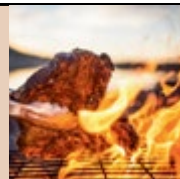

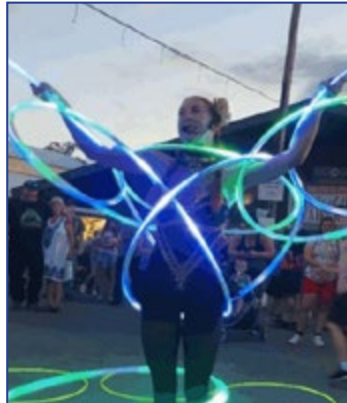

GENERAL RULES as applied to ALL Exhibitors, Participants, Vendors, Staff & Volunteers

Waterfowl will be accepted at the 2026 UCF as of the publishing date of this book; however, this decision is subject to change at any time at the discretion of the State Veterinarian, local veterinarian and/or UCF Directors

The Umatilla County Fair (UCF) is the County's major annual agricultural and industrial exposition and provides educational activities, healthy competition and recognition for the County's youth. The following rules and regulations apply to every exhibitor, vendor and anyone involved with the UCF. Department rules take precedence over General Rules if there may be a conflict.

DISEASE PREVENTION STATEMENT

MICROBES THAT MAY POSE AS A HEALTH RISK FOR INFANTS, YOUNG CHILDREN, SOME ELDERLY AND SOME IMMUNE COMPROMISED INDIVIDUALS CAN BE TRANSFERRED TO HUMANS THROUGH ANIMAL WASTE. UPON ENTERING AREAS WHERE ANIMAL WASTE IS, OR MAY BE PRESENT, PLEASE AVOID HAND TO MOUTH ACTIVITIES. PLEASE WASH HANDS WHEN LEAVING ANIMAL AREAS AND ALWAYS PRIOR TO CONSUMING FOOD.

1. The Fair Board reserves the right to interpret all Fair rules and regulations and to settle all disputes. Any person (exhibitor, concessionaire, etc.) who does not comply with the rules and regulations may be removed from the Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Fair Board.
2. The Fair Board tries to take reasonable precautions to protect articles on exhibit, but will not be responsible for loss or damage.
3. No roving vendors or solicitation whether acting for profit or non-profit, or on his/her own behalf, shall be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
4. Any fundraisers held on the fairgrounds during the fair are required to be pre-approved by the Fair Board.
5. No person who attends the UCF shall consume or have in his/her possession any controlled substance, or alcoholic beverage, unless the alcoholic beverage is obtained from a dually authorized concessionaire at the Fairgrounds and is consumed lawfully within approved areas.
6. **NO PETS ALLOWED.** Only certified service dogs will be allowed on the fairgrounds and must be on a leash at all times. If your certified service dog is recognized as a nuisance in any way, the UCF Board will notify you and your dog must be removed from the fairgrounds. The UCF Board of Directors also reserves the right to require the owner's removal for any mistreatment of a dog.
7. **USE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS AND SMOKING/VAPING OF ANY KIND IS PROHIBITED AT THE UCF.**
8. **EXHIBITS AND VENDORS:**
 - a) All 4-H exhibits must be removed between 8:00AM and 11:00AM on Sunday August 16th. Livestock must be removed from 7:00 AM- 10:00 AM.
 - b) All Open class exhibits must be removed by 12:00 NOON on Sunday August 16th. Livestock must be removed from 7:00 AM- 10:00 AM.
 - c) 4-H items left after 11:00AM and Open Class items left after 12:00 NOON on Sunday, will be disposed of. Exhibits shall NOT be removed from the Fair before Sunday.
 - d) **VENDORS** who tear-down BEFORE Sunday, without management approval, will automatically forfeit their deposit.
9. At the discretion of the Fair Board, items deemed offensive or dangerous will not be displayed or permitted on the grounds.
10. Each exhibitor will be responsible for entering their exhibits into the proper Department, Division and Class. Items or exhibits entered incorrectly will not be judged. Please refer to your section of the Exhibitor's Guide for details.
11. Every exhibit must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower.
12. The livestock superintendents have the authority to break down and/or combine department classifications in order to best facilitate the show as well as splitting classes for judging due to a large number of entries. When it comes to 4-H/FFA Showmanship classes being altered, superintendent should coordinate with 4-H administration and/or FFA Overall Advisor.
13. Premiums and ribbons are not awarded to all exhibits or entries.
14. No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the judge or judges during their adjudication. **EXHIBITORS ARE NOT ALLOWED IN EXHIBIT HALLS DURING JUDGING.** The judge's decision shall be final.
15. Each superintendent under the direction of UCF Directors and/or Management, shall have the full charge of their department w/ the exception of 4-H/FFA State Guidelines.
16. Camping will be permitted in designated camping areas only. Camping applications must be pre-approved via online submittal.
17. Failure to follow all rules listed in the Exhibitor's Guide may result in forfeiture of all premiums and/or disqualification.
18. During Fair week and through the official close of Fair, vehicles will only be allowed on the designated areas. Proper parking ticket or hang-tag must be displayed at all times. Vehicles parked or left in unauthorized areas, or who fail to display proper parking credentials will be towed at owner's expense. **There will be NO VEHICLE ACCESS allowed on the fairgrounds to pick up animals or equipment until Sunday, August 16th.**
19. **LIVESTOCK ENTRIES (Open class, 4-H & FFA)**

Inspecting Veterinarian – Hermiston Veterinary Clinic

 - a) All Open Class Livestock entries will be received while pen space is available. Pre-registration is required for all Open Class exhibitors by June 30th.
 - b) 4-H and FFA Exhibitors, please refer to the 4-H and FFA sections of this book for program specific rules.
 - c) Livestock exhibits will be released between 7:00AM and 10:00AM on Sunday, August 16th.
 - d) Registration Requirements: Purebred livestock must be accompanied by a certificate of registration, duly certified by the recognized registry of that particular breed or certified pedigree should be kept available in case the judge should call for them in the show ring.
 - e) **ALL ANIMALS** are subject to inspection by the attending veterinarian upon admission to the Fairgrounds. No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds when exhibiting evidence of infection or contagious disease or any unsightly condition such as warts, ringworm, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas, etc. Directors and/or Coordinator reserves the right to require health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or disease control measures or procedures which become necessary in emergencies, at the owner's expense. It will be the veterinarian's decision if there is any question about the health of the animal. Animals NOT passing health inspection by the veterinarian must be **IMMEDIATELY** removed from the grounds.
 - f) All non-market sheep and goats will be required to have a SCRAPIE tag and/or tattoo.
 - g) **OUT OF STATE** livestock or poultry must comply with Oregon interstate requirements as to official health certificates, permits, inoculations and tests. These documents are to be presented to the Fair veterinarians when required.
 - h) Exhibitors must, at all times, keep their stalls or pens and aisles in good, neat condition. Shavings or other suitable bedding will be provided for beef, swine, sheep and goats. If provided bedding is depleted, exhibitors will be required to provide their own Fair Board approved bedding.
 - i) Exhibitors must furnish feed and care for their own livestock. All pens and stalls must be cleaned by 8:00AM and kept clean until 8:00PM each day. All exhibitors

must conduct a final cleanup by 10:00AM on Sunday, August 16th. Pens and stalls must be cleaned of all bedding and the bedding hauled to the appropriate place as designated by the Fair. Premiums will be withheld if this rule is violated.

- j) Except while showing, all livestock will be confined to their pens or stalls, or at the wash rack or fitting areas. Animals are restricted to the barn areas only.
- k) Admission and parking passes will be available at the box office windows and will be required for entry & re-entry on opening day (Wed. of Fair). ADMITTANCE WILL NOT BE ALLOWED WITHOUT THE PROPER PASSES DURING FAIR.
- l) During Fair week and through the official close of Fair, vehicles will only be allowed in designated areas of the fairgrounds and must display a parking pass.
- m) 4-H and FFA Exhibitors are required to continue the care of their market animal through 9:00PM on Saturday night, despite the transfer of ownership that takes place at the time of the sale.
- n) **Breeding cattle, sheep, and goats will be allowed to be removed on Friday afternoon between 3:00PM & 5:00PM. A release form will be available in the livestock office and must be signed by the appropriate superintendent prior to removal. Animals released must be led off the premises for transportation.**

20. UCF ANIMAL WELFARE POLICY

The UCF is committed to upholding the welfare of animals as a primary consideration in all activities, as well as:

- a) Requiring that animals be treated with kindness, respect and compassion
- b) Ensuring that owners, trainers and exhibitors use responsible care in handling, transporting and exhibiting their animals.
- c) Providing for the continuous well-being of animals through proper feeding, disease prevention, sanitation and attention to their safety.
- d) Supporting scientific research to improve the health, safety and well-being of livestock.

21. UCF ANIMAL HEALTH PRODUCT USAGE POLICY

The UCF is committed to the production of safe, wholesale food products. Therefore, livestock will be disqualified if they show any evidence of the use of unapproved animal health products or the improper use of approved animal health products. UCF Directors and/or Management reserves the right to use appropriate tests to detect violations of this policy.

22. UCF UNMANAGEABLE ANIMAL POLICY

An unmanageable animal may be requested to leave the show. Exhibitors of questionable beef and dairy animals will be required to lead their animals to a prescribed distance. The department superintendent, Fair Board member and the respective 4-H staff or FFA advisor will make any control decisions. Any excused animal is disqualified from the show and sale.

23. CAMPGROUND (application deadline July 15th – available **ONLINE ONLY:** www.umatillacountyfair.com)

Camping logistics are subject to change as an attempt to improve each year. The UCF website will have the most up to date information.

- a) UCF Camping Applications are located on the fair website and are submitted and paid for electronically. The application is not a guarantee of acceptance. Preference is given to exhibitors that house their animals a distance greater than 20 miles from the fairgrounds.
- b) Due to limited space, some applicants may be denied. If a refund is due; Umatilla County will refund to the card charged or issue a refund check to the address on the application.
- c) Final approval of camping applications typically happens the last week of July when all requests have been received and available space has been determined.
- d) Exhibitors may not camp on the grounds unless accompanied by a parent or approved adult chaperone. All units must have an adult present and responsible for the occupants. All camp units are required to remain on the grounds until Sunday morning following fair.
- e) Unless otherwise notified by the Camping Director, Exhibitor Campers may not be placed on the grounds prior to Thursday, Aug. 6th unless prior permission has been granted through the Fair Office. Campers must move in on Aug. 6th & 7th, 2026. Questions may be addressed by emailing fair@umatillacounty.gov or by calling the Fair Office at 541-567-6121.
- f) **ALL CAMPERS, STAFF, VOLUNTEERS, EXHIBITORS AND PARENTS ARE REQUIRED TO SHOW FAIR ENTRY CREDENTIALS (TICKETS OR PASSES) AT ALL GATES WHEN ENTERING OR RE-ENTERING THE FAIRGROUNDS BEGINNING ON TUESDAY OF FAIR WEEK.**
- g) Complete rules are located on the UCF Camping Application.

24. 4-H/FFA RULES (4-H and FFA Set up Day at the fairgrounds is JULY 25TH, 2026)

- a) FFA Chapter Advisor, 4-H Club Volunteer, parent or an official designated chaperone must accompany all livestock exhibitors. Officially designated replacements must be listed in the 4-H and FFA offices. Members not so accompanied will not be allowed to show.
- b) All 4-H entries must be submitted to ShoWorks online by end of day **June 30TH, 2026**.
- c) FFA entries are due by **June 19TH, 2026** entered in ShoWorks. Please see your FFA Advisor to enter. FFA record books are to be handed in to the FFA office at final weigh-in during Fair. All entries must be documented as an official FFA Supervised Occupation Experience Project with an AET Record Book that verifies initiation and management of the entry 60 days prior to the Fair or by date specified in other Fair rules.
- d) No animals will be received or allowed on the grounds after weigh-in to allow proper check-in of animals.
- e) Any exhibitor violating UCF rules or guilty of undesirable conduct may be penalized by forfeiture of all premiums earned at the discretion of the Directors and/or Management.
- f) 4-H and FFA members must abide by the Memorandum of Understanding between the Oregon 4-H and Oregon FFA.
- g) Premium points will be determined by ribbon placing. Points will not be awarded to market classes. Premium point values will be determined after the Fair, based on total points awarded and money allocated for premiums by the Fair.
- h) Each livestock exhibitor is responsible for having their entry in the ring or designated exhibit area, when class is called or exhibit is judged. Entries not in proper place at time of judging will not be allowed to compete.
- i) Members exhibiting livestock are required to make a Showmanship entry for every species in which they have entered livestock. Members who exhibit livestock and small animals are required to show in a showmanship class for both areas.
- j) Market animals shall be used for Showmanship rather than breeding animals, except for rabbits and poultry. Animals shown for Showmanship must have shown in a conformation class in the exhibitor's name and be properly fitted.
- k) The grand champion showman in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Goat and Horse Showmanship divisions will compete for the Master Showmanship award. If a member wins grand champion in more than one division, the member must choose one division in which to participate. The reserve champion winner will represent the division relinquished by the grand champion winner. There must be at least 5 exhibitors in 3 classes of a division to have a master showmanship representative.
- l) The exhibitor must perform all care and fitting of animals. Involvement of adults must be limited to advising. Fitting and blocking is to be done in the designated fitting area only. Blocking and clipping stands are to be labeled with name of each member, chapter or club.
- m) To be eligible for livestock association special awards, exhibitors must meet the requirements as stated for the award.
- n) When classes are split, only one livestock association special award will be made. The judges must determine and indicate who is to receive the award.
- o) Neck ropes are required for all beef and dairy cattle.
- p) Animals entered in the Fair must be made available for use in the Meat Animal and Dairy Cattle Judging Contest, unless excused by the Superintendent.

- q) The use of talcum powder, oil or other artificial coating will not be allowed in fitting and showing animals in any of the swine classes. Artificial coloring or any artificial means of removing or correcting physical defects of conformation in exhibition animals such as lifting or fitting under skin is prohibited and will be considered as fraud or deception. All animals showing evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Fair. If any animal is found by the official Fair Veterinarian to have been tampered with as previously described, it shall be disqualified from competition. All prize money that has been won at the Fair by the exhibitor on any animal or animals so disqualified will be forfeited. The finding of the Fair Veterinarian as to whether or not any animal has been improperly tampered with shall be final and conclusive. Determining whether artificial coloring has been used will be at the discretion of the Superintendent and the judges. The Fair will not be responsible for the consequences, direct or indirect, of any animal or exhibitor being so disqualified or barred from showing.
- r) Beef, sheep, goats and dairy cattle must be kept in designated areas or in their stalls or pens prior to entering the ring to be judged.

25. OFFICIAL DRESS SHOULD BE WORN AT THE AWARDS PROGRAM

- a) Pictures are taken of award winners that are sent to donors and newspapers. Members should be seen in something other than street clothes.
- b) DRESS RIGHT - When you look your best, you do your best!

26. UMATILLA COUNTY FAIR YOUTH LIVESTOCK AUCTION Superintendent-Marie Linnell

- a) Animals entered in market classes must have Country of Origin Labeling (COOL) affidavit, and a health record signed by the exhibitor. Market animals will NOT be allowed across the scales at Fair without these documents in place.
- b) All livestock must be owned and in possession of the 4-H or FFA member by the dates listed on the table below. Rabbits and Poultry must be banded and tattooed by May 16, 2026 A mandatory pre-show tagging (weighing is optional) of market steers, hogs, lambs and goats is required. Each exhibitor will be allowed to tag a maximum of 2 animals per species. A visual tag will be used on all four species with an EID tag being used on steers only. All tags will be paid for by the UCF.
- c) Steers that are age and source verified that already are tagged with an EID tag will be required to attend the mandatory weigh-in to receive a visual tag. All exhibitors wishing to participate in the AIBAA/Steer of Merit Award must have weighed their steers on March 14, 2026.

- d) To be eligible for the auction, exhibitors MUST bring their livestock to one of the designated weigh-in locations (shown above) at the designated time to be officially tagged. All animals must be castrated by the possession date.
- e) If exhibitor suffers a loss of a market animal or if animal is deemed unusable by the assigned Fair Board livestock liaison, Youth Livestock Sale Superintendent, Umatilla County 4-H Faculty/Staff or Overall FFA Advisor, after pre-show weigh-in and wants to replace it, the exhibitor must notify the Umatilla County 4-H Extension Office (541- 278-5404) or their FFA advisor within 48 hours of the loss. Any replacement animals will require Fair Board approval. **No replacements within 30 days of fair.**
- f) Sale animals must meet the following **weight specifications** as they cross the scale at Fair: Steers - 1150 lb. minimum @ show, Swine - 240 to 300 lb. @ show, Lambs - 110 lb. minimum @ show, Goats - 70 to 100 lb. @ show, Fryer Rabbits - 4 to 5½ lb., not over 80 days of age; Roaster Rabbits 5½ to 7½ lb., 81-100 days of age; Fryer Poultry - 4 to 6 lb., under 8 weeks of age, Roaster Poultry - 6+ lb., 8 to 16 weeks of age; Turkeys - 20 lb. minimum, must be this year's hatch.
- g) Market hogs must not be shaved and must be shown with no less than ½" of hair.
- h) All animals, with the exception of steers, must be under 1 year of age at the time of sale. Market lambs exhibiting their yearling teeth, will not be allowed to sell.
- i) All animals are to arrive at the Fairgrounds on Monday, August 10. Scale hours will be 7 a.m. to 12 p.m. (noon) and 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The livestock gate and scales will be closed and no animals will be received from 12 noon to 5 p.m. All market animals will be weighed upon arrival, on a first come first serve basis. All animals must remain loaded until their turn at the scale. No animals will be weighed wet or wearing blankets. All animals must be cleaned prior to arrival. Dirty animals will not be weighed. Ear tags must be clean and readable. All lambs must be slickshorn prior to weigh-in. Any animal not meeting the weight requirements may be immediately reweighed ONE TIME after rebalancing the scale.
- j) Each exhibitor is eligible to sell one lot of market animals. If an exhibitor exhibits more than one species of market animal, only one species may be sold at the Youth Livestock Auction. The exhibitor must choose which species sells at the auction before 9:00AM Thursday of Fair week.
- k) Members must have a stall card for their market animal with ear tag number and current weight displayed.
- l) Any discount taken or premium paid by the resale packers will be passed on to the exhibitors.
- m) Each member must personally show their sale animal in the appropriate MARKET & SHOWMANSHIP classes, must participate in a LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST and sell in the SALE RING. In cases where requirements cannot be met due to scheduling conflicts between two Fair events (and not conflicts with non-Fair events), the exhibitor must receive pre-approval from the species superintendent, the livestock sale superintendent and a Fair Board member.
- n) Sale weight on Beef, Swine, Sheep and Goats will reflect a 3% shrink off of scale weight. All sale lots will be charged a **4% commission**.
- o) All exhibitors will care for their market animals through 9:00 PM Saturday night.
- p) Transfer of ownership takes place at the time of sale. If an animal for custom kill is condemned in the slaughter process, the final buyer will have the option of accepting the floor price of the animal. The 4-H or FFA seller will assume the loss.
- q) The UCF Youth Livestock Auction is a terminal sale. All livestock consigned to the sale must go to slaughter as directed by the Sale Committee. The Sale Committee will cooperate with buyer to arrange for the disposition of all livestock. Every effort will be made to make arrangements that are convenient for the buyer.

29. SALE ORDER:

- a) Species order: Lambs-Goats-Beef-Hogs. Rabbits and Poultry will be between other species.
- b) Classes will be grouped into three (3) categories based on weight: light, middle and heavy. The first-place blue ribbon animals from each class will return for the division championship for their respective weight category. The remaining first place blue animals and the second-place blue animal from the Champion's class will be considered for Reserve Champion. The judge will place all animals in the division drive.
- c) Selection of Grand and Reserve Grand Champions will be held Wednesday evening. The Grand Champion Drive will consist of the three (3) Division Champions. Once the Grand Champion has been selected the Reserve from that division will be considered for Reserve Grand Champion. After the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand are chosen, the judge will place in order the remaining division winners so that the entire Championship class is placed in order from top to bottom.
- d) The Grand Championship class sells first by the order previously mentioned in b (above). The remaining blue-ribbon animals will sell in class order determined by the Championship class. Once the rotation is established, it will be followed until all blue-ribbon animals are placed in order. Red and White ribbon animals will follow the same rotation.

30. THANK YOU NOTES TO BUYERS:

- a) 4-H and FFA youth participating in the Youth Livestock Auction will be required to write "Thank-You" notes to the buyer(s) of their animal as well as to any additional

supporters who “added on” to the sale of their animal. **Exhibitors must write the notes themselves unless they have a health condition that prevents their ability to do so.**

- b) A letter will be mailed to each exhibitor one week after fair, showing names and addresses of buyer(s), add-on supporters and a bump amount (if any). **PLEASE READ THE LETTER IN ITS ENTIRETY.** Many checks have been delayed from not reading the information contained in the letter because **some buyers or donors may add-on to your animal after the sale without your knowledge. So please wait until you receive our list of buyers.**
- c) Blank Thank you notes WILL NOT be available OR turned in at the sale.
- d) **Photos of addressed & stamped envelopes AND photos of the inside of the cards** can be sent to the fair by emailing ucflivestock@gmail.com with the subject “2026 Thank You Card for (exhibitor name)”. Pictures need to include each individual thank you note and names of addressees must be visible to ensure all buyers have been completed. Any unapproved notes will need to be resubmitted. Buyer gifts and/or Thank You notes given to buyers at the sale are permitted, but **exhibitors are STILL required** to submit thank you note photos. (Many times, the person at the auction is not the actual business owner and there are donations that you may be unaware of). **YOU WILL NOT RECEIVE YOUR PREMIUM CHECK IF THESE PHOTOS HAVE NOT BEEN RECEIVED.**
- e) The Fair Office will keep track of completed Thank You notes. **Thank You note photos MUST be received by Friday, Sept. 11th, 2026.**
- f) Checks will NOT be mailed to exhibitors until pictures of the Thank You notes have been received by the Fair Office.
- g) 4-H clubs and FFA chapters are highly encouraged to send a group “Thank You” (one card from group) to each businesses or individuals who contributed to the **BUMP program** (this is not the same as “add-on” buyers). A list of Bump supporters will be sent to the Pendleton 4-H Extension office and to the Overall FFA Advisor 1 week after fair. Leaders and Advisors are to request the list from them.

31. The UCF Livestock Auction fully supports the following: National Beef Check-Off, National Pork Board and American Lamb Board. Assessments will be collected and remitted to the appropriate program as required on all sale animals.

Open Class Entries Judged: Fri., August 14th after 4-H/FFA

RULES:

1. Read all General Rules and Regulations.
2. The exhibitor must own all animals.
3. Bulls must have a nose ring when led outside the stall area.
4. No more than two entries per class, per exhibitor.
5. Superintendent may combine classes with less than five animals in a class.
6. Animals over one year of age must be dehorned.
7. Junior Yearling or younger heifers that have freshened are

barred from showing at the Fair. Any female older than senior yearling that has not freshened will not be shown.

8. Must have freshened in the last 12 months and cows over the age of 32 months must have produced a calf carried to maturity. Non-lactating cows must be bred.

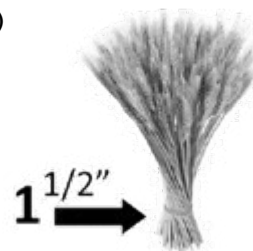

Judges will be using the latest Cooperative Extension Bulletin on Food Preservation methods, Blue Ball Book® of Preserving, copyright 2011 (or newer) or USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning. No jars will be opened for judging.

2. A round label will be on the face of the jar with the exhibitor's name and the contents clear enough for Fairgoers to read. A square label with information on preparation (pressure cook, how long, etc.) for the judge on the back. The label must also tell if lemon juice, citric acid or vinegar was used. Labels are available at the Fair Office before fair or from the Superintendent on Sunday, August 9th.

FFA GENERAL RULES

1. RULES THAT APPLY TO ALL FFA EXHIBITORS:

- a) Entries must be on regular FFA forms, completed in detail and approved by the Agriculture Science Instructor. Members will not be permitted to exhibit an entry that has not been properly entered in keeping with the deadline date.
- b) Entries must be documented as an official Supervised Agricultural Experience Project with a Project Record Book that verifies initiation and management of the entry 60 days prior to the Fair or by dates specified by other Fair rules.
- c) Up to date (completed) FFA record books must be turned in at the FFA Office during weigh-in of Fair
- d) Entries must be in place on the Fairgrounds Monday, August 10th. Weigh-in will be on Monday, August 10th. All market animals will weigh in upon arrival, on a first come first serve basis. All animals must remain loaded until their turn at the scales.
- e) Entries must be removed from the Fairgrounds on Sunday, August 16th from 7:00 - 10:00AM. Removal of entries prior to release time may cause forfeiture of premium money.
- f) Exhibitors are to use space assigned by the department Superintendent. Any change in mechanical structure of exhibit (example: removal or remodeling stall pens, partitions, gates, etc.) will be grounds for forfeiture of premium at discretion of FFA management. See Superintendent for permissible alterations. ENTRIES ARE NOT TO BE PUT IN PLACE UNTIL THE DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENT HAS BEEN CONTACTED FOR INSTRUCTIONS.
- g) FFA Chapters may compete the same as individuals. In this case, the chapter will be assigned an exhibitor number. Chapters entering livestock must indicate on registration form the name of the member who will show the animal.
- h) Each chapter with members exhibiting livestock must make a Herdsmanship entry for each kind of livestock entered, namely Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbit and Poultry.
- i) Participants in the above activities must be in Official Dress.
- j) Enterprises carried in 4-H during the current year may not be exhibited in the FFA division by an FFA member.
- k) FFA exhibitors must be at the time of participation in the Fair a secondary student, including current year graduating seniors, and enrolled in at least one vocational education course for an agricultural occupation, including a Supervised Agricultural Experience Program, with the objective of establishment in an agricultural occupation.

2. FFA ANIMAL WELFARE AND TREATMENT POLICY

Quality Assurance and Animal Welfare

- a) Drug Abuse: No illegal drug, off label use of drugs (uses other than specifically allowed on the drug label), or other use of artificial means to alter the physical composition, appearance, or disposition of a project animal is permitted. Violators may face repercussions listed below.
- b) Physical Abuse: No physical abuse of project animals is permitted in any public or private setting. Physical abuse includes, but is not limited to, surgical or other physical alteration of animal appearance or practices resulting in bruising or injury from the showman. It also includes practices resulting in inordinate levels of shrink, fill or animal stress other than routine management in accordance with acceptable industry animal husbandry practices, such as including appropriate amounts and methods of exercising and training. Violators may face repercussions listed below.
- c) In the event that repercussions are necessary for violations of the FFA animal welfare and treatment policy, the following may be applied to the violator at the discretion of the Blue Mt. FFA Advisors.

- d) Removal from the showmanship/market contest and disqualified with the loss of all placing and premiums.
- e) Rule number one, along with immediate removal from the livestock show and the loss of eligibility to show livestock within the Blue Mt. FFA organization.
- f) All of the above and removal from the stock show. The student will not be able to sell within the livestock auction. In the event violations occur within the Master Showmanship contest, the following repercussions may apply:
 - i. Removal and disqualification from the Master Showmanship contest.
 - ii. Removal and disqualification from the Master Showmanship contest, losing the privilege to compete again in the future (This rule may be commonly applied after a first offense has already occurred, but applied at FFA advisor discretion).
 - iii. All of the above and removal from the stock show. The student will not be able to sell within the livestock auction.

3. OFFICIAL DRESS FOR OREGON FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS AND CONTEST PARTICIPANTS

- a) Participants in the above activities must be in official dress
- b) White shirt/blouse, official FFA tie/scarf and official FFA jacket zipped to the top. Black pants/slacks or jeans. White pants/slacks are strongly encouraged for goats and dairy exhibitors.
- c) Superintendents have the authority to omit the wearing of jackets depending on the weather.

FFA SHOWMANSHIP
Superintendent: Hannah Hair

RULES

1. Members exhibiting livestock are required to make entry for showmanship awards in at least one division their livestock is entered. Members who exhibit livestock and poultry/rabbits must show in a showmanship class for both areas. A showmanship entry may be made for each kind of livestock entered.
2. Animals to be shown in the showmanship class must have been shown in a conformation class at which time the superintendent or the judge may eliminate a showmanship entry from showmanship competition.
3. Showmanship classes will be divided into Novice and Advance Showmanship. Novice Showmanship includes those exhibitors in Ag 1 & 2. When there are more than 15 entries in each class, the Superintendent will split the entries into two or more classes with not more than 15 entries in each class. The first and second place winners in each Showmanship Class will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion Showmanship for each species of livestock.
4. The Champion Showman of each species of livestock (beef, sheep, swine, dairy, and goat) will then compete for the All Around Champion Showman Awards if a minimum of 3 exhibitors are entered within the category.
5. Each contestant will be ranked on a 1-5-point basis by each judge for each species of animal. The individual with the fewest points will be the winner.
6. FFA Showmanship Awards: the first-place showman in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, and goat classes will be presented individual awards in the ring. Individual donors will provide these awards.
7. Factors to consider when scoring showmanship: Appearance of showman (neat, clean, properly dressed) poise, promptness,

calmness, alertness, and attitude of showman. Skill in showing the animal including: continuous attention while showing, controlling and keeping animal placed to advantage, ability to stand the animal, ability to move animal as requested by judge. The Animal: Condition (fleshing), clean, brushing and curling, clipping and brushing, feet and horns, condition of equipment.

1. All entries must be labeled correctly. Use only standard canning jars, (no larger than quart size) DO NOT USE PARAFFIN WAX ON JAMS OR JELLIES. No freezer jams allowed. Jars and lids must be clean and rings removed. Judges will be using the latest Cooperative Extension Bulletin on Food Preservation methods, Blue Ball Book of Preserving, copyright 2011 (or newer) or USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning. No jars will be opened for judging.
2. A round label will be on the face of the jar with the exhibitor's name and the contents clear enough for Fairgoers to read. A square label with information on preparation (pressure cook, how long, etc.) for the judge on the back. The label must also tell if lemon juice, citric acid or vinegar was used. Labels are available at the Fair Office before fair or from the Superintendent.

DRYING:

1. All entries must be labelled correctly. Bring 2 large, 6 medium, 12 small or 1 tablespoon of tiny pieces (like peas) in an approximate size mason jar. Attach self-sticking label (approximately 1.5"x3") with processing information to jar.

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4-H GENERAL RULES

ONLINE REGISTRATION PROCESS

All 4-H entries will be pre-registered through online registration by the member. Please follow the steps below:

1. **4-H online entry deadline for all contests and exhibits is Tuesday, June 30 by 11:59 pm.**
2. All approved members will receive an email with the ShoWorks entry link. If you do not receive an email, please contact the 4-H office at 541-278-5404 or a club volunteer for assistance.
3. If you do not have a computer or need assistance with your online registration, contact the 4-H Office at 541-278-5404.
4. All 4-H members who met participation eligibility are in the ShoWorks database. Please refer to your enrollment email for details and passwords or contact the 4-H Office.

4-H ENTRIES

Please read all entry information and procedures in the Exhibitors Guide carefully prior to entering.

1. **Pre-entry information required for all 4-H entries must be completed by Monday, June 15.**
2. Accommodation requests must be submitted in writing to the Umatilla County 4-H office prior to the contest entry deadline.
3. Exhibits must be checked in by the times published in the fair schedule to be judged and awarded premiums.
4. All exhibits must be picked up on Sunday, August 16. Livestock will be released between 7 a.m. and 10 a.m. **All livestock exhibitors must conduct a final cleanup of the livestock area by 10 a.m.** All other exhibits will be released from 8:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m. All exhibits must be picked up at EOTEC by 11:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 16. **The Extension Office will not transport exhibits. If you cannot meet this deadline, send a representative to pick up your exhibits.**
5. All 4-H youth exhibitors must comply with all Umatilla County Fair general rules, regulations, and policies noted in the front section of the County Fair Exhibitors Guide.
6. All exhibits for Communications, Expressive Arts, Family and Consumer Science, Horticulture, Industrial Arts, Natural Science, and STEM must be properly labeled with name, county, age division, and skill level on each exhibit item.
7. Unless otherwise specified, members may only advance to the state level in project areas in which they are currently enrolled. Members with entries in project areas in which they are not currently enrolled will only be eligible for blue, red, and white ribbons. These entries are NOT eligible for awards or premiums and will not be advanced to the state level.
8. If required, an explanation card must be fully completed and securely attached to each exhibit. (See class requirements to know if a card is needed.) These cards should be completed by the member and must match the exhibit being entered. Exhibits without required explanation cards, labeling, or other specific class requirements will be dropped one ribbon color.

4-H ELIGIBILITY

1. Exhibiting in the 4-H Division of the fair is restricted

to members enrolled in 4-H club work in Umatilla County by January 31 of the current year. Livestock exhibitors must be YQCA certified.

2. Unless otherwise specified, members may only advance to the state level in project areas in which they are currently enrolled. Members with entries in project areas in which they are not currently enrolled will only be eligible for blue, red, and white ribbons. These entries are NOT eligible for awards or premiums and will not be advanced to the state level.
3. Members must enter their proper phase or skill level according to their age division and advancements. Members are only eligible for one skill level in each project area.
4. All exhibits shall be the member's own 4-H project for the current club year.
5. Age groups for all contests and exhibitors shall be as follows, unless noted in the appropriate section:
CLOVERBUDS: Ages 5-8 on Sept. 1, 2025. Limited exhibit areas. No large animal livestock, horse, dog, shooting sports, or live contests.

NOVICE:

HEARTH - First-year HEARTH (Home Ec, Art, Horticulture) project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2025

Livestock/Small Animal - First-year livestock project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2025

Dog - First-year dog project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2025. (Obedience classes are based on the level of the dog.)

Horse and Shooting Sports - First-year horse or shooting sports project member regardless of age JUNIOR: ages 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2025

INTERMEDIATE: ages 12-14 on Sept. 1, 2025

SENIOR: ages 15-19 on Sept. 1, 2025

6. HEARTH exhibits may be entered in only one class.
7. The same exhibit may not be entered in 4-H, FFA, and/or Open Class unless it follows the Oregon 4-H and FFA Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).
8. Exhibitors must own all animals no later than June 1, except for those specific ownership dates mentioned in other sections of the Exhibitors Guide.

4-H ADMINISTRATION

1. All 4-H exhibitors are to abide by the "General Rules and Regulations" of the fair, except where such rules are superseded by 4-H State Guidelines.
2. The individual member must do all the preparation and care of exhibits and necessary preparation for contests.
3. Exhibitors must allow fair management to use animals or exhibits in judging contests unless excused by the Superintendent.
4. Failure to comply with fair rules and cooperate with fair management will result in the forfeiture of premiums.
5. It will be the responsibility of each Superintendent to turn in completed results from their division to the on-site 4-H Office as soon as the clerk sheets are completed, no later than 24 hours after the end of judging.

4-H PREMIUMS

4-H premiums will be awarded according to the following point system guidelines:

- Points will be awarded at the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior levels.
 - Premium points will be determined by ribbon placing as follows: **(Remember the numbers represent points, not a dollar amount.)**
 - Blue – 5 points**
 - Red – 4 points**
 - White – 3 points**
- No Points for Market Classes**
- Champion and Reserve Champion will receive no additional points.
 - The monetary value of a point will be determined after the show, based on the total points awarded and monies allocated for premiums.
 - Areas surrounding livestock exhibits must be kept clean during the week and thoroughly cleaned at checkout, or **PREMIUM MONEY WILL BE WITHHELD!**
 - In case there are low exhibitor numbers or entries are deemed unworthy of the prize offered, the points will be awarded at the discretion of the judge. No champion ribbons will be awarded to class winners unless they are blue ribbon or first premium quality.

4-H RIBBONS

4-H judging will take place with the Danish Merit System, awarding class entries a blue, red, or white ribbon. Champions and Reserve Champions may be selected when the judge deems there are entries of championship quality. Champions and Reserve Champions will be selected from blue ribbon winners only. Ribbons and their relative standing are:

Champion: Best in the class

Reserve Champion: Second best in the class

Blue Ribbon: an exhibit that is excellent and meets the established standards for the class.

Red Ribbon: an exhibit that is good but has room for improvement and meets the established standards for the class.

White Ribbon: an exhibit that meets the requirements of the class but shows need for considerable improvement.

Participation Ribbon: given when an exhibit does not meet the requirements of the class. (Display only)

Cloverbuds: recognition of participation

STATE FAIR ENTRIES

- The judge will designate exhibits of State Fair quality at the time the exhibits are judged.
- Only Intermediate and Seniors are eligible for State Fair entries, which require their attendance to participate. Juniors are eligible to send exhibits for judging. Juniors cannot participate in any in-person contests such as food preparation contests, judging contests, livestock exhibits, etc.
- All entries qualifying for the State Fair must be registered through the onsite 4-H Office by Sunday, August 16, at 11:00 a.m.
- State Fair Transport Procedure:** All items can be dropped off at the County Extension offices by 12:00 PM on Monday, August 24, for transport to State Fair. Items will be returned to the County Extension offices on Tuesday, September 8 and will be available for pickup later that week.

4. Audio submissions must be in .mp3 format, titled "first_last_classnumber_county.mp3" and can be emailed to umatilla4h@oregonstate.edu or submitted on a thumb drive by 5 pm on Sunday, Aug. 9 with HEARTH exhibits.

4-H Ambassadors**

Classes are open to all 4-H members and are especially appropriate for those projects that have no separate exhibit classes.

1. Exhibitors may enter **one** exhibit per age division and be part of a club entry.

Note: Some topics are judged within their topic area even when submitted as an educational display.

Those must be submitted with their appropriate projects, not in the Educational Display division. This includes:

- Conservation (Natural Science)

2. The exhibit may be a poster or a three-dimensional display. Posters are limited in size to 30" by 24". Individual three-dimensional displays are limited in size to 48" wide (measured when lying flat), 24" deep (front to back), and 36" high. Club exhibits are limited in size to 60" wide, 24" deep and 36" high. The weight of any display cannot exceed 30 pounds.
3. Exhibits may include pictures, models, diagrams, and actual articles if they qualify for the safety standards listed below. Drawings or photos that are an essential part of the display should be firmly attached to the board. Loose materials like soil, bark, or sand must be displayed in closed containers. No books or notebooks will be accepted as part of the display. The display may include flyers, business cards, information sheets, etc., for public distribution. Enough should be provided to last throughout the entire fair.

The following materials will not be allowed on the display for safety reasons:

- Living organisms- plants or animals
 - Any liquids
 - Aerosol bottles or other pressurized gases
 - Glass
 - Hazardous substances
 - Sharp items
4. Display (all parts) should be able to last the duration of the fair in good repair.
 5. An [Educational Display Exhibit Explanation Card \(000-01\)](#) must be attached to each exhibit. Judging criteria are outlined on the [4-H Educational Display Evaluation Sheet \(214-01\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the State 4-H website.
 6. Club exhibits are to be entered under the club's name but must include the names of all members and club volunteers. This may be on a separate piece of paper securely attached to the back of the exhibit. Club exhibits will receive one ribbon per exhibit.
 7. **Each piece of an exhibit must have name, county, and class number securely attached to it. All parts of the display should be attached in some way to keep the exhibit together as a unit.** Single posters may be displayed by hanging or stapling to the wall. All other displays should be free-standing. All information contained in the exhibit must be able to be viewed by the public by looking at the display. **All sources must be listed on the front of the display.**

DEMONSTRATIONS AND ILLUSTRATED TALKS

A **demonstration** shows how to do something. There is a finished product at the end. An **illustrated talk** is a way to share information with the use of visual aids.

1. The topic may be anything the member wants to share with others.
2. A member may not present the same topic more than once at the County or State Fair level.
3. Teams will consist of two members. If members of a presentation team are in two different age divisions, the team must compete in the higher age group.
4. Each team or individual will have time to set up, present, and clear the area. The actual presentation time is as follows: **Juniors 3-10 minutes and Intermediate/Senior 10-15 minutes.**
5. Each contestant must supply any needed equipment if different than listed in the overall contest rules.
6. The use of notes is permitted. However, the excessive use of notes may be counted against the contestant at the judge's discretion.
7. During the presentation, contestants should introduce themselves by name, club, and topic.
8. Contestants should cite their major references after their presentation. (Citing references is not included in the time.)
9. Anyone present may ask questions of the contestant after the presentation.

Contests are open to all 4-H members, but Intermediate and Senior members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in 4-H Clothing & Textiles, Knitting, and/or Crochet projects. Fashion Revue is a combination of an interview/oral presentation, modeling of the garment and response to questions from the judges. The contest will be broken into two parts: personal interview and fashion revue modeling. Participants must be present for all 4-H Fashion Revue activities, including orientation, judging, dress rehearsal, and Fashion Revue. A complete schedule including orientation, fashion show practice, interview times and public fashion show will be distributed to all registered Fashion Revue participants.

1. All garments/ensembles to be judged must have been purchased or constructed in the last 12 months.
2. The Fashion Revue has a Construction division, Ready to Wear, and Fashion Revue Challenge. Members may enter up to **five** entries, with no more than one class in each division, except construction, where a member may enter one each for clothing, knitting, and crocheting (i.e. one ready-to-wear, one challenge, and up to three construction, one in each division).
3. Judging criteria are outlined on the [Fashion Revue Contest Evaluation Form \(320-05\)](#) available from the County Extension offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website or the state 4-H website.

FASHION REVUE INTERVIEW PROCEDURES

1. Introduction/Presentation

Each contestant will start by introducing themselves and model their garment to the judges. Participants will then provide a 2-3 minute presentation to the judges which describes their project activities, outfit selection, construction or buying skills and their knowledge of fiber and fabrics. Areas that will be judged are outlined on the [Fashion Revue Contest Evaluation Form \(320-05\)](#).

2. Question and Answer

Judges will have the opportunity to ask each participant questions from the list of contest questions as well as questions related directly to the participant's garment or project experiences. Refer to the [Fashion Revue Interview Question Bank](#) for a list of possible questions.

3. Contestants will participate in a public fashion

show where they will have opportunity to model in a way to showcase their outfit/garment. To qualify for a ribbon, members must participate in both the interview and public show.

4. Participants will provide a **typed commentary (100-150**

words) to be read when they model during the public show. Commentary should focus on the learning, construction, and purpose of the garment rather than the individual's involvement in 4-H, fair, school, or other activities. Be sure not to include information that would be considered too personal (i.e. size of garment or something really embarrassing) nor provide too much private information (address, town, school, etc.) as these commentaries are read aloud in a public setting.

5. Explanation Cards: Participants must also bring a copy of the [Fashion Revue Card \(320-06\)](#) with fabric samples and a photo of the participant wearing the garment.

2. Participants must be in appropriate dress for safe cooking and are expected to follow food and kitchen safety procedures. Participants are expected to leave the kitchen clean. This is part of the judge's evaluation.
3. The use of alcoholic beverages that would be unlawful for a minor to purchase or possess is not permitted in preparing or including on the menu.
4. Please serve the judge once your dish is complete. During the interview portion of judging, time will be paused and resumed once the interview is complete. Participants can serve the judge either family style or on an individual serving dish, whichever is appropriate for the meal.

CONTEST REQUIREMENTS

1. All participants must provide the judge with the correct [Judges Information Form](#) for each contest. Each form is available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the state 4-H website. You must include cost and nutritional information for the meal on the form. Recipes for the dishes must be attached.
2. All participants must provide a poster (approximately 24"x30") of the recipe to display in the preparation area. Please include the 4-H member's name, county and contest name on the poster.
3. Participants will serve samples of the food to the judge and the public. Paper plates and utensils will be provided. *For food safety, finished dishes prepared at home may NOT be brought and served.*
4. All contests require at least one table setting. Please refer to individual contests for specific table setting requirements.

FOODS OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST

Participants select one food product to prepare chosen from: Fruit or Vegetable Dish, Salad, Sandwich, Grain Product, Yeast Product, Dairy Product, or Main Dish.

1. Participants will have **one hour** (start to finish) for set-up, preparation, and cleanup. Participants must provide all ingredients and equipment except range, microwave oven, and refrigerator.
2. Participants will prepare one recipe, batch, etc. of the food product using **at least two ingredients representative of the Pacific Northwest.**
3. Participants must select a food product that can be prepared within the time limit. **Only yeast products which require proofing will be allowed extra time.** Proofing time is done with members out of the kitchen.
4. Participants may not prepare the same recipe for more than one year.
5. The food prepared must be displayed on a serving platter or tray, or in a dish, bowl, basket, etc.
6. Participants must display one place setting of the table service which would be used in serving the food at a meal (include plates, tableware, napkin, glasses, tablecloth, placemat, or whatever is appropriate. A table will be available for each display. A centerpiece may be

included if the participant wishes but is not required.

7. Required form: [Foods of the Pacific Northwest Judges form \(511-18\)](#). The judge will also ask questions regarding the Pacific Northwest food used, i.e. nutritive value, region produced, or season when most plentiful.

4-H TABLE SETTING CONTEST

Contest is open to all 4-H members. No food is prepared for this contest.

1. Contestants will have 15 minutes to set up their display. The judge will then interview each contestant. A maximum of 10 minutes will be allotted for the interview.
2. A table will be provided with a marked space of 18" deep x 25" wide for the place setting. The contestant must bring all other supplies.
3. Select a theme. The table setting may be for breakfast, lunch or dinner and may range from a picnic to a formal meal.
4. Plan a well-balanced menu, appropriate for the member's skill level and chosen theme. All items on the menu should be dishes the member can prepare. The menu must be typed or neatly printed on a card approximately 5"x7" using size 16-18 font. Foods must be listed in the order they will be served. The menu card may be incorporated into the display/theme. Be creative!
5. Plan an attractive table setting for one person. The setting should include a tablecloth and/or placemat, dishes, tableware, glassware, and napkin. All must be appropriate for the theme and the menu being served. Paper plates, plasticware, and paper napkins may be used for casual themes. Centerpieces are acceptable if appropriate.
6. Only utensils necessary for the meal must be placed on the table. Newly purchased items are not necessary. Use what is available at home or from friends and family. All items must be safe to eat from, with no cracks or chips. Items must be clean with no water spots or fingerprints.
7. Alcoholic beverage containers or glasses are not allowed, nor should alcohol be included in the menu.
8. Refer to [Table Setting Guidelines \(999-06\)](#) for proper table setting. Be prepared to answer any questions the judge might ask about the place setting, the menu and/or nutritional values. Judging criteria can be found on the [Table Setting Contest Evaluation Sheet \(211-02\)](#).

EXPRESSIVE ARTS

DEPARTMENT

4-H ART

Superintendent: Trisha Bunker

Classes are open to all 4-H members. Expressive Art has three divisions: **Original Art** is based on the entry

being entirely original, **Crafts**, which includes components that have been designed or created by others, and **Pottery**. In all divisions, the member is expected to create their work by applying the elements and principles of design.

1. All artwork is to be mounted for display, including jewelry.

- a. All jewelry exhibits must be mounted in some way to a board or fabric-covered board for display with the explanation card folded and attached.
- b. **All art MUST be mounted on board as thick as mat board.** (4-ply, 6-ply, or 8-ply is recommended). Matting, spray fixatives, and/or overwrapping with plastic are acceptable for the protection of the artwork.
- c. If an item is meant to hang, a hanger that will support the weight of the item must be securely attached. Adhesive plastic hangers are encouraged to protect artwork. Two adhesive hangers per hanging art piece is suggested.
- d. Exhibits 3" or smaller **MUST** be mounted on matboard no larger than 4"x4". This should still be at least 4-ply to protect the art.

2. Due to weight, most artwork may not be framed.

- a. EXCEPTION for work done with chalks, charcoals, or pastels that require protection – only lightweight frames with *plastic* can be used for protection during display – **NO wood frames or glass is allowed.**
3. Exhibits should not contain parts that expose the public or volunteers to injury (i.e. no sharp edges or points).
4. 4-H exhibit tags must be attached to the lower right-hand corner of the exhibit. **Each piece of an exhibit must be labeled on the back or bottom with the member's name, county and exhibit class number.** Exhibits that have more than one piece must be tied together or connected in some way so the pieces can be considered as one exhibit.
5. All entries must have a fully completed [4-H Expressive Arts Explanation Card \(231-01\)](#) to qualify for judging. This form takes the place of interview judging, so be as thoughtful and comprehensive as possible when sharing the required information.
6. The explanation must give the 4-H member's name, county and class number, origin of design, intended use of the item, previous experience using this technique and a description of how it was made.
7. Exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor. Public display of exhibits will be at the discretion of 4-H management.
8. Exhibits will be evaluated using the judging criteria outlined on the [Art Project Evaluation Sheet \(231-02\)](#). All forms are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the state 4-H website.

ORIGINAL ART

Classes are open to all 4-H members. Members may enter up to **three** exhibits with no more than **two** per class number. Member applies the elements and principles of

CRAFTS

Classes are open to all 4-H members. Members may enter up to **two** exhibits with no more than **two** per class number. Member applies the elements and principles of design to create work that may incorporate pieces that have been designed or created by others, such as instructional patterns, pre-stamped or printed outlines, rubber stamps, commercial stencils, stickers, printed papers, etc. The explanation to the judge should explain how the member made the decisions about how to incorporate these pieces into the total design. **The pre-designed component must not be the total design.**

231 300 01__ Painting on surfaces – decorative painting on any surface (wood, metal, glass, plastic, cement, fiber, plaster, paper) using any paint medium and the aid of a pre-designed instructional pattern. May also include techniques such as pour of fluid painting.

231 300 02__ Stenciling/Printing/Stamping - work created using stenciling, etching, printing, or stamping techniques with the aid of stencils, forms, stamps, or designs that the member did not create themselves. In some cases, the exhibit may be up to five smaller items that use the same technique based on a theme. (Example: five note cards using nature stamps)

231 300 03__ Assemblage - Scrapbooking/ Collage/Decoupage – Work should be assembled in a manner that maintains the form as a permanent structure. Scrapbooking exhibit should have no more than two scrapbook or memory book pages based on a single theme and protected by plastic sleeves. Exhibits with two items or pages should have them all labeled and securely attached to each other. May also include mosaics such as diamond art. **NO LEGOS.**

(Adhesives and paint are not included.) Base item may be purchased or made by member.

261 100 75__ Patchwork Quilts, using kits: Quilts of any size made using piecing techniques such as English, traditional American, Seminole, etc. A kit is a complete "quilt in a bag" where all of the fabrics, the pattern, instructions for embellishment, et. al. is all included. The fabric selection and cutting have all been pre-determined by someone other than the member. If the completed item is *quilted* by someone other than the member, please note this on the Fiber Arts Exhibit Explanation Card.

261 100 76__ Patchwork Quilts, no kits: Quilts of any size made using piecing techniques such as English, traditional American, Seminole, etc. Members may choose to follow a pattern, such as Log Cabin, but the fabric selection, fabric layout, and all cutting is done by the member. If the completed item is *quilted* by someone other than the member, please note this on the Fiber Arts Exhibit Explanation Card.

261 100 77__ Patchwork on other items: Items other than quilts made using piecing techniques such as English, traditional American, Seminole, etc. Might include clothing, wall hangings, pillows, linens, etc.

261 100 80__ Quilting, hand stitched: Multi-layered projects made using hand quilting stitches. Items should have a top layer, filling or batting, and a bottom layer held together by hand stitching. All work is done by the member.

261 100 81__ Quilting, machine stitched: Multi-layered projects made using machine quilting stitches. Items should have a top layer, filling or batting, and a bottom layer held together by machine stitching. All work is done by the member.

4-H KNITTING

Superintendent: Trish Bunker

Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a 4-H Fiber Arts project. Members may enter **three** exhibits based on **ONLY their skill level**, with no more than **two** exhibits per class. Members may also enter **one** exhibit in the Hands for Larger Service class.

- Knitting has three divisions of exhibit classes based on the techniques used: **Knitting with needles, Knitting with looms, boards, and machines** and **Arm/Hand/Finger Knitting**.
- For exhibits to qualify for judging, a [4-H Knitting Exhibit Explanation Card \(360-01\)](#) must be thoroughly and thoughtfully completed and securely attached to the exhibit. Members must mark skills on the level in which they are enrolled and only enter articles that qualify in that level. Judging criteria is outlined on the [4-H Knitting Evaluation Sheet \(360-02\)](#). All forms are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, and the state 4-H website.
- Each garment or article must be labeled with the member's name, county, and exhibit class number. This label must be typed or printed in indelible ink on a piece of white fabric and sewn in or written with indelible ink on painters' tape and placed where it can do the least amount of damage.
- If the article is designed as a pair/set, both items must be labeled and fastened together, i.e., a set of potholders, pillowcases, gloves. Small items, such as bracelets, must be mounted for display.

Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a 4-H Leathercraft project. Members may enter up to **three** classes, but only **one** exhibit per class.

1. Each exhibit will consist of one article (a pair of gloves, slippers, etc., is considered one article). Kits may be used; however, the project must be created/completed by the member. Completed projects cannot be store-bought, used, or repurposed. If a project qualifies for more than one class, the member should decide which part of their work they would like to emphasize by selecting the appropriate class. The overall appearance of the entire article will be considered during judging.
2. Each article must be labeled with the member's name, county, and exhibit class number. When a pair of articles makes up an exhibit, the articles must each be labeled (as above) and attached to each other.
3. To qualify for judging, a fully completed [4-H Leathercraft Exhibit Explanation Card \(251-01\)](#) must be attached. Exhibits will be evaluated using the [Leathercraft Evaluation Sheet \(251-02\)](#). Forms are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website and the state 4-H website.

Carving techniques should show proper use of the selected tools to create the overall design. Use of color is allowed.

251 100 03__ Geometric and basketweaves: Demonstrates use of geometric or basketweave tools to create an appropriate design. Design may include the use of the swivel knife and other tools.

251 100 04__ Figure carving, Pictorial carving, or Embossing Techniques: Demonstrates Figure carving, Pictorial carving, or Embossing techniques. The application of color is appropriate but not required.

251 100 05__ Use of Color: Demonstrates at least one of the following techniques: solid color, antique stain, block dyeing, background dyeing, resist dyeing, air brushing, or use of multiple colors.

251 100 06__ Lacing techniques: Demonstrates assembly of project using appropriate lacing techniques
251 100 07__ Assembly Techniques: Include Stitching (assembly of project using appropriate hand or machine stitching techniques); Zipper installation; lining application; edging (appropriate rounding of edges and burnishing or slicking techniques); Hardware application (demonstrates appropriate application of hardware such as snaps, rivets, buckles, D-rings, clasps, 3 ring binders, key mounts, bar clamps, spots, conchos, etc.

251 100 10__ Advanced techniques: Includes filigree; braiding; knot work; sculpting; applique, pyrography (burning); designing own tooling pattern; designing, cutting and assembly of interior pieces; cutting project from leather; rolled edges; folding; skiving; and molding. Classes are open to all 4-H members.

Classes are available for solo performances and club/team/group performances (two or more performers). A member can enter a maximum of **two** acts: **one solo and one club**. All acts need to be tasteful and appropriate for people of all ages.

1. To participate, members will submit a video of their live performance. Maximum performance length is 10 minutes.
2. Members will prepare an introduction of at least 50 words and no more than 100 words, written in the third person, and neatly printed or typed. The introduction should tell the audience a little bit about yourself, your interest in this kind of performance, and what you are performing. **The introduction should be included on the video before the performance begins and can be made by anyone – participant, friend, parent, etc. The written introduction will be submitted with the video and explanation card.**
3. Videos will be played for the public during the fair. Please keep this in mind when completing your introduction. DO NOT include last name, address, school, or other identifying information. See [Performing Arts Performance Video Tips](#).
4. Video submissions must be in .mp4 format, titled "first_last_classnumber_county.mp4" and can be emailed to umatilla4h@oregonstate.edu or submitted on a thumb drive by 5 pm on Sunday, Aug. 9 with HEARTH exhibits.
5. All exhibits whether electronically or physically submitted must be accompanied by a [Performing Arts Explanation Card \(271-02\)](#). Judging criteria are outlined on the [Performing Arts Evaluation Sheet \(271-01\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the state 4-H website.

4-H PHOTOGRAPHY

The following classes are for still photography. Video projects should be entered under Videography in the Communications Department.

1. **Classes are open to all 4-H members.** Members may enter up to **three** classes with no more than **one** entry per class, plus **one** additional entry in Photojournalism, Creative Process, Creative Uses, or Technical Challenge, and be part of a club entry. All photos must show work done by the member. Public display of exhibits will be at the discretion of 4-H management. Exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor.
2. To qualify for judging, a fully completed [4-H Photography Exhibit Explanation Card \(241-01\)](#) must be attached. Judging criteria are outlined on the [Photography Exhibit Evaluation Sheet \(241-02\)](#). Forms are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, and on the state 4-H website.
3. All finished exhibits should be "polished" to presentation standards. This may include color correcting, dust or imperfection removal, color and density corrections, etc.
4. Photos must be mounted with a rigid backing (see Mounting and Displaying Exhibits) and will be disqualified from judging if not mounted properly.
5. Photography classes are divided by subject matter or technique. If a photo includes more than one type of subject (i.e. people and animals), the member should decide which category is the most appropriate. Digital and film photos will be included in the same class, except as restricted by the class description. Color and black & white images will be included in the same class according to subject or technique. No writing or imprints on the photos (including date, name, or business imprints) are allowed. No captions (except photojournalism class) are allowed.
6. **Exceptions to photo size limits include:**
 - Class 241 100 10_ Panoramic - photos must be **at least** twice as long in one direction as they are in the other direction. Matted or mounted exhibit must not exceed 16"x20".
 - Class 241 100 11_ Photojournalism - may include photos of any size mounted on a single board, must not exceed 16"x20".
 - Class 241 100 12_ Creative Process - original image may be 4"x6", final image (no less than 5 inches on the shorter side of photo). Final exhibit, showing both photos mounted on the front, must not exceed 16"x 20"
 - Class 241 100 16_ Creative uses - size determined by the use

MOUNTING AND DISPLAYING EXHIBITS

Think neatness and visual appeal when preparing the exhibit for fair.

- The final exhibit size, including either mount or mat, must be no less than 8"x10" and may not exceed 16"x20". All single images are rectangular, and the shorter side can be no less than 5 inches.

- **Photos must be mounted with a rigid backing** using any material firm or rigid enough to protect the photos on the backside. Photos may be matted if they also have a rigid backing for protection. Photos MAY NOT be entered only matted; they must have a backing for protection. Any surface that shows from behind mounted only photos or matted photos must be mat board. Poster board or corrugated cardboard is not acceptable for mounting or matting. For more information on matting and mounting, see [Preparing Your 4-H Photography Exhibit for Fair](#). Any commercially available pre-cut mats that accommodate the required size are acceptable. Mats or mounts cut by the member must meet the size specifications.
- No additions or embellishments to mats or mounts. No plastic-covered pictures. No writing or imprints on the photos (including date, name, or business imprints) are allowed. No captions (except photojournalism class) are allowed. **Absolutely no frames or glass are allowed.**
- **Exhibits must be ready for hanging with adhesive plastic hangers** spaced evenly and equally from the top edge, with approximately ½ inch of the hanger showing above the mat/mount board to ensure the exhibit hangs level. If the weight of the exhibit requires more support, use additional secure hangers, but be sure they are taped or covered in a manner to protect other exhibits from damage if exhibits are stacked.
- The member's name, county, and exhibit class number must be printed on the back of the matboard.
- Explanation card should be attached to the back of the exhibit with the writing visible to the judge.

241 100 004 Club Exhibit: Club exhibits are entered under the Club name but must include the names of all members and leaders. This may be on a separate sheet of paper securely attached to the back of the exhibit. Club exhibits receive one ribbon per exhibit.

241 100 11__ Photojournalism: Multiple print images (maximum 20) of any size or shape that depict a series (several images on one topic) or tell a story (showing several steps of an event or activity) mounted on one story board not to exceed 16" x 20". Captions are optional. The final exhibit may be a single composite image. Photo album pages or memory book pages are not allowed.

241 100 12__ Creative process: Single image that has been altered after capture, either through film or digital processing, or printing techniques. Techniques must be used with skill and knowledge and not be limited to pre-programmed digital filters. Includes computer enhancement beyond basic corrections of cropping, color and brightness correction, and red eye removal. The effect/artistry of the image must be enhanced by the work done. The finished exhibit must include the original image, the final image, and a detailed description of the techniques used/work done and why. The final exhibit may be a single composite image of the three requirements or individually mounted on a single piece of mat board.

241 100 16__ Creative uses: One item showing the use or display of images in a creative manner. Images and the item must be the work of the member. Possibilities include transferring to fabric or wood, shadow box or 3-dimensional display, note/postcards, calendars, posters, photo album or memory book pages, etc.

241 100 17__ Technical Challenge: One image showing advanced growth in one or more techniques the exhibitor chooses. You must thoroughly explain the skills used to capture the image or the process used and how you achieved your image using them on the explanation card. Possible technical challenges:

- Motion blur

3. All individual items included must be labeled with the member's name, county, and exhibit class number.
4. A completed [4-H Business/Entrepreneur Explanation Card \(330-01\)](#) must be included. Exhibits will be evaluated using the [Business/Entrepreneur Evaluation Sheet \(330-02\)](#). Space allowed for the exhibit is 30" wide by 36" tall by 18" in depth. Your display needs to educate the consumer on your product so that they understand what you are selling, the price, value, etc.

330 200 00__ Business Plan – comprehensive plan for the business that includes: the business name, a description of the business, the business' mission and goals, who the business is trying to reach (market), how you are selling (sales plan), and the financial plan (budget). Exhibit in a binder-type system such as a three-ring binder.

330 300 00__ Marketing Plan – comprehensive marketing plan that includes who your customers are, print materials such as business cards, flyers, brochures, audio scripts for radio, social media pages, and/or other "virtual" media. No requirement on how to exhibit; however, exhibit should fit within the space allowed.

330 400 00__ Social Entrepreneurship - A poster or

virtual (video, PowerPoint, Prezi, etc.) display sharing your social entrepreneurship event, project, or business. Share how you identified a need/problem in your community, who your target customers are, how you filled the need or solved the problem, and how you determined the best way to fill the need or solve the problem (including market research). A social entrepreneur is a person who establishes an enterprise with the aim of solving social problems or effecting social change. Examples include Toms, Baron Fig, Better World Books, as well as the Globe Poverty Project, volunTEENnation.org, and One Earth Designs.

4-H CLOTHING

Superintendent: Judy Vicek

1. **Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a 4-H Clothing and Textiles project.** Members may enter up to **four** exhibits in construction classes but only **two** exhibits in any one class. They may also enter **one** exhibit in the Creativity, Costumes, Hands-for-Larger Service, or Skills Notebook classes. All exhibits must be in the same level. All items should be clean and in good repair. Hangers and/or garment bags are removed prior to judging and might not be returned.
2. Judging criteria are outlined in [4-H Sewing/Clothing Construction Evaluation Sheet \(320-01\)](#), the [4-H Sewing/Clothing Creative Expression Evaluation Sheet \(320-02\)](#), or the [Skills Notebook Evaluation Sheet \(320-96\)](#) which are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the State 4-H website.
3. Judging standards are listed in [Measuring Up: Quality Standards for Sewn Items/Projects \(PNW-197\)](#). Each entry will be evaluated on ALL features. For skill levels 1-6, the use of fabrics or skills that are beyond the recommendations for this level are expected to be done well according to the standards, but will neither be given extra credit consideration for increased difficulty nor disqualified during judging. It is in the best interest of the member to stay within the suggested guidelines. See [4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders: Basic, Expanding, and Advanced Skills \(4-H 320-00L\)](#).
4. To qualify for judging, a completed [4-H Sewing and Textiles Exhibit Explanation Card \(320-04\)](#) must be attached. These forms take the place of interview judging, so be as thoughtful and comprehensive as possible when sharing the required information.
5. In addition to the explanation card, each garment or article in the construction classes must be labeled with the member's name, county, and project level. This label should be typed or printed in indelible pencil or ink on a piece of white fabric and sewn or fused onto the bottom inside of each piece. Exhibits that have more than one piece should have each piece labeled and be tied together or connected in some way so the pieces can be considered as one exhibit.

BEGINNING SKILLS: SEWING LEVEL 1

Exhibits must follow the [4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders](#) resource information and recommendations for this level. Fabrics used for this level should be stable medium weight, firmly woven fabrics (cotton or cotton/polyester blend), and felt.

320 101 11__ Cutting: Personal accessory or item for the home showing cutting skills and/or hand sewing skills (no machine) made from firmly woven fabrics. Cutting skills items include cut-and-tie fleece blankets, pillows, ponchos, and scarves. Hand-sewn items include pin cushions, needle holders, beanbags, ornaments, etc.

320 101 12__ Hand Sewing: Constructed item, accessory, or tow sewn that is all sewn by hand.

320 101 13__ Non-garment item: Machine sewing straight seams, square corners, curved seams, casings, pressing, and/or hems. Items such as simple stuffed flat toy, beanbags, potholder, book cover, tote bag, pillowcase, pillow, receiving blanket, placemats, etc., using recommended fabrics for this level.

320 101 14__ Garment or personal item with casing: Exhibit demonstrating skills in correctly sewing a casing (for draw string or elastic) and one or more of the following: straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, reinforcing crotch seams, casings sewn on top and bottom and/or hem. Items include apron, mask, pull-on or wrap pants, skirt, shorts, etc.

320 101 15__ Garment without casing: Exhibit demonstrating skills in correctly machine and/or hand sewing straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finishes, pressing, and hem. Items include cape, simple pullover jumper, buttonless vest, etc.

BASIC SKILLS: SEWING LEVEL 2

The projects must show any of the level 1 skills in addition to the [4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders](#) recommendations for levels 2-3. Fabrics used in this level are medium weight woven, with or without nap and/or knit fabrics (broadcloth, calico, soft denim, gingham, muslin, poplin, chintz, double knits), wool, and/or stable non-bulky knits or polar fleece with minimal stretch (4 inches of fabric stretches to 4 ¾ inches or less.)

320 101 21__ Garment or personal item with a zipper: machine or hand-sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching a centered, lapped or invisible zipper as well as one or more of the following: machine-sewn straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, gathers, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures and/or hems. Items include zipper bag, tote, skirt, simple dress or jumper, slacks, etc.

320 101 22__ Non-garment made with a zipper: machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching a centered, lapped, or invisible zipper, such as a personal accessory, an item for the home, for use in sports, picnics, camping or with animals, a toy, doll, etc. Should also demonstrate one or more of the following: Machine sewn straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, gathers, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct

attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures, pressing, and/or hems.

320 101 23__ Garment or outfit with sleeves:

machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching raglan, set-in or kimono sleeves, as well as appropriate seam finish, pressing, reinforcing underarm seams, gathers, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures hems, etc.

320 101 24__ Garment or item with patch pockets:

machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating correct attachment of patch pocket using machine or hand sewing skills; appropriate seam finish, pressing, casings, gathers, reinforcing underarm or crotch seams, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, hems, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures, etc.

320 101 25__ Handsewn item: Item demonstrating skills in assembling, hemming, and/or attaching closures (buttons, snaps, hook & eye, zipper) or embellishments using hand sewing techniques.

Machine can be used for some of the construction, but 50% or more of the item must be hand-sewn.

320 101 26__ Garment or personal item

demonstrating level 2 skill such as machine-sewn straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finishes, pressing, zipper, casings, gathers, reinforced crotch or underarm seams, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures, hems.

BASIC SKILLS LEVEL 3

At this level, the focus must be on improvement of any of the basic skills and adding new skills found in the [4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders](#) recommendations for levels 4-5. Fabrics at this level must include one of the following: flannel cotton blends, stripes, plaids, rayon, single knits, stiff denim, linen, gauze, seersucker, wool, tweed, crepe de chine; may have moderate stretch (4 inches of fabric stretches to no more than 5 and 3/8 inches)

320 101 31__ Garment or personal item: machine or hand sewn, successfully demonstrating skills from levels 3 such as: darts, tucks, zippers, waistband, collars, yokes, cuffs, pockets, appropriate seam finishes for fabrics (French, serged, flat fell, mock flat felled, etc.), set in sleeves, ruffles and pleats, applying trim, hook & loop tape, matching fabric design, binding, stitch-in-the-ditch, etc. Items may include a shirt or blouse, dress or jumper, purse or tote with pockets, bathrobe, jogging suit, unlined jacket or blazer, etc.

320 101 32__ Garment with collar: Machine or hand-sewn, demonstrating appropriate interfacing and collar sewn into the garment. Additional skills must include appropriate seam finishes for fabrics, pressing, stay stitching, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, etc.

320 101 33__ Non-garment: Item for the home, a doll, toy, or garment/accessories for them, or items used in sport, picnics, camping, or with animals, constructed with recommended fabrics and skills for this level. (This level includes bags with linings)

320 101 34__ Garment or outfit using plaids or directional print/nap: Machine or hand-sewn,

demonstrating successful matching of stripes/plaid or nap direction. Other skills must include one or more of the following: appropriate seam finishes for fabrics, matching fabric design, pressing, appropriate underlining, stay stitching, closures (zipper, buttons & buttonholes, hook & eye, etc.), trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, etc.

320 101 35__ Hand-sewn item: At least 50% or more of the item must be hand-sewn. Item demonstrating skills in assembling, hemming, and/or attaching closures (buttons, snaps, hook & eye, zipper) or embellishments using hand sewing techniques.

320 101 36__ Two-piece outfit constructed as a set: Same or coordinating fabrics and at least one closure such as zipper or buttons & button holes. Could include a jogging suit, pajamas, etc. Exhibit will demonstrate some of the following: appropriate seam finishes for fabric, fabric pattern or nap matching, pressing, appropriate facings, pockets, sleeves, darts, stay stitching, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, etc.

EXPANDING SKILLS LEVEL 4

At this level, the focus must be on improving skills learned in previous levels and follow the [4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders](#) recommendations for levels 6-9. Members must continue practicing basic skills and adapting those to new fabrics. Fabrics at this level include fabrics in previous levels, woven fabrics and/or knit fabrics, wool, and/or polar fleece; all fabrics may have bulk &/or any amount of stretch and slippery fabrics, fine or lightweight sheer fabrics, which require more care in handling or pattern selection (satin, chiffons, organdy, brocade, ripstop, dupion, crepe de chine, taffeta, velour, tulle, leather, suede, fake fur, and net).

320 101 41__ Garment or personal item: machine or hand sewn, successfully demonstrating skills from previous levels and at least one skill from this level.

320 101 42__ Tailored garment or outfit: made from woven fabric using traditional tailoring methods, interfacing, fusible, and non-fusible methods to create a tailored look.

320 101 43__ Formal garment or outfit: made from woven fabrics, including fine and lightweight fabrics which require more care in handling or pattern selection (such as satin, wool, dupion, crepe de chine, taffeta, velour, tulle, net, beaded or sequined fabrics, velvet, hand-woven, double cloth, lamé, leather, lace, silk, etc.

320 101 44__ Garment or outfit: Made from fabric specifically designed for **outerwear**, such as ripstop nylon, coated or uncoated outdoor fabrics.

320 10145__ Swimwear: Made from 4-way stretch fabrics (spandex, lycra, polyester, nylon, etc.) and demonstrating appropriate seam finishes, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, and additional skills in the sewing levels.

320 101 46__ Non-garment: Personal accessory, item for the home or for use in sports, picnics, camping, or with animals, or a toy, doll, or garments or accessories made for them made from any fabric; all fabrics used must be appropriate for this skill level.

HANDS FOR LARGER SERVICE (All skill levels)

This class is for members to share their learning and skills

with others. Create an item or garment that will be given away to someone, primarily someone in need.

320 300 10__ Hands for Larger Service

CREATIVITY (All skill levels)

The focus of this class is to use your sewing skills to alter an existing garment for fit or creativity. Exhibit can include an item or garment which has been enhanced through creative embellishment, fabric manipulation, or fabric creation; a recycled garment that has been altered for fit or creativity and therefore retains some seams/design of the original item as appropriate.

320 300 20__ Creativity

COSTUMES (All skill levels)

320 300 30__ Costumes: Costume for celebrations, holidays, theater, or other use. Must include sewing but may or may not also include other techniques in combination with sewing.

320 300 31__ Pet Costumes: Costumes specifically for pets to wear during celebrations, holidays, photo shoots, or themed events. Should include sewing as a primary technique, but may also incorporate other methods such as embellishment, or structural support for comfort and safety. Emphasis is placed on fit, durability, and pet-friendly materials to ensure ease of movement and well-being. **Photo(s) of pet in costume must be attached to exhibit to demonstrate fit.**

SKILLS NOTEBOOK (All skill levels)

Notebook displaying samples of new sewing techniques learned during the project year. Include five new samples from the options listed on the [Making a Skills Notebook factsheets 1-7 \(320-16-1 through 7\)](#).

- Each sample should include a complete explanation of the steps used for the construction process.

4-H FOOD AND NUTRITION

1. Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a Food and Nutrition project. Each member may enter up to **three** classes within the level they are in, with no more than **one** exhibit per class. All food entered must be made by the exhibitor.

2. Exhibit ingredients:

- Exhibits must be suitable for keeping at the fair without excessive spoilage or change of appearance. Highly perishable foods are not acceptable, including, but not limited to, cream cheese, custard fillings, and meats of any type.

- Ingredients that the 4-H member cannot legally purchase, such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc., may not be used in any recipe or food exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified. This includes menu and recipe file exhibits.
- Commercial mixes cannot be exhibited except as an ingredient in a product.

3. Preparation of exhibit:

- Exhibits must be displayed on a disposable plate and in a self-sealing bag.
- **Exhibits must include the recipe and a menu for one meal** including the food item (*exception: menu not required for cookies*). Recipes for food products should include all information given on the [Foods Exhibit Recipe Card \(511-00\)](#) format. The recipes may not be returned to the exhibitor.
- When alternative ingredients are used, these are to be underlined in the recipe.

5. The dough may be beaten or kneaded for a few strokes. **Exhibit three scones.** No frosting, icing, or glaze.

511 120 05__ Cookies: bars, slice-and bake, and shaped cookies reflecting alternative dietary choices. COOKING UP A CAREER (All skill levels)

511 200 02__ Cooking Up a Career. Find someone you know who works in a catering business, local restaurant, health care food service, food scientist, works as a Registered Dietitian, or any other food or nutrition-related industry. What do they do? How much education do they need? Why did they choose this profession? What is the most enjoyable thing about their chosen profession? Maximum of two pages, one sided write up of an interview. Consider creativity and neatness. Mount on a 9"x12" colored paper or poster board or display in a clear plastic binder. Include a picture of the person interviewed. (May be laminated to preserve exhibit.) The overall size of the mounted exhibit should be **no larger than 9x12 inches.**

FAVORITE RECIPE COLLECTION (All skill levels)

Recipe collection can be in a file box or in recipe book form. Follow specific guidelines on the evaluation sheet. 4-H FOOD PRESERVATION

Superintendent: Teres Fair

1. **Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a 4-H Food Preservation project.** Members may enter a total of **four** classes in their age division with up to **two** unique exhibits per class. Maximum of **eight** exhibits. All foods entered must be made by the exhibitor.

2. **Members must use recipes from a reputable food preservation source 2018 or newer and meet current USDA recommendations located at The National Center for Home Food Preservation (nchfp.uga.edu)**

3. All products must have a [4-H Food Preservation Explanation Card \(512-07\)](#) thoughtfully and completely filled out by the member with all information and complete instructions/recipe. Explanation cards are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or the state 4-H website.

4. All exhibits must have a label or tape with member **name, county, and exhibit class number** placed on the bottom of the container, so product is visible.

5. Include jar rings on all canned products to transport safely. Be sure all jars are properly sealed. Unsealed jars will be disqualified. For judging reasons, use clear jars only. Regular and wide-mouth Mason-type, threaded, home-canning jars with self-sealing lids are the best choice.

6. Jars may be opened during the judging process. For this reason, we strongly urge you to use small jars for your fair exhibits. Suggested are 4 oz. jars for jams and jellies, half pints & pint jars for other products. Larger jars will be accepted, but food may be wasted as any opened jars will be emptied after fair.

7. Dried foods should be exhibited in jars or sturdy plastic bags, with labels securely attached.

8. **Make sure to follow the approved processing times listed for your product.**

4-H WELDING

1. Exhibitors may enter up to **two** original exhibits with no more than **two** per class number. Projects or exhibits in

this class are designed for the demonstration of skills. Items can be a technical exhibit, or a practical exhibit, or an artistic exhibit. A technical project is a weld coupon showing welding technique.

2. The techniques used can include Shielded Metal Arc Welding/Stick, Gas Metal Arc Welding/MIG, Gas Tungsten Arc Gas Welding/TIG, Flux-cored Arc Welding, Oxy-fuel Welding.
3. Each exhibit must be labeled with the member's name, county, and exhibit class number. A completed [4-H Welding Explanation Card \(861-01\)](#) is required to qualify the exhibit for judging. 4-H AQUATIC ECOLOGY AND SPORTFISHING

Classes are open to all 4-H members, but members may only advance to the state level if enrolled in a 4-H Natural Science project.

AQUATIC MACRO-INVERTEBRATE SPECIMENS

Macro-invertebrates of all developmental stages serve as an energy source in freshwater (lakes, ponds, streams, rivers) fisheries. They include but are not limited to eggs, larvae, nymphs, scuds, leeches, stoneflies, caddis flies, mosquitoes, dragonflies, hellgrammites, etc.

1. Exhibits may include specimen photos or drawings of specimens that are displayed in a three-ring binder. Photos and drawings must be the original work of the exhibitor. Preserved specimens are to be displayed in

specimen jars in display boxes. Each specimen, including photos or drawings, requires a label to be affixed to the display box or page for easy reading. Labels (3/4"x1 1/2") on preserved specimens, photos or drawings are to include the name of the collector, date collected/photographed/drawn, order name, common name, name of body of water from which specimen was found, county, and state.

2. Phases are based on the number of specimens exhibited. Each collection is progressive. Exhibitors are expected to add 5 new preserved specimens, photographs, or drawings to their exhibit each year, in addition to those exhibited the previous year. Exhibitors are not able to combine preserved specimens, photographs, or drawings as a single exhibit.
3. The entries must be accompanied by a [4-H Aquatic Ecology & Sport Fishing Explanation Card \(451-07\)](#). Judging criteria are outlined on an [Aquatic Macro-invertebrates Score Sheet \(451-01\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, and the State 4-H website.

COMMON KNOTS

1. Knots are defined as those needed to secure the line from a reel to terminal tackle. They are limited to Arbor Knot, Blood Knot, Dropper Loop, Clinch or Improved Clinch Knot, Nail Knot, Palomar Knot, Perfection Loop, Rapala Knot, Snell Knot, Double Surgeon's, Surgeon's Loop, Trilene Knot, and Uni-Knot. Each knot must be represented in two mediums: large and normal scale. The large-scale knot must be tied using white cordage no smaller than 1/8" and no larger than 1/4" in diameter. The normal-scale knot is to be tied to a barbless hook using the appropriate material as it would be used in fishing (monofilament, Dacron backing, fly line, etc.)

Knots must be displayed on an 8.5" X 11" matte board and labeled with member's name, county, and class number.

FISHING RODS

1. Fishing rods must be constructed by the member and may not exceed 108" in length.
2. The rods must be displayed on a board no thicker than 1 inch, no wider than 8 inches, no longer than 120 inches (1" x 8" x 120" maximum). All necessary components must be labeled. Permanent or removable labels may be used.
3. The entries must be accompanied by a [4-H Aquatic Ecology & Sport Fishing Explanation Card \(451-07\)](#). Judging criteria are outlined on a [Fishing Rods Score Sheet \(451-06\)](#) available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, and the State 4-H website.

FLIES

1. Flies are defined as wet and dry. Dry flies are patterns used above the water line or in the surface film (e.g., adult insects, terrestrial insects, dry attractors, poppers, mouse, etc.). Wet flies are patterns used below the water line (e.g., nymphs, larvae, streamers, wet attractors, emergers, etc.). Materials (recipes) used may include but are not limited to hackle, lead wire, dubbing, hook, copper wire, flash, quill, floss, chenille, thread, and hair. Entries may include but not limited to:
 - **Low difficulty:** Wooly Worm, Wooly Bugger, Hare's Ear, Scud, Caddis Pupa, Girdle Bug
 - **Moderate difficulty:** Mickey Finn, Elk Hair Caddis, Bead Head Pheasant Tail, Parachute Adams
 - **High difficulty:** Royal Coachman, Grasshopper, Stone Fly, Blue Winged Olive, Green Drake.
2. Flies must be displayed on an 8.5" x 11" matte board. Exhibits are to be labeled to provide educational value to the public. Labels must include a title, the type of flies (wet or dry), and the name of each fly. Exhibit labels will be judged on the educational value, accuracy, completeness, clarity, and conciseness.
3. Entries must be accompanied by a [4-H Aquatic Ecology & Sport Fishing Explanation Card \(451-07\)](#). Judging criteria are outlined on a [Flies Score Sheet \(451-04\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, and the State 4-H website.

 - **Rooster Tails:** hook, blade, beads, feather skirt, hair skirt, rubber skirt, body, clevis, Colorado blade, willow blade.
 - **Jig:** eye, assorted jig lead head, hook, feathered skirt, fur skirt, hair skirt, rubber skirt.
 - **Plugs:** metal lip, hook hanger, eye, body, hooks, propellers, joined plug, plug lip.
 - **Spinner Bait:** fluted blade, hook, Colorado blade, clevis, arm, body, skirt, eye, twin arms, and blades.
2. Lures must be labeled and displayed on an 8.5"x11" matte board or foam.

PROJECT DISPLAY

1. The exhibit may be a poster or a three-dimensional display. Exhibits may include pictures, models, diagrams, and actual articles if they qualify for the safety standards listed below. Drawings or photos that are an essential part of the display should be firmly attached to the board. Loose materials like soil, bark, or sand must be displayed in closed containers. No books or notebooks will be accepted as part of the display. The following materials will not be allowed on the display for safety reasons:
 - Living organisms-plants or animals
 - Liquids
 - Aerosol bottles or other pressurized gases
 - Glass
 - Hazardous substances
 - Sharp items.
2. Each exhibit must have the member's name, county, and exhibit class number securely attached to it. All parts of the display should be attached to one another in some way to keep the exhibit together as a unit. Club exhibits are to be entered under the club's name but must include the names of all members and club volunteers. This may be on a separate paper securely attached to the back of the exhibit.
3. Single posters may be displayed by hanging. All other displays should be free standing. All information contained in the exhibit must be able to be viewed by the public by looking at the display. Sources must be listed on the front of the display. Display (all parts) should be able to last the duration of the fair in good repair.
4. Individual posters are limited in size to 30" by 24". Individual three-dimensional displays are limited in size to 48" wide, 24" deep (front to back), and 36" high. Club exhibits are limited in size to 60" wide, 24" deep, and 36" high. The weight of any display cannot exceed 30 pounds.
5. A [4-H Educational Display Exhibit Explanation Card \(000-01\)](#) must be attached to each exhibit. Judging criteria are outlined on the [4-H Educational Display Evaluation Sheet \(214-001\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website and the State 4-H website.

4. At least 10 insects of the total displayed in all other classes must be collected in the current year. For Second and Third year Junior exhibits indicate the 10 plus new insects collected in the current project year with an * or a small dot near the new insects. Intermediate and Senior members in any class are to number each new specimen in the collection. Write on the liner or attach a sticker next to each new insect indicating the specimen number. Old specimens are not numbered. Additional information and tips on preparing an insect display for fair are posted on the [Oregon 4-H Entomology web page](#) at Unit 4, Labeling and Displaying.
5. An [Information on New Insects in Collection for Current 4-H Project Year](#) sheet is required to be submitted with Intermediate and Senior insect collections. Follow all instructions on the sheet.
6. Judging will be based on condition of specimens, mounting, labeling, attractiveness, correct number of specimens, correct identification, and educational value of exhibit. Judging criteria are outlined on the [Entomology Exhibit Evaluation Sheet \(821-01\)](#), available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County

 - Rockets included in a static display must be shown without engines or igniters.
 - All parts of the rocket and their function must be identified.
 - Rocket components that must be included and labeled are: body tube, nose cone, engine hook, fins, recovery system (parachute), launch lug, engine mount, and shock cord.
 - On the display, list any items required to launch the rocket and their function, such as

the launch system, igniters, and recovery wadding.

- List the appropriate engine size(s) for your rocket and your level of experience.

5. Rocketry Exhibits are evaluated using the [4-H Aerospace-Rocketry Project Evaluation Sheet \(861-26\)](#).

Rocketry exhibits will be judged on the neatness of labels, workmanship, and completeness of your Rocketry Engineering Journal. A Rocketry Engineering Journal is required and must include additional elements as you advance through the stages, but all journals include:

- The date of each meeting, names of the people present and a record of what was done.
- Photos or illustrations of work in progress.

6. Value is placed on projects that can model the learning process or show how the exhibitor's skills have increased while completing the project.
7. **Members must identify a problem to solve or create a work application involving technology. Possible ideas might include applying existing software programs to a 4-H project area, composing music, developing a game, drawing landscape scenes, designing buildings, publishing club newsletters, creating a website, editing a video, working with photographs, etc.**
8. Online projects using Google applications or other Web 2.0 software are acceptable. Youth must make sure

clear directions are given in the project explanation so the judges can find and access the project online. Website exhibits must be viewable online or on a disc, CD, or flash drive.

9. Exhibits entered in the "Programming" class must be a program written, translated, or substantially (at least 30%) altered by the 4-H member. Members must submit a hard copy or flash drive for programs with excessive pages, such as GameMaker software and working files, so the judge can see the code. Submit a URL that points to the development software so it can be downloaded. If youth are submitting more than one exhibit or class using a disc, CD, or flash drive, each exhibit must be on a separate drive in a self-closing bag.

4-H ENGINEERING DESIGN

1. **Open to all 4-H members regardless of project enrollment.** The purpose of this type of exhibit is for members to communicate the processes and outcomes of solving an engineering problem. The display must include two parts: (1) an engineering notebook that details all seven of the Engineering Design Components listed below AND (2) an educational poster for display. Posters are limited in size to 30" x 24". A [4-H Educational Display Exhibit Card \(000-01\)](#) must be attached to the poster. Judging criteria are outlined on the [4-H Engineering Display Evaluation Sheet \(840-100\)](#).
2. Exhibits that include pictures, models, diagrams, and actual articles must meet the safety standards listed below. Drawings or photos that are an essential part of the display should be firmly attached to the board.

Drawings or photos are required for the build, test, and redesign report sections of the display. Loose materials like soil, bark, or sand must be displayed in closed containers. **The following materials will not be allowed on the display for safety reasons:**

- Living organisms- plants or animals
 - Any liquids
 - Aerosol bottles or other pressurized gases
 - Glass
 - Hazardous substances
 - Sharp items
3. Club exhibits are to be entered under the club's name and must include the names of all members and club volunteers. This may be on a separate paper securely attached to the back of the exhibit. A club exhibit will receive one ribbon per exhibit.
 4. Each piece of an exhibit must have the member's name, county, and class number securely attached to it. All parts of the display should be attached to one another in some way to keep the exhibit together as a unit. Single posters may be displayed by hanging or stapling to the wall. All other displays should be free-standing.
 6. The engineering notebook will be judged on readability, the inclusion of all seven of the required engineering design components and the [Engineering Display Component Check-Off Sheet](#) which must be included as the first page of the notebook. The poster must communicate the member's work on engineering design components #4 through #7. The poster text must be illustrated with drawings and/or photos.
 7. The poster will be judged on the inclusion of the required Engineering Design Components 4-7 and on readability, design, and workmanship.
 8. **Engineering Design Components** are as follows:
 - A **problem statement** or need and justification. What is the problem or need? Why is it important to solve?
 - **Background research:** Who are the users or customers? Are there existing solutions to similar problems? What design mistakes have been made in the past? Intermediate and Senior members must include a bibliography or list of citations for their research.
 - A list of your **proposed solutions** to the design problem based on your research. A minimum of two proposed solutions is required. Explain why you chose a design to test.
 - A plan or **design brief:** Plan and outline the process of building your prototype. The design brief defines materials needed, a sketch of the prototype, and a description of how the prototype will function.
 - A **build report:** List your building steps. List any new problems you encounter. Include drawings or photographs of your process.
 - A **test and redesign report:** List your testing and redesign steps. The engineering design process may involve many test versions to get to a final prototype. Include drawings or photographs of your process.
 - An explanation of how your final prototype **solves the original problem** or need. If you were unable to solve the problem or need, explain what else you think needs to be done to reach a solution.

List the steps you used to solve the problem or accomplish your task. What materials (software, books, online resources, kits) did you use? Explain your results and provide a thoughtful evaluation of the project. If you were to do it again, how/what would you do differently or how would you improve your project? Who was involved in this project? How did you come up with the idea for this project? What was the most difficult aspect of this project? See additional exhibit requirements for Robotics classes.

1. **Classes are open to all 4-H members.**

2. The exhibit may be a poster or a three-dimensional display. Individual three-dimensional exhibits are limited in size to 48" wide (measured when lying flat), 24" deep (front to back), and 36" high. Club exhibits are limited in size to 60" wide, 24" deep and 36" high. Posters are limited in size to 30" by 24".

3. The purpose of this type of exhibit is for members to communicate the processes and outcomes of a scientific investigation they design and conduct themselves.

The display must include:

- **Hypothesis:** a question or theory you want to test.
 - **Procedure:** a step-by-step investigative procedure (What was done?)
 - **Methods:** data collection or observation (How was it collected/observed)
 - **Report:** Data collected or observations made
 - **Analysis:** Analysis the data collected or observations made (How do you interpret the data and evidence?)
 - **Conclusion:** Address the original question or hypothesis. (Does the evidence support or refute your claim?)
4. Intermediates and Seniors must include data visualization like a data chart and a graph or other visualization of the data.
5. Exhibits may include pictures, models, diagrams, and actual articles if they meet the safety standards listed below. Drawings or photos that are an essential part of the display should be firmly attached to the board. Loose materials like soil, bark, or sand must be displayed in closed containers. **No books or notebooks will be accepted as part of the display. The following materials will not be allowed on the display for safety reasons:**
- **Living organisms- plants or animals**
 - **Any liquids**
 - **Aerosol bottles or other pressurized gases**
 - **Glass**
 - **Hazardous substances**
 - **Sharp items**
6. Display (all parts) should be able to last the duration of the fair in good repair. A [4-H Educational Display Exhibit Card \(000-01\)](#) must be attached to each exhibit. Judging criteria are outlined on the [4-H Science Investigation Display Evaluation Sheet \(840-100\)](#). Both are available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website or the State 4-H website.
7. Club exhibits are to be entered under the club's name but must include the names of all members and leaders. This may be on a separate paper securely attached to the back of the exhibit. Club exhibit will receive one ribbon per exhibit.
8. Each piece of an exhibit must have name, county, and exhibit class numbers securely attached to it. All parts of the display should be attached to one another in some way to keep the exhibit together as a unit. Single posters may be displayed by hanging or stapling to the wall. All other displays should be free standing. All information contained in the exhibit must be able to be viewed by the public by looking at the display.

4-H LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE

While showing, exhibitors should wear long pants and a short or long-sleeved button-up shirt, tucked in (small animal exhibitors must wear long-sleeved shirts). Sturdy shoes should be worn; no sandals, open-toed shoes, or flip-flops. Boots or firm-toed shoes are mandatory for showing beef and dairy cattle and are recommended for goats, sheep, and swine for safety reasons. If an exhibitor does not meet the minimum dress requirements, that exhibitor may not enter the show ring. While not competing remember that you are still representing 4-H at the fair and should be dressed appropriately. See 4-H project books for other dress requirements for specific species.

ANIMAL WELFARE AND TREATMENT POLICY

Exhibitors are expected to know and follow all Animal Science Rules and Health Requirements listed here and in other sections of the Exhibitors Guide.

Quality Assurance and Animal Welfare

- **Drug Abuse.** No illegal drug, off-label use of drugs (uses other than specifically allowed on the drug label), or other use of artificial means to alter the physical composition, appearance, or disposition of a project animal is permitted. Violators may face repercussions.
- **Physical Abuse.** No physical abuse of project

animals is permitted in any public or private setting. Physical abuse includes, but is not limited to, surgical or other physical alteration of animal appearance or practices resulting in bruising or injury from the showman. It also includes practices resulting in inordinate levels of shrink, fill, or animal stress other than routine management following acceptable industry animal husbandry practices, such as including appropriate amounts and methods of exercise and training. Violators may face repercussions.

EQUIPMENT

Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the way it is being used. Show Management reserves the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor.

LIVESTOCK RELEASE FROM GROUNDS

Breeding cattle, sheep, and goats may be removed on Friday afternoon between 3:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. A release form will be available in the livestock office and must be signed by the appropriate superintendent prior to removal. Animals released must be led off the premises for transportation.

HERDSMANSHIP

4-H herdsmanship is designed for 4-H members to learn skills in making a presentable exhibit for the public, as well as learn skills in teamwork, courtesy, cooperation, neatness, and proper care of animals. All members will be responsible for caring for their club's area in each barn. This is a mandatory activity that all clubs will participate in regardless of the number of pens. Please refer to the Superintendent and/or 4-H Faculty/Staff regarding details on this activity. Please refer to the barn superintendents for details regarding tack areas and standards.

JUDGING OF LIVESTOCK AND AWARDS

All classes may be broken down differently depending on numbers, exhibitors, and breeds present, with the superintendent and 4-H Staff approval. The judge's decision is final. A champion and reserve champion will be selected only when the judge deems there are entries of champion quality. These champions and, in some cases, reserve champions, will return to select the grand champion and/or a Supreme Female.
