What the Sabbath Means for Christians

The Sabbath has its roots deep in the Old Testament. The core idea of the word "sabbath" is "rest." The Hebrew word for the Sabbath comes from a verb that means to cease, come to a halt, to stop doing something. At the beginning of Genesis 2, we are told that God completed all the work he had set out to do in the first six days of creation, "so on the seventh day he rested from all his work" (Gen. 2:2). God ceased from the work of creation and refrained from doing any work on the seventh day. For this reason, we are told, God set apart the seventh day as the Sabbath, the day of rest, and made it a holy day (Gen. 2:3-4). The precedent that God set by his own course of action in the creation week becomes the pattern for Israel's work week and a sign of Israel's covenant with God (Ex. 31:12-17). In the Fourth Commandment, God instructs his people to remember the Sabbath day, follow his example, and keep the day holy by ceasing from all their labor (Ex. 20:8-11).

The Sabbath, then, is that holy day on which God's people are to refrain from all their labors, to stop working, and to rest and be refreshed. When we rest on the Sabbath, we are acknowledging that God alone is the Creator. We are answering the call of Psalm 46:10, where God says, "Be still, and know that I am God." God invites us to enter his rest and to know him. Our lives are so busy, our schedules so full, our distractions so unending. Sabbath is about resting from all that work, unplugging from all that distraction, and giving God our full attention. Sabbath is about remembering that God is Creator, God is in control, handing our burdens to him, finding rest in his provision, comfort in his care, joy in his fellowship, and renewal in his rest.

Sabbath not only points us to God our Creator but also to God our Redeemer. The God of Genesis is also the God of Exodus who liberated his people from slavery. Moses tells us to remember the redemption from Egyptian bondage as the basis of the Sabbath commandment (Deut. 5:15). Sabbath observance is a free man's worship. We cease from work *because we can*. We are no longer slaves. We have no taskmasters who force us to work, for God has set us free. Referring to the exodus, God says, "I carried you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself" (Ex. 19:4). Sabbath is about celebrating freedom, leaving bondage behind, and resting secure in the God who saves. On the Sabbath, we sing songs of redemption by a parted sea and rattle severed chains over Egyptian slain.

For Christians today under the New Covenant, the ultimate significance and fulfillment of the Sabbath is in Jesus Christ. Through Christ, God created all things and is making all things new (Col. 1:16; 2 Cor. 5:17). Jesus is Lord of the new creation. In Christ, God has redeemed all his people from their sins (Rom. 3:24). Jesus says that "everyone who sins is a slave to sin," but "if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed" (John 8:34, 36). Jesus is Lord of the new exodus. This same Jesus calls us to himself and promises to give us rest (Matt. 11:28-29). When we come to him by faith, we enter the true rest that the Sabbath foreshadowed (Heb. 4:1-11). Therefore, Christians ought to rest on the Sabbath day because we are justified by faith *apart from works*.

The Sabbath is ultimately a sign of our new covenant relationship with Jesus. It signifies that we are united to Christ, justified by faith, and enjoy his rest. Amid the bustle of life, remember the Sabbath. Keep it holy. Enter his rest. Be still and know your God. Because you are free, obey. "If you call the Sabbath a delight . . . then you will find your joy in the LORD" (Is. 58:13-14).

Sign-Up forms are in the Sunday bulletins, so there is a headcount for set up and food preparation.



Forks Historical Highlights

In recognition of the 290th anniversary of the Forks of the Brandywine Presbyterian Church, founded in 1735, The Forks' Historical Committee is sharing interesting and illuminating articles in our monthly newsletters (first article was in the April 2025 edition).

Article 8 in a Series of Interesting Historical Accounts FUN AND FASCINATING FORKS FACTS - Part 1

Tradition holds forth that the beautiful **Estey organ** was donated by the **William Potts** family in the nineteen-teens or early 1920s. In the early years before it was electrified, the organ had to be pumped to get air in the organ chest. It's interesting to note that only a few of the decorative pipes we see from the sanctuary actually produce sound. The majority of the sound comes from non-decorative pipes within the decorative enclosures on each side of the choir loft. The organ was originally in the center of the choir loft, close to the front. The keyboard and organist were on the back side of the organ as seen from the sanctuary so the organist was not able to see the pastor in the pulpit at all! It was moved to the side when it was completely rebuilt in 1964 by the American Institute of Organ Building in Paterson, New Jersey. At the time of the organ rededication, the

25-note Maryland solid bar chimes were donated in memory of Rev. Harry H. Kurtz by the Locustdale Boys and the Boy Pioneers. The console is a memorial from the D. Clark Guiney Fund in memory of Sarah L. Guiney, Owen C. Guiney and Laura Hanley. In 2016 further major work was done on the organ. The trumpet pipes were removed for cleaning and revoicing at Trivo Co. in Hagerstown, MD. The Hautbois pipes (oboe) were removed and taken to Trivo Co. to be used to match the used, revoiced oboe which was installed in place of the original pipes which were deteriorating due to age. According to our organ tuner/technician, Bill DeGothseir, his count of pipes is 1,303 after the 1964 rebuild and his enhancement in 2016.

The **William Potts family** of the Langoma estate, now known as St. Mary's of Providence, were faithful congregants and generous benefactors from the late 1890s until William's death in 1943. It was Mr. Potts who solicited and received 3 bids in 1901 to erect the **tower and spire** that is now on the western side of the church. The winning bid was from G. W. Piersol of Honey Brook for a price of \$2,837 and he estimated the work to take 90 days. Of the total amount, Mr. Potts and his wife committed \$1,650, and he mentions in his April 29, 1901, letter to Rev. Hector McLean that he felt his mother, Mrs. Joseph Potts, would also contribute.

The **Potts** estate was a frequent site for Boy Pioneers camps under the pastorate of Rev. Harry Kurtz.

There arose a local controversy in most likely the early 1920s, possibly a bit earlier, in which the **Potts** became unwilling participants because of rumors. A farm near their estate was apparently being considered as the site for a new State penitentiary and rumor was that Mr. and Mrs. Potts would withdraw their support from the Forks if it was built. Mrs. Potts corrected that misconception, from wherever it came, in an unattributed newspaper clipping that was found in our archives. She said they didn't know the proposed site was for sale and, had they known, they would have offered to buy it! Fortunately, the location for the new prison was selected to be elsewhere, and we now know that prison as Graterford, built in the later 1920s.

Potts Mansion is now owned by The Sisters of St. Mary's of Providence, and is open for annual Christmas tours in early December and in June for their annual Strawberry Festival. Information can be found on-line.

In 1798 a **schoolhouse** once standing on the northern edge of our upper cemetery area was chosen for annual elections. Boisterous and profane language was freely used. The decision was made not to use any property belonging to the church for secular purposes which were fraught with disorder and contention. In 1821 a **Sunday School** opened in that building. It was in operation only about two years. After a lapse of several years, Sunday School was held in the church building that preceded this one.

Of noteworthy mention is a **Sunday School pin** awarded to Viola Ferguson in 1992 commemorating her 60 years of perfect attendance!

Kindly write your Giving Number on your envelopes—(whether you use the printed ones or your own blank envelope), and/or <u>also on your checks</u>, to insure that it will be on your Year-End Giving Statement. If you do not know your Giving Number, contact Glady in the church office.

ACH Giving Is An Available Option (No Fees): The Forks has Automated Giving, also known as ACH (Automated Clearing House) and **is through Citadel Credit Union**. This is the same process as automatic bill pay many utilities and business use. Church Members (or non-members) can set up automatic weekly giving amounts through the sign-up form. No more wondering about how much to make up for missed Sundays due to weather or other circumstances! This opportunity also allows The Forks to maintain a more even income throughout the year. You can choose: weekly, twice a month, or 1st or 15th of the month & End of month.

Sign-up is easy and secure, the same information is used that is on your check - Routing & Account numbers along with your bank name. You can adjust your giving amount anytime by submitting a new form. You may also give a check during the tithing in addition to your automatic giving to supplement other ministries, such as Building Preservation, Deacons, Missions and others.

SMART 911 - Did You Know?

Over 70% of calls made to 9-1-1 come from mobile phones. When you dial 9-1-1 from a mobile phone, the 9-1-1 call takers have very little information to help you – only your phone number and a very general sense of your location. This does not bode well in an emergency when seconds count, particularly if you or your loved ones have medical conditions, or if there is a fire.

With Smart911, you can add key information about members of your household that would help anyone you care for in the event of an emergency, whether the call is from the home or any mobile phone.

Your entire household. One account.

People

Names, physical descriptions, and photos will help responders act quickly if a child goes missing, or help identify individuals in an emergency.

Phones

Did you know that mobile phones don't provide an address for the caller? By adding all phones for your household, 9-1-1 will have a better idea where you are when you need help.

Animals

Keep all members of your household safe by including pets, livestock, or service animals that responders need to be aware of.



Kids Around the World: Funding Update

We are grateful to share how God is moving through our church's support of the Kids Around the World ministry. Since the Forks has officially taken up the call to support the Hope Zone in Veron, our congregation has responded with encouragement, prayer, and incredible generosity. We want to take some time to share an update on where things stand.

We set out to raise funding to cover the playground, the food packing, the monthly contributions for the discipleship in Veron, and finally for the mission trip itself.

- At the Bag Bingo event on November 7, we raised \$7,575.43.
- From the 3 special offerings in the month of November, we received \$6,748.00 in contributions.
- The total amount of money raised so far is \$24,067.64.

This is all thanks to the generous giving of our church and surrounding community, who have dutifully come out to events, graciously donated, and prayerfully supported this ministry.

Because of the faithful giving, we have now fully funded the playground in Veron, as well as the food-packing event that will take place on March 14. Thank you for helping make these ministries possible!

Our next step is raising support for our June mission trip, where our team will travel to Veron to assemble the playground and continue building relationships with the community. We are excited to see this partnership come to life in person and to serve alongside our brothers and sisters there.





Advent Meanings

During Advent, which begins this year on December 1st, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Resolve To Go Micro

Most New Year's resolutions are so major they seem made to be broken. Maybe that's why "microresolution" is the latest January buzzword. Setting smaller goals is more realistic and helps ensure

follow-through, according to experts. People who try setting micro-resolutions say that approach is more positive and leads to longer-lasting change. For example, instead of attempting to lose 30 pounds this year, make a micro-resolution to walk 10 minutes twice per day and to snack on fresh fruit at least once a day.

Micro-resolutions can also be helpful in matters of faith. If aiming to read the entire Bible in one year feels overwhelming, take five minutes each morning and evening to read a brief devotional or pray. If joining your church's missions committee isn't possible, try to talk to one new person each week about your faith or church. May God bless you as you take small steps that add up to big impact this year!
