Homily of the Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Weer-

Go and Do Likewise

Many of us come to church and read the Word of God. However, there exists a big difference between those who go to church to fulfill religious obligation and those transformed by the Gospel. While the transformed have internalized the Gospel and use it to gauge their lifestyles, others disregard the Word of God when challenged by the daily events of their lives. What matters is the impact of the Gospel in our lives and the fruits we bear. Nominal Christians need to allow the Gospel to influence their lives and transform them.

The need for us to allow the Word of God to transform our lives cannot be overemphasized. The first reading from Deuteronomy 30: 10-14 emphasizes the transforming power of God's Word when internalized. Moses enjoins the people of Israel to harken to the Word and to return to God with all their hearts. They are also to keep God's Commandments written in their hearts. The Law of God is now ingrained in the people's conscience.

The Gospel from Luke 10: 25-37 gives an account of three people- a priest, the Levite, and the Samaritan at different spiritual ladders. Social standing and offices do not count much in our relationship with God. It is the sensitivity or otherwise of the conscience to the moral precepts of the Lord that counts. Our reactions in moments of human need show to what degree we belong to God.

Everybody expects the priest and the Levite to do proper thing always. Unfortunately, hampered by the Jewish Laws, they proved not to know who God is and what he wants. Despite their religious roles, they failed woefully because they were insensitive. They failed to show compassion and help a man who had been beaten and robbed. They lacked empathy because they were concerned about ritual purity from touching a dead or dying person and personal safety. Their conscience seems dead. They do the work of God and do not know the God of their work.

Some of the practices of the Old Testament morality are deficient in many ways. Leviticus 21:1-3 gives specific and explicit instructions for touching a dead person. We know better now in the New Testament. Jesus frequently touched the sick and even the dead. Emphasis now shifts from ritual purity to spiritual purity. Love and compassion are not hindered by contact with death. Equally, the preservation of human life ought to override any religious consideration.

How does today's Gospel impact us? What shall we go home with from this homily? Appearance is not reality. Reflecting on the hiatus between the offices of the priest and the Levite, and the way they reacted, people behave differently from the way they appear. We should not judge a book by its cover. We should transcend appearance to reality in our assessment of people.

The two questions asked by the lawyer in the Gospel remain very relevant in our time. What shall I do to go to heaven? This is an interesting question and gets to the heart of Christianity. Being preoccupied with how to make it to heaven is having a heavenly mindset. Let us look beyond the world and think of what our end will be. Let us ask ourselves whether the lifestyles we live in our comfort zones shall lead us to heaven or not

Who are our neighbors? Who do you think is your neighbor? The parable of Jesus challenges the limited understanding of who a neighbor is. A neighbor goes beyond people we share a blood relationship with. Neighborhood goes beyond geographical contiguity. It extends to anyone in need, regardless of background and social standing.

True religion involves practical action. Let us decide here and now what to do to show the faith we possess. We can invest our time, talent, and resources for the sake of others. Let us be compassionate towards others. Corporal and Spiritual works of mercy remain part of the deposit of our faith. Let us feed the poor, give drinks to the thirsty, clothe the naked, and shelter the homeless. We must feed the poor, visit the sick, the imprisoned, and bury the dead. We ought to counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, comfort the sorrowful, forgive injuries, bear wrongs patiently, and pray for the living and the dead.

The unnamed man who fell victim to robbers missed his way. To leave Jerusalem and proceed to Jericho is to leave God's presence. It means leaving a place of peace for a place of confusion. Let us always remain in God's presence. We must also offer help to those who make bad choices in their life as the good Samaritan did. Let us not behave like the unnamed man, the priest, and the Levite.

May we treat others with mercy. Blessed are the merciful; they shall obtain mercy. The Lord will rescue us in our own need. We shall live because we empathize with others in difficult situations. The measure we give shall be given to us. As we go and do to others what the Good Samaritan did, God will be pleased with us as he was pleased with Jesus in the second reading. Peace be with you.
