# The 6 Basic Steps of FUNERAL PLANNING

## ① Choose a funeral home partner

Choosing a funeral home partner will make your entire planning process much easier. Look for funeral professionals who are caring, compassionate, knowledgeable, and committed to giving you all the information you need to make the right decisions for you and your family. Most people work with a funeral home that they are familiar with. ## Consider your family's needs

Next, it's time to consider the needs of your family following your loss. They will likely want to gather together, share a meal, recall memories, honor your life and legacy, and share pictures and stories. These are all natural and normal needs, and they can help loved ones come to terms with the loss, process their emotions, and receive love and support from their network of friends and extended family members.





### 3 Choose a disposition type


The next decision should be made in light of the needs of your family. Some people gravitate toward [cremation](#) because they think it's easier or more efficient. Some people dislike the idea of cremation and prefer [burial](#) instead. There is no right or wrong choice. The most important aspect of this decision is to make sure that no matter what disposition option you choose, your family's needs for "saying goodbye" are accounted for. This might include a private family viewing before cremation, a ceremony with the body present followed by cremation, or a combination of options.

## Choose options to personalize

To create a meaningful, healing, and personalized funeral, consider including the [seven elements of a funeral](#) (Music, Readings, Visitation/Reception, Eulogy/Remembrance, Symbols, Gathering, and Actions) and adding your own personal flair to each one.

For example, if you are a huge fan of big band music, include that style of music. If you enjoy a certain hobby, such as golfing, fishing, making quilts, or collecting a certain type of item, display symbols/items that remind your family of the things you enjoyed. If you want, you can even allow specific mourners to take an item home with them as a remembrance. You can brainstorm ideas for each of the categories to personalize every aspect of the service, if you wish.

# Choose a place of final rest

The next important decision to make is to [choose a permanent final resting place](#). Having a place of final rest allows friends, family, and future generations to have a place to come visit and reflect. This may be a burial plot, cremation niche, dedicated scattering garden, or mausoleum. Some families prefer to keep the cremated remains of a loved one at home for a time. This is perfectly fine – sometimes it's necessary to help process grief.



However, it is not a good long-term solution, especially after one generation. So, after a period of time has passed, usually a year, most families select a final resting place so that the cremated body is permanently placed where loved ones can visit for years to come.



## 6 Choose a method of payment

Finally, the last step is to make sure that the financial side of funeral planning is taken care of. There are several options for payment, including a dedicated [prepaid burial plan or trust](#), [life insurance policy](#), or a [final expense plan](#), but make sure you understand the pros and cons of each method before making a final decision.



# Funeral Planning CHECKLIST


Whew! Doesn't it feel better to have a few tips and tactics for successfully planning ahead for funeral wishes? Here's another tool for your toolkit: a Funeral Planning Checklist. This checklist will help you ask the right questions and cover all the necessary bases with a funeral professional so that your conversation is helpful and fruitful.

## Choose the type of disposition you'd like:

- Burial
- Cremation
- Green burial

## Choose the type of gathering, service, ceremony, or memorial you'd like to have:

- Visitation, viewing, wake, or rosary
- Celebration of life service personalized to reflect the life lived
- Traditional funeral service
- Graveside service or a service at the crematory
- Memorial service
- Home funeral service and/or burial
- Green or eco-friendly funeral service
- Scattering ceremony
- Family gathering
- Reception or fellowship meal



### Choose options to personalize your event:

- Location that reflects your interests
- Speaker such as a clergy member or funeral celebrant
- Pallbearers, eulogist, assistants, and attendees
- Catered or potluck meal
- Prayers, poems, or other readings
- Songs and hymns, live or recorded
- Memorial video set to special music
- Memorial monument or virtual memorials, such as a grave marker, headstone, video tribute, or online memorial website
- Memorial contributions to charity organizations

### Choose the place of final rest:

- Burial in a private cemetery, veterans cemetery, or on private property
- Designate a place to scatter the cremated body
- Keepsake jewelry, such as cremation jewelry

### Choose a method of payment:

- Prepaid funeral policy, life insurance, final expense policy, personal account, pay-on-death account, credit card, funeral loan, or crowdfunding website

### To assist loved ones when planning ahead:

- Collect important documents and notify your next of kin about where they are held.
- Store a copy of your will, marriage and birth certificates, veteran's discharge papers, military service records, life and health insurance policies, social security information, and other estate planning documents where your next of kin can easily find them.
- Write your own obituary or gather important biographical information for your obituary.
- Keep a copy of your funeral plans on file with a funeral provider, and notify at least two other emergency contacts of where your funeral will be held and where your final wishes are recorded.
