- 1. Why make a survey trip?
  - a. The Bible hints at the value of spying out the land in this passage
  - b. Two types of survey trips
    - Trip one to check out the land and see what is needed to live there
      - 1. It is my contention that your wife needs to know that her and the children will be taken care of
      - 2. There will be questions to follow but I suggest your first trip be made to help her see it
      - 3. Women need security and a nest and that is a good thing. This trip may help provide that

- ii. Trip two is to check out the land to see what the need for churches, language learning, and ministry are
  - 1. Develop your strategy of how to reach the country
  - This trip is best done after you have some experience in the language and ministry
  - 3. This study will be greatly based on your personal philosophy of ministry

## iii. Choose the right city!

- 1. It should be a strategic City, a crossroads of the region or the country
- 2. It should be a large city, people center
- 3. Paul developed his ministry around principal cities
- 4. People are moving into large cities and visiting them
- 5. Yes the smaller cities need to be reached but can be reached by training and sending nationals out.
- 6. It is far more intelligent to go to a central city and train men to go out. I can't be everywhere, all the time.

### iv. Choose the right part of the city

- 1. Middle Class people, this would be the aspiring class, usually upper lower class, lower middle class
- 2. First class church (do it right) reaching all the classes
- 3. Don't go to the poorest people or garbage dumps etc.
- c. Many missionaries fail not for a lack of ability or knowledge but for lack of a strategy.
  - They do not know what they are going to do.
  - ii. They have a good heart.
  - iii. They want to do right but since they do not what to do, how to do it, or what they are facing they go to the field and do not accomplish what they really wanted to accomplish.


x. How are the medical facilities and medical care?

. Questions and to dos while you are in country

- a. Extra ideas for now or later
  - i. You might want to consider getting international driving licenses to use until you get your in country license
  - ii. Check to make sure you have copies of all documents for visa application, shot records, etc
  - iii. How do you get access to money
    - 1. Is it best to change dollars
    - 2. Have bank account
    - 3. Use ATM
  - iv. Make sure you have a phone that is unlocked and can be used
  - v. Consider getting travel plugs and correct adapters
  - vi. Pack change of clothes in carry on in case of lost luggage
  - vii.Check your credit card to see how it handles foreign transaction fees
  - viii. Make copies of passport, leave one in states, and other in different location in case it is lost or stolen
- b. Things to avoid
  - i. Living in fear because it is different etc

- ii. Don't build any more barriers between you and the nationals than you have to, you are rich and foreign
- iii. Letting culture shock destroy you
- iv. Tourist mistakes that get you in trouble with pick pockets, thieves.
- c. Look at several houses, go with a real estate agent
  - i. Get prices
  - ii. Look for what you want
  - iii. You might remember that you will need to work on ministry location before getting too settled on housing
  - iv. Take pictures and drop pins on google maps to remember what you have learned
  - v. Are the houses secure, garage, good electricity, internet
  - vi. What are requirements to rent a house
  - vii.Get an idea about utility costs, yours will probably be much greater than a nationals
  - viii.Can I get ac and heat that I want
  - ix. Consider whether or not you want bed sheets etc from USA
- d. Go to the grocery stores and meat markets

- i. Find out what is available that you like
- ii. Find out prices
- iii. Find out best places to shop
- iv. Take pictures and keep notes about prices in dollars
- v. Find out what precautions need to be taken when buying, preparing, serving food
- e. Go to the hospital and pharmacy
  - i. Can you get good medical care
  - ii. Are the medicines you need available
  - iii. Where would you go if someone broke a bone etc
- f. Check out clothing stores
  - This helps determine what you need to take with you to the field
  - ii. Check prices
  - iii. Always take pictures and prices
- g. Check out the availability of cars, trucks, motorcycles or whatever you will want use
- h. Go to furniture store

- i. What kind of beds are available, beddingii. What kind of furnitureiii. What about refrigerators, stoves, TVs, etc
  - iv. Can you get dryer, hook ups for everything
  - v. What size refrigerators etc
- i. Find activities that the children will be able to do so that they will learn to love the country
  - i. Parks
  - ii. Pools
  - iii. Sports, etc
- j. See if there are restaurants your family will be able to enjoy
