Raptors and Rodenticides Nov. 5th Meeting

Rat poison and other rodenticides can have unintended consequences. Not only do raptors like owls and hawks become sick from preying on rodents that have eaten poisoned bait but reducing raptor numbers allows rodent populations to rebound.

Learn about the dangers of using anticoagulant rodenticides by attending the November 5 meeting. Our guest speaker, Fairl Thomas, is a wildlife rescuer and avian researcher. She will discuss the importance of protecting raptors – rodents' natural predators – from poison exposure so they can help keep rat and mouse numbers in check. Fairl will provide practical tips for safely rodent proofing your home.

After graduating from Eckerd College in 2021 with a double major in Environmental Studies and Animal Studies, and a minor in Biology, Fairl started her career at Homosassa Springs State Wildlife Park as an animal care specialist. She has been involved in wildlife rescue for many years and began officially working with Birds In Helping Hands in 2017.

The meeting will be held in the Florida Room beginning at 9:15 a.m. with socializing and refreshments. Please bring your own coffee mug. The business meeting will start at 10 a.m., followed by the presentation.

....and the drama continues Bluebirds

This year, 2022, marks our sixth season of monitoring the twenty-five bluebird boxes on the SCC Audubon Bluebird Trail and every year brings new insights into the lives of these iconic birds. Distilling the data shows the following results. Of the 25 boxes, 4 were not used at all. The remaining 21 boxes produced 40 nests and 121 bluebirds were fledged from those 40 nests.

But this doesn't tell the whole story. This year several nest boxes were plagued by sparrows harassing and even killing fledglings. This is an ongoing problem and so far we haven't found a reliable method to keep sparrows away from our bluebird boxes. One thing we noticed in the past was that placing bird seed feeders (especially with millet) near bluebird boxes actually attracts house sparrows, so we always advise, feeders and bluebirds don't mix. During the breeding season especially, bluebirds are insectivores, so they will mostly ignore seed feeders.

This year there was an inordinate amount of unhatched, presumed not viable, eggs. One bird laid an extraordinary 19 eggs, attempted to incubate the second clutch of 8 eggs and ultimately NO eggs hatched.

So we continue to watch our bluebird friends and look forward to another successful season next year.

Phone number

The area where it is located

Since time is of the essence, please do not use the email or use the contact form for injured wildlife. Please keep in mind we do not rescue domestic animals or relocate wildlife that is healthy.

When you find orphaned or injured wildlife, it is tempting to pick it up. **Don't!**Many times orphaned wildlife is perfectly capable of finding their own way home.

In the spring, many animals are learning to leave the nest and do not need help. If the animal is obviously injured, bleeding, or there is a dead parent nearby, be sure to call your nearest wildlife rehab. 813-598-5926

Living in Florida with Alligators

Florida has 1.3 million alligators. You'll find them anywhere there's standing water.

How to live safely with them. You're urged to swim only in designated areas and during daylight hours, to keep your pet on a leash and away from the water, and to **never**, **ever feed the alligators**. Bites occur when people don't pay attention to their surroundings near water.

If you encounter an alligator whose behavior poses a threat to people, pets or property, call the Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866-FWCGATOR (866-392-4286). **Nuisance alligators are killed, not relocated.**
