

Statement of Educational Effectiveness

July 1, 2025

The mission of Christ Our Redeemer Seminary is to equip Christlike leaders for God's global mission by providing accredited graduate-level theological education that is holistic and rooted in the local church.

For our degree programs, CORS has established student learning outcomes (Program Learning Outcomes) along with means for assessment and criteria for success. These are assessed using both direct and indirect measures to demonstrate the extent to which these outcomes are achieved. The program evaluated is the Master of Divinity (M.Div.). An overall plan of assessment has been established in which the Academic Review Committee meets regularly to review student learning outcomes.

The direct and indirect measures include student course evaluations, assignment portfolios, grading and feedback systems, mentor quarterly reports, practicum supervisor evaluations, and comprehensive program assessments through our three-component model (Academic, Mentoring, and Practicum programs).

Based upon the results reviewed through our strategic planning process, the Academic Review Committee makes recommendations for each program learning outcome, which may include adjustments to course requirements, curriculum modifications, or changes to assessment procedures.

M.Div. Program Learning Outcomes

The M.Div. program is designed to equip students with five core competencies:

Walk with God
 Cultivate spiritual practices to nourish their life in Christ, resist cultural idolatries, and grow in Christlikeness as manifested in love for God, love for others, and the fruit of the Holy Spirit.

2. Study the Bible

Interpret Scripture in light of its unfolding story of God's mission that finds its center in the gospel of Jesus Christ. Exegete biblical books and passages in original languages using sound hermeneutical principles and tools to discern the Spirit's message for the Church today.

3. Serve the Church

Serve the Church, especially through the ministry of the Word (preaching and teaching), worship, prayer, evangelism, discipleship, pastoral care, leadership development, and missions to equip congregations for God's mission locally and globally.

4. Apply Contextualized Theology

Apply the theological riches of the historic Church and the Reformed evangelical tradition to meet the needs of the Church in one's missional context.

5. Partner for Mission

Learn from and partner with the broader body of Christ for the sake of his name among all nations.

Overall Program Statistics

• Total M.Div. graduates: 13 students

• Total B.Th. graduates: 2 students (discontinued)

Overall completion rate: 83% (15 graduates in the first four years from 18 enrolled students)

• Average time to completion: 3 years (as designed)

Program Assessment and Effectiveness

Academic Quality Measures

- Credit Hour Requirement: 95 credits (above ATS minimum of 72)
- Student-Faculty Ratio: Approximately 6:1 in cohort classes
- Graduation Rate: 83% overall completion rate
- Employment Rate: 100% of graduates placed in ministry or continuing education

Holistic Formation Assessment

CORS employs a three-component assessment model:

- 1. Academic Component (74 credits): Assessed through course assignments
- 2. Mentoring Component (12 credits): Assessed through mentor reports and personal development plans
- 3. Practicum Component (9 credits): Assessed through ministry supervisor evaluations and competency demonstrations

Continuous Improvement Process

The seminary conducts regular assessments through:

- Annual Strategic Planning Process: A comprehensive institutional evaluation and strategic planning process each summer
- Quarterly Course Evaluations: Student feedback on each course and instructor
- Faculty Review Meetings: Post-course analysis and improvement planning
- Alumni Feedback: Ongoing assessment of graduate preparedness and effectiveness

Financial Accessibility

CORS maintains a commitment to affordable theological education:

- Total M.Div. tuition: Under \$17,000 (35% of average evangelical seminary tuition)
- Payment plans: Available to all students
- Church partnership model: Reduces facility and administrative costs
- Adjunct faculty model: Maintains quality while controlling costs

Future Assessment Plans

CORS has developed a comprehensive M.Div. Program Assessment Plan with evaluation cycles:

- Fall 2025: Initial comprehensive program assessment
- Summer 2026: Post-graduation assessment of the first independent CORS cohort
- Summer 2030: First five-year comprehensive review
- Summer 2035: Five-year comprehensive review
- Summer 2040: Ten-year institutional effectiveness assessment

This systematic approach ensures continuous improvement in academic quality, spiritual formation, and ministry preparation as CORS pursues its mission to equip Christlike leaders for God's global mission.
