

# FY 2025 COC NOFO TIPS SHEET FOR PROJECT APPLICANTS

#### **UNDERSTAND THE FY25 NOFO GUIDELINES**

- Read the NOFO Carefully: Focus on specific language regarding treatment and recovery, reducing unsheltered homelessness, reducing returns to homelessness, and increasing earned income.
- **Board Engagement**: Ensure your board and stakeholders understand and support new projects in alignment with HUD priorities.
- **Deadline Discipline**: Submit all components by HUD and CoC deadlines. Late applications are disqualified without exception.

#### **TARGET HUD'S FY25 PRIORITIES**

HUD's FY25 CoC NOFO will emphasize:

- Projects serving unsheltered populations, including new street outreach efforts.
- Treatment and recovery integration, including behavioral health and substance use services.
- Supportive housing and transitional housing (TH considered for strategic populations).
- Reducing returns to homelessness through longer-term support models.
- Increasing earned income through employment-focused services and partnerships.
- Project effectiveness and outcomes over service volume.

# **CHECK ELIGIBILITY & MATCH REQUIREMENTS**

- Confirm Eligibility: Use the FY25 NOFO and local CoC policy to ensure compliance with project type, population served, and HMIS participation.
- Required Match: Be ready to document 25% match (cash or in-kind) per 24 CFR 578.73, with amounts, sources, and commitments.
- **System Contribution**: Be clear on how your project will reduce homelessness and improve system-wide performance (SPMs).

#### **DETAIL YOUR BUDGET & LEVERAGE**



- Accuracy Matters: Ensure budget categories align with 2 CFR Part 200 (Uniform Guidance) and CoC Program allowable costs.
- Leverage Matters: HUD expects clear documentation of additional resources, such as healthcare, workforce services, or local government commitments.

## PREPARE FOR DATA REPORTING

- **Use Updated HMIS Standards**: Align with FY2024 CSV updates (e.g., new CEParticipation.csv, enhanced race/gender fields, tracking of subsidies).
- Track Key Outcomes:
  - Housing move-in rates
  - Length of time homeless
  - Employment status changes
  - o Income growth
- Data Quality: Validate all HMIS exports, APRs, and SPM submissions.

#### **MAXIMIZE CROSS-SECTOR COLLABORATION**

- Partner with Mainstream Systems:
  - Healthcare (e.g., Medicaid, behavioral health providers)
  - Workforce (WIOA providers, job training, employers)
  - Transitional systems (jail, hospitals, child welfare)
- MOUs & Letters of Support: Get documentation on letterhead with scope and resource commitments.

# **DOCUMENTATION & NARRATIVE TIPS**

- Answer All Parts of Every Question: HUD reviewers deduct points for incomplete or unclear responses.
- **Use Evidence-Based Statements**: Reference past project outcomes, SPMs, and gaps identified in Stella P/M.
- Use Precise Language: Be concise and targeted. Avoid filler or unsupported claims.

## FOR RENEWAL PROJECTS



- **Clearly State Changes**: HUD expects you to show what's improved staffing, partnerships, outcomes, or targeting.
- Explain Budget Modifications: Especially if switching cost categories or reallocating units/resources.

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## PREPARE FOR PRESENTATIONS

- Presentation-Ready Materials: Have a clear, compelling 5-minute overview and optional slide deck.
- Focus on Impact: Explain who you serve, what you've accomplished, and how FY25 funding will deepen
  results

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE BEST PRACTICES**

- Internal Review: Multiple team members should review for clarity, compliance, and typos.
- Follow Up with CoC Lead: Ensure everything was received and reviewed prior to final submission.
- Review Past Feedback: Incorporate prior scoring and HUD TA into your improvements.

#### **CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT**

- Build Staff Capacity: Train your team on NOFO reading, application prep, and HMIS data use.
- **Improve Throughout the Year**: Use SPM dashboards, Stella reports, and community needs assessments to refine projects year-round.

By tailoring your responses to HUD's clearly stated FY25 NOFO direction — especially the emphasis on unsheltered homelessness, recovery services, earned income, and system-level performance — you position your project for competitive success.
