Garden to Attract Bird/Butterflies Teri Brockway

April Program



Florida Master Gardener Teri Brockway will be the featured speaker at the Sun City Audubon Club's April 1st meeting in the Florida Room at the Atrium Building. Her presentation will be about "Attracting Birds and Butterflies" in our area of Hillsborough County.

Teri received her certification as a Master Gardener from the University of Florida in 2017. She has been a gardening aficionado since she was a young girl growing up near Buffalo, NY. She has lived in Florida for 23 years and been a Sun City Center resident since 2004. She is a member of the SCC Audubon Club and is past president of the Elegant Gardener's Club here as well.

Most residential landscapers prefer to plant trees, shrubs and flowers that are not indigenous to Florida. "Our native plants are not showy or as beautiful as the more colorful flora from Asia, Africa, or South America," Brockway said. "Native plants are grown in our yards more for their benefit to sustain Florida wildlife and the environment."

The SCC Audubon Club's April meeting is scheduled from 9:15am to 11:30am. Refreshments will be served and socializing encouraged prior to Teri's lecture at 10am.

Brockway's presentation and attendance at the meeting are limited to SCC Community Association members and residents of Freedom Plaza, Aston Gardens and Kins Point Gold Card Holders.

News from our Master Birder

Ray Webb

Our March field trip was very popular, as 22 people joined us at Sweet Bay Nursery in Parrish. Tom Heitzman led us around his 24-acre facility. We saw lots of birds and learned about the nursery's native plants. Tom maintains a bird feeder behind the office; we were delighted to see several painted and indigo buntings there! Afterwards, 13 of us enjoyed a luncheon at Butterfield's Family Restaurant, also in Parrish.

Our next and last regular season field trip will be on April 19, to Fort Desoto County Park in Pinellas County. This trip coincides with the peak of spring bird migration. We should see a lot of colorful songbirds in the park. You can sign up for the trip at our April 1 membership meeting, or on our website at sccaudubonclub.com.

We will have field trips throughout the summer as well; plans for these are in progress. The May trip will be to Snook Haven barbecue restaurant in Venice and includes entertainment and a boat ride with Logan River Tours, on site. We plan to visit Latitudes Tours in Ruskin for a boat ride in June, and to visit the Tampa History Museum in July. please visit our website for updates on all our summer trips, and to sign up for them.

SCC AUDUBON CLUB EARTH DAY FESTIVITIES Friday, April 21, 2023 *"Special Edition"*

The Sun City Center Audubon Club will host its third annual Earth Day festivities at its Nature Trails Preserve Friday, April 21 from 9am to 12 noon. The event will be open only to residents of Sun City Center and Kings Point. This year's local event takes place one day before the nationally recognized Earth Day Celebration on April 22nd.

The club's Nature Trail entrance is located at 1624 West Del Webb Blvd., between Seton Hall and Vincennes Drives. A large sign identifying the Trail sits to the west of the boulevard, in an open space between two private residences.

The highlight of Friday's event will include several different guided nature walks through the preserve by noted club naturalists. Registration for the interpretive walks begins at 8:30am.

Club Master Birder Ray Webb will lead interested guests at 8:45, 9:45 and 10:45. Ray has been an avid birder all his life. He has been active with the Audubon Society in his home state of New Jersey and joined Tampa Audubon and the Sun City Center club, after he moved to Florida in 1990. Ray has identified more than 100 species of woodland species of birds along the trail. During the 45-minute walks, he will discuss the birds that are usually found in various nearby habitats.

If you are more interested in insects and plants that line the pathways in the preserve, you will want to sign up for Naturalist and acclaimed Nature Photographer John Lampkin's interpretive tour. His guided walks are scheduled for 9, 10 and 11am. John has contributed numerous photographs and articles to many field guides, books and journals, websites and blogs. In 2020, he won the "American Butterflies" Magazine photo contest. Along the pathways of our local Nature Trail, John has photo documented 50 species of butterflies, 40 species of dragonflies and 276 plants. Some of the insects and flora are so small, they are nearly invisible to the untrained eye. To give visitors a clearer perspective of the SCC Nature Trail, Florida Master Naturalist Melanie Higgins will describe the history of this pristine oasis in the middle of Sun City Center, the Audubon Club's involvement in it and its value to the local community. Her discussion will be shared at 9:15, 10:15 and 11:15. Melanie has been a Floridian for thirty years and has been an avid wildlife enthusiast and educator. She is chairperson of the club's Blue Bird Project in SCC. She has traveled all over the world and recently returned from a Photo Safari in Africa.



After signing up for a Nature Trail tour, complimentary "healthy snacks" including a beverage and fruit will be offered to everyone, by the Sun City Center Community Association. SCC Manager Lyn Reitz personally coordinates this generous donation to the club's annual affair.

Earth Day Raffle tickets will be sold at the SCC Audubon Club's April 1st meeting and at the local celebration on Friday, April 21st. The Sweet Bay Nursery in Parrish and the Keep It Green Nursery in Apollo Beach have generously donated several plants for the raffle. Audubon Club members donated three beautifully themed baskets full of surprises, which will also be raffled off. The baskets will include "Gardening is Growing," "Coffee, Tea, You and Me," and another basket of "Everything's Fine With Wine."

A sanitary "Port-a-Potty" will also be available for everyone's convenience outside the preserve entrance.

While you are enjoying the peace and solitude of the trail's small slice of wild Florida, be sure to keep your eyes and ears open for a nearby nesting pair of Ospreys. Their nest sits atop a pole donated by Florida Power and Light and sits just outside the Nature Trail entrance. The birds don't look that big from the ground. But, adult "Fish Hawks" have a 5–6-foot wingspan. And their chicks are very loud and always hungry.

In addition to the guided tours of the preserve's pathways, guests will be among the first visitors to see and experience the new Trail Markers to keep everyone on track. The trail signs are color coded, and easy to see and follow. Even though the looping trail is only 0.7 of a mile long, it was easy to get disoriented with the earlier direction signs. A new color-coded map is in the offing to help make traversing the trail easier and more pleasurable. There are also park benches located along the route, for visitors to sit and enjoy the solitude and wildlife.

The Audubon Club is delighted to have been able to partner with the SCC Men's Club and the Community Association Board of Directors, in order to obtain the sign posts, graphics and related improvements for the trail. Both associations donated funds to cover the cost of materials and labor for the signs and posts. A Trail Camera or two are planned to be added in the future, to document what birds and other wildlife are visiting the preserve.

The late Wisconsin Democratic U.S. Senator, Gaylord Nelson, created Earth Day in the Spring of 1970. It was a time when there was no EPA, no Clean Air Act and no Clean Water Act. Before he took a stand on environmental activism, there was no governmental regulatory mechanism to help protect the myriad of environmental issues facing the nation at that time.

Today, more than a billion Earth Day participants in more than 193 countries help highlight the problems and dangers that the planet still faces. Illegal clear cutting of forests in the Amazon and dumping toxic waste into the world's rivers and oceans are just a few of the issues that are still a major threat to all life on Planet Earth.



The SCC Audubon Club, the Community Association, Men's Club, and other local organizations are all contributing to ensuring that this year's local Earth Day activities focus on those environmental concerns.

The SCC Nature Trail encompasses close to 16 acres of pine forests, flatwoods, hardwood hammocks, small wetland meadows and a cypress swamp. The current groomed Nature Trail sits on the south side of a storm water canal, that bisects the entire preserve. This small waterway is home to turtles, fish and an alligator or two. An Anhinga was seen drying its feathers on a low branch jutting over the water not too long ago. And, in the sky above the preserve, a bald eagle and a couple of red shouldered hawks were also spotted soaring above the preserve.

A SCC Community Association maintenance crew periodically grooms the walking paths on the southern end of the Nature Trail. There is very limited Golf Cart Parking at the Trail Head. All visitors should plan to park on West Del Webb Boulevard.
