



News from our Master Birder Ray Webb

It's late February, and we are technically in the heart of winter. You wouldn't know it lately if you stuck your head outdoors; it seems more like May. Fine by me! The days are getting longer, and the early spring bird migrants are arriving; already here are the purple martins, the first birds of the year to return.

Two weeks ago, when I did a walk at the West Campus Nature Trail, there was little bird song, and no northern parula warblers. Two days ago, the place rang with bird song everywhere. I found EIGHT parulas, all happily singing their heads off. Their arrival is right on schedule. Another February migrant, the red-eyed vireo, is so far absent. This is the most abundant breeding bird in North American hardwood forests in summer, including here in Florida; On the other hand, on our field trip to Myakka River State Park on February 22, our group saw a swallow-tailed kite, typically a March migrant.

Soon to arrive will be great crested flycatchers, which will nest here in Sun City Center. Also, we will see the beginning of the major spring migration in coastal locations, with waterthrushes, hooded warblers and orchard orioles at the vanguard of the season.

Trail Blazing

"What's shakin' on the SCC Nature Trails?" If you ask one of our native bees, the answer might be Pale Meadow Beauty, a stunning wildflower that populates grassy pockets among the pines and saw palmetto.

The vibrant purples and yellows are visually stunning and presumably a strong attractor to pollinators, but it's all looks and little show because when a bee visits, there is no nectar to be found! And the pollen is released only if the bee knows how to "buzz pollinate" the blooms. Non-native honeybees don't know the trick, but our native bumble bees do—as in my photograph above, they grasp the anthers and vibrate their flight muscles. A Harvard researcher recorded the average resultant buzz at near the pitch of C# above middle C which is 277 cycles per second. The vibrations shake the flower, and the pollen flies out of a tiny pore at the tip of the anther, ready for mama bumble bee to pack it for a return trip to the nest where it becomes bumblebee baby food. If she stops at another Meadow Beauty, some of the pollen will likely stick to the receptive stigma, the female organ, thus fertilizing the plant.

Some plants are extraordinarily generous with their pollen. For example, in spring our cars turn yellow if we park near an oak tree because oaks primarily rely on the wind to pollinate and only a tiny fraction of the pollen reaches a target stigma. Such pollen has near zero nutritive value. An insect could lick a thousand bumpers and hoods and still starve to death! However, the pollen of plants like our Meadow Beauty is comparatively nutrient-rich and represents considerable investment of the plant's resources. It makes perfect sense that they have evolved the trick of bestowing access to only those pollinators that know the "buzz" and stand a good chance of fertilizing that stunning Meadow Beauty next door.

Come see what else is shakin' on the SCC Nature Trails! The trailhead is located opposite North Lake on Del Webb West between Vincennes and Seton Hall. John Lampkin leads walks on the first Tuesday of each month at 9 am, or by appointment.

Protecting the Florida Scrub Jay Topic of March Meeting



The Florida Scrub Jay, a unique species for our state, is under threat – including at Oscar Scherer State Park's 462-acre refuge. Our next program, scheduled for Saturday, March 5, will focus on these iconic birds. You will hear about ongoing efforts to protect and expand the population of Scrub Jays from the Oscar Scherer State Park Manager, Matthew Kruse.

Join us for an overview of this blue-and-gray bird's behaviors, life cycle and dependence on a specialized habitat of low-growing oak shrubs (scrubby flatwoods). Learn about the importance of prescribed burns to maintain the jays' environment and find out how you can "adopt" a Scrub Jay.

The meeting will be held in the Florida Room beginning at 9:15 a.m. with socializing and refreshments. Please bring your own coffee mug. The business meeting will start at 10 a.m., followed by Matt's presentation.
