things* I delight, saith the Lord.
- d. He gives us all things to enjoy Matthew 6:32 (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. Ecclesiastes 5:18 Behold that which I have seen: it is good and comely for one to eat and to drink, and to enjoy the good of all his labour that he taketh under the sun all the days of his life, which God giveth him: for it is his portion. 19 Every man also to whom God hath given riches and wealth, and hath given him power to eat thereof, and to take his portion, and to rejoice in his labour; this is the gift of God.

3. Our Responsibility

a. Do good Galatians 6:10 As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Luke 6:33 And if ye do good to them which do good to you, what thank have ye? for sinners also do even the same. 35 But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again; and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the

children of the Highest: **for he is kind unto the unthankful and** *to* **the evil.** I Peter 3:8 Finally, *be ye*all of one mind, **having compassion** one of another, love
as brethren, *be* pitiful, *be* courteous: 9 Not rendering evil
for evil, or railing for railing: but contrariwise blessing;
knowing that ye are thereunto called, that ye should
inherit a blessing. 10 For he that will love life, and see
good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his
lips that they speak no guile: 11 Let him eschew evil, and
do good; **let him seek peace, and ensue it.**

b. Be rich in good works Titus 2:14. Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works.

c. Ready to distribute Romans 12:13 Distributing to the necessity of saints; given to hospitality. I John 3:17 But whose hath this world's good, and seeth his

brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?

d. Willing to communicate Philippians 4:14 Notwithstanding ye have well done, that ye did communicate with my affliction. 15 Now ye Philippians know also, that in the beginning of the gospel, when I departed from Macedonia, no church communicated with me as concerning giving and receiving, but ye only.

4. His promise

- a. Laying up rewards in Heaven Matthew 6:19 Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal:
 20 But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal:
 21 For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.
- b. Preparations for future days Psalms 41:1 Blessed *is* he that **considereth the poor:** The Lord will deliver him in time of trouble. Proverbs 19:17 He that hath **pity upon the poor** lendeth unto the Lord; And that which he hath given will he pay him again.

c. Shows your earnestness in serving God Philippians 3:14 I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

- 1. Keep what He committed to you!
 - a. The gospel has been committed to our trust I Timothy 1:11 According to the glorious gospel of the blessed God, which was committed to my trust.
 - b. We must keep the sound words II Timothy 1:13 Hold fast the form of sound words, which thou hast heard of me, in faith and love which is in Christ Jesus.
 - c. Study to show yourself approved II Timothy 2:15 Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

- d. Learn to use what you learn Titus 1:9 Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers.
- e. The world, the Word, the Holy Spirit, the Church, our time, treasure, talent, health, and heritage

2. Stay on target

- a. Avoid discussions and studies that do not lead to edification or the building up of one's faith I Timothy 1:4

 Neither give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith: so do. II Timothy 3:7 Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth.
- b. Avoid worldly philosophy or popular opinion Colossians 2:8 Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ.
- c. Don't get hung on your knowledge whether Biblical or Secular Romans 1:21 Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were

thankful; but became vain in their

imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened.

- 22 Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools,
- d. By staying away from money motivated ministries. Be careful about the "ME" ministries. I Timothy 6:4 He is proud, knowing nothing, but doting about questions and strifes of words, whereof cometh envy, strife, railings, evil surmisings, 5 Perverse disputings of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the truth, supposing that gain is godliness: from such withdraw thyself.

3. Fulfill our commitment

- a. Repeatedly we are told that he is sending us with his gospel John 20:21 Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto you: as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you.
- b. The ministry of reconciliation II Corinthians 5:18 And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of

reconciliation; 19 To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them; and hath committed unto us the word of reconciliation.

- c. Made us his ambassadors or spokesperson

 II Corinthians 5:20 Now then we are ambassadors for

 Christ, as though God did beseech *you* by us: we pray

 you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God.
- d. You have the keys to heaven and hell. What will you do with them?
