Attendance was up 35% over 2021, and the number of tours offered increased fourfold. The weather was beautiful, and set-up was completed by 8:30 AM. Nature experts John, Melanie, and Steve each led multiple 45-minute, small group tours, aided by timed tickets issued at the registration tent. The CA provided fruit, water and snacks, and other freebies were available as well. Folks browsed items for sale, filled in Club Registrations, and visited the raffle ticket table featuring numerous plants. Combined with monies received in the donation jar, our Club has raised the amount needed for the new Osprey **Pole**, which will be installed sometime in June. (More details to follow.) An Earth Day Committee Luncheon Meeting was held at Fiore's Restaurant on Thursday, April 28th from 11:45 AM until 1:45 PM. The purpose of the gathering was to discuss the recent Earth Day event while it was still fresh in our memories. A total of 29 Earth Day volunteers were invited with 5 days notice, and 75% provided input! Amazing! 15 volunteers attended, and emailed suggestions were received from 7 folks unable to attend!

SURVEY RESULTS 04/27/22

SCC Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC)

If you recall, the SCC Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) was formed this past Spring to study and make recommendations to the SCCCA Board on how to spend millions of dollars (already in the bank!) to improve Sun City Center.

Over the past couple of months, many of you as SCC Audubon Club members have "voted" for TRAILS on the LRPC surveys. It makes sense. WHY? Because for 6 years, our SCC Audubon Club has faithfully partnered with the SCCCA Board of Directors to care for, improve, and preserve the SCC Nature Trails. Our Club Conservation Committee was formed specifically to deal with the SCC Nature Trails and our cooperation with the SCCCA Board. Our SCC Audubon Club is the leading organization in Sun City Center that has invested considerable time, money and effort into the Nature Trails tract, including trail building and maintenance, signage, fire suppression, canal maintenance, the erection of a new Osprey Pole, and the hosting of an annual Earth Day Celebration for the SCC Community.

Soooo, did *your vote* on these surveys matter? *You bet it did!*

The results of the Second LRPC Poll are dated April 27th, and were released on the LRPC site on Monday, May 2nd. The results follow:

The Top Ten Results from the second survey are:

- 1. New bar/dining area
- 2. Landscaping and beautification throughout the community
- 3. Walking trails/green space
- 4. Additional pool (resort style)
- 5. Rebuild or complete renovation of Rollins Building
- 6. Outdoor covered pavilion
- 7. New building/club space
- 8. Outdoor music venue
- 9. Land acquisition
- 10. Additional pickle ball courts

WOW! The above list contains many worthy ideas to improve our community. The competition is keen. Being included on such a list is an accomplishment... However achieving the #3 position is like being a Bronze Medalist in the Olympics! It's a broad acknowledgement of the growing importance of trails.

Thank you for being an SCC Audubon Club member, AND for your vote to raise awareness of the importance of the SCC Nature Trails and all trails.

Trail Blazing

"Oh, no! It's a SNAKE! Run!"



A Spicebush Swallowtail caterpillar mimics a snake as it munches away inside of its self-constructed leaf shelter.

That might be the reaction of a lizard or bird hunting for a meal among the foliage, and for sure this deception has saved the life of many a defenseless Spicebush Swallowtail caterpillar. Those ferocious false eyespots aren't real, the true eyes are but tiny spots next to the mouth. Caterpillars are non-stop eating machines and since the mother butterfly laid her eggs on the appropriate host plant, the hatchlings have no need for eyes to look for anything—their food is right in front of their proverbial noses, which they don't have either!

The stages of butterfly caterpillars are called instars, and when the caterpillar outgrows its skin, the skin splits and the next instar emerges, often bearing little resemblance to its former form. Indeed, when spotted on the SCC Nature Trails by an alert participant in our monthly guided walks, the early instar looked like a rather unpleasant gift from a bird, something you would scrape off the bottom of your shoe. Eventually though, the last instar will molt one last time and form a chrysalis where the caterpillar will reinvent itself and emerge as a spectacular butterfly.

When we see scary critters like this on the SCC West Campus Nature Trails, we run! Not away, but closer to get a better look!

The trailhead is located opposite North Lake on Del Webb West between Vincennes and Seton Hall. John Lampkin leads walks on the first Tuesday of each month at 9 am, or by appointment. BTW, today's column is a milestone, #50!
