# Stand with Mengo: Help Us Keep Lifesaving HIV Care Alive in Uganda

Uganda has made remarkable progress in combating HIV/AIDS, achieving significant reductions in new infections and deaths. Uganda's HIV/AIDS response, which currently treats approximately 1.2 million people, is highly reliant on external funding, with donors contributing about 60% of the total cost. However, recent disruptions to funding and services, according to UNAIDS and new reports, threaten to undo these gains. Recent funding cuts of 31.5% have already led to disruptions in the supply of essential medications and a reduction in the capacity of health facilities. This has resulted in:

- ➤ Interruptions in ART supply: Potentially leading to treatment failure, drug resistance, and increased transmission.
- ➤ Reduced access to testing and care: Especially for vulnerable populations like youth and key populations, impacting early diagnosis and treatment initiation.
- ➤ Strain on health
  workforce and systems:
  Contributing to staff
  layoffs, termination of
  benefits and increased
  workload for remaining
  healthcare workers.
- ➤ Increased advanced HIV disease cases: As fewer individuals present for early care.

Clinic in Uganda has been helping people with critical HIV prevention, anti-viral therapy and TB treatment since 1988. It is one of Africa's leading HIV clinics and has played a vital role in curbing the AIDS epidemic. The Mengo Clinic has virtually eliminated mother-tochild transmission, and clinic staff now care for more than 9,000 children, adolescents and adults who are living with HIV. Innovative workplace programs have helped reach underserved male

Now the clinic's life-saving services are threatened by US funding cuts. US funding cuts now threaten all this progress. Already Mengo, like many clinics across Africa, has been forced to lay off staff and reduce community outreach. This jeopardizes access to life-saving medications, laboratory services and critical care. Thousands are at risk of treatment interruption -- and increased

Private sector donations play a vital role in strengthening Uganda's health sector, especially given the challenges of limited government funding and potentially dwindling donor support. Christ Church has been supporting Mengo Hospital for over 40 years and its HIV clinic for 25 years. The Friends of Mengo group is

working to provide bridge funding for the Clinic until a new, more permanent funding mechanism can be identified.

Considering the chronic underfunding of Uganda's health system and the anticipated decline in external aid, private sector and philanthropic contributions are indispensable. They not only provide immediate, life-saving benefits but also help lay the groundwork for a more resilient, equitable, system. These efforts are essential as Uganda works toward Universal Health Coverage and strives to reduce outof-pocket costs for its most vulnerable populations.

As a community of faith, we believe it is our calling to act on Jesus's word by supporting the Mengo clinic and the people it serves. We have set a fundraising goal of \$50,000 for the year ahead with the kickoff of our 2025 Mengo Raffle with 12 incredible prizes.

For many years Christ Church has brought monthly fun and fellowship to the residents of the Ladrey Senior Highrise on 300 Wythe Street in Old Town with a rollicking evening of monthly bingo.

For those of you who are unfamiliar, the Ladrey Senior Highrise is an 11-story building with 170 units owned and operated by Alexandria Redevelopment Housing Authority (ARHA). It houses primarily lowincome seniors, and people with disabilities. The building is in poor condition and is, finally, scheduled to be torn down later this year. Senior residents will be the first to move to a nearby building that is modern and still affordable.

Saying goodbye to a ministry is hard; even harder when you have been coordinating it for 20 years. As with any ministry, times change, needs change and we change. The Ladrey Bingo Ministry was started in the late 1990's and flourished under different parishioners' leadership (the Whites and Burchell's). Trish Fineran and Nick Wasilewski happened

upon Ladrey Bingo in 2005 when their 16-year-old son needed community service hours. They never anticipated that a 24hour community service commitment would last 20 years! It turns out inviting friends and neighbors as well as fellow parishioners to join them. Over the years, the bingo prizes evolved from mainly canned food to needed items like toilet paper, paper towels, personal it a success. Nick was known for his incredible humor, joke and story-telling skills, which made the residents feel more relaxed and comfortable. But the contact didn't end there; they would visit Ladrey residents in hospital, rehabilitation centers, celebrate birthdays, as well as attend memorial services. We became friends.

After Nick passed suddenly at the end of 2022, Trish continued to lead Ladrey Bingo as part of his legacy with the help of Andrea McNicholas and parish and community members. Today, with the building closing, the residents moving, and a 20-year commitment to this ministry, Trish is ready for a new chapter and delighted to note that the residents are excited about continuing it on their own in the new facility! We thank Trish for her incredible passion and love for the residents of Ladrey.


