We were honored and highly favored by our guest speaker Jayden Seay at our July Wings and a Word. He informed, challenged and inspired us all. Here is a short summary of his incredible message, "Finding the Natural RESET".

"For me, graduation felt like more than just the end of a school chapter-it felt like a full reset, a holy pause. It was a moment where I had to acknowledge that although I'd achieved something meaningful, I hadn't yet arrived at the final destination. I still have so much to learn and become. Like Paul, I'm learning to leave behind what no longer serves me—the past mistakes, missed opportunities, and even the comfort zones I had outgrown. Sometimes, walking past a hallway of closed doors—failed plans, unreturned calls, rejected applications—hurts. But I'm beginning to understand that those closed doors were necessary detours, not dead ends. They pushed me forward toward the door that was meant to open. And in that space of moving forward, I've found power in being empty. When I come to God with nothing left to prove and no distractions in hand, I give Him full room to shape, fill, and lead me.

So, here's my advice: embrace the reset. Whether you're graduating, ending a season, or stepping into something new, take the time to clear the clutter in your mind and spirit. Don't rush into the next thing just to feel productive. Let yourself be empty for a moment—because empty doesn't mean useless, it means available. Forget what's behind, not because it didn't matter, but because it can't define where you're going. God often does His best work in moments of surrender and transition. Keep pressing forward, not just for the next big goal, but for the higher calling that God is shaping uniquely for you. The prize isn't just success—it's purpose. And that's always worth the reset."

The Brethren thank Jayden Seay for his message and the push to continue the reset of our lives. Many activities are in the works for the fall including: a fishing trip, Veteran's Day event, Wings and the Word on September 29 and much, much more.

Freedom School: Learning, Lifting, and Leading Together

ver the course of four enriching days, our church came together across generations for our annual Freedom School—an experience that blended food, fellowship, faith, and freedom-focused learning. With nearly 100 participants, from young children to elders, our time together was more than just a gathering; it was a journey.

Each day began with a delicious shared meal, setting the tone for connection and community. Following that, we opened with a dynamic, intergenerational group session filled with music that moved both heart and body, games that brought out our competitive sides, and presentations that

opened our minds. We learned about the rich history of Luther Jackson High School and the significance of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs)—institutions that have long been centers of excellence, resistance, and Black pride.

A highlight of the week was our virtual visit to Ghana—what many affectionately called a glimpse into our motherland. Through this experience, we explored life in Ghana both past and present, and reflected on how our roots connect us across continents and generations.

Anchored in the story of Moses, we explored daily themes that challenged us to think critically about liberation, leadership, and justice. Through honest conversations and deep reflections, we were reminded of how God used Moses to speak truth to power and lead people toward freedom—and how we are called to do the same in our time.



We were taught, we were challenged, and ultimately, we were charged to carry the work forward.

On the final day, we came together to create a powerful "Footsteps to Freedom" mural—a collective art piece symbolizing the legacy we walk in and the work that still lies ahead. Each footprint reminded us to pause and honor those who fought for the freedoms we enjoy today, and to remain committed to justice and liberation for future generations.

Freedom School was more than an event—it was a movement within our church family. We give thanks for everyone who made it possible and for the Spirit that moved through us as we learned, lifted one another, and committed ourselves to continue the journey. —*Stacey Seay*



Am I A Witness?

y early Christian experience was shaped as the only child of Anna and Dan Davis, who brought me up in a traditional Baptist church in Savannah, Georgia. There I learned the importance of faith, the significance of trust in our Savior, and the value of prayer. Following my father's passing at a young age, both my mother and I deeply felt his loss. Nevertheless, she found comfort and guidance through regular reading of the Bible. With the support of friends, family, and our church community, I consistently attended Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and participated in the youth choir. This environment provided me with a strong sense of belonging within my church family.

Christians are entrusted with the responsibility of sharing the gospel of Jesus with others, encouraging them to learn about Him, follow His teachings as disciples, and engage in acts of goodwill. Sounds easy, right? It's not.

What is A Witness?

Christian witnesses express their faith through obedience, openness, courage, and personal experience—qualities essential for sharing the gospel. I have discussed my faith and trust in God with friends, family, and strangers, sharing life's challenges. But does this count as witnessing?

A devoted witness is defined as an individual who not only affirms belief in the resurrection of Jesus but also substantiates this conviction through consistent actions and demonstrable conduct. In 2 Timothy 1:7, "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear but the power, and of love, and of a sound mind." A witness for Jesus is someone who loves Him, has been changed by His teachings, lives them out daily, and shares their faith openly. I believe I am a good Christian, but I wonder if I am truly a good witness and whether I'm instructed by scripture to share the joy of knowing the Lord with others. Mark16:15, "Go ye into all the world,

and preach the gospel to every creature."

I would like to clarify that I am open to discussing my experiences and the ways they have influenced and benefited my life. In reflecting on my suitability for this assignment, I acknowledge the importance of evaluating my biblical knowledge and my ability to communicate meaningful messages. Of course, as an adult life changes, and the trials and tribulations of the world would visit me often.

Romans 1:16, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes."

After the passing of my mother, I found that both my faith and various life circumstances encouraged me to seek greater spiritual understanding. I increased my engagement with religious texts and devoted time to pray for insight and wisdom.

I continue to pursue guidance through prayer to ensure my actions are in accordance with God's word. As a Christian, I am aware of the importance of conveying positive messages and recognize that my faith is integral to my identity. 1 Timothy 6:12, "Fight the good fight for the true faith. Hold tightly to the eternal life to which God has called you, which you have declared so well before many witnesses."

I found comfort in speaking with others who were dealing with hurt, fear, and loneliness. The more I spoke about the goodness of knowing God, the more peaceful their moods became.

What makes an Effective Witness?

Effective witnesses are authentic, intentional, humble, empathetic, attentive, non-judgmental, and speak truthfully with compassion, while trusting God for the results.

Hebrews 10:24-25, "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all

Money Matters: What is the new tax law for seniors?

Deduction for Seniors

New deduction: Effective for 2025 through 2028, individuals who are age 65 and older may claim an additional deduction of \$6,000. This new deduction is in addition to the current additional standard deduction for seniors under existing law.

- The \$6,000 senior deduction is per eligible individual (i.e., \$12,000 total for a married couple where both spouses qualify).
- Deduction phases out for taxpayers with modified adjusted gross income over \$75,000 (\$150,000 for joint filers).

Qualifying taxpayers: To qualify for the additional deduction, a taxpayer must attain age 65 on or before the last day of the taxable year

Taxpayer eligibility: Deduction is available for both itemizing and non-itemizing taxpayers.

Taxpayers must:

- Include the Social Security Number of the qualifying individual(s) on the return, and
- File jointly if married, to claim the deduction.

How will the new tax law affect retirees?

• The new law includes a provision that eliminates federal income taxes on Social Security benefits for most beneficiaries, providing relief to individuals and couples. It does so by providing an enhanced deduction for taxpayers aged 65 and older, ensuring that retirees can keep more of what they earned.

What is the new tax deduction for over 65?

The new \$6,000 deduction is stacked on top of both the regular stan-

dard deduction—\$15,750 for single filers or \$31,500 for married couples filing jointly in 2025—and the 65-plus addition. For instance, a 65-year-old single taxpayer who qualifies for the full \$6,000 deduction would be able to deduct a total of \$23,750 from these three tax breaks on their 2025 tax return. A qualifying 65-year-old couple could deduct up to \$46,700.

Does this mean Social Security benefits are no longer taxed?

No. The new tax law contains no provision ending taxation of Social Security benefits or changing how those taxes are calculated. You may still be liable for federal income tax on a portion of your benefits if your provisional income—your adjusted gross income (AGI), plus tax-exempt interest income, plus half of your Social Security income—exceeds \$25,000 for a single filer and \$32,000 for a couple filing jointly.

Is the new deduction permanent?

No. The new legislation only authorizes the deduction for the 2025 to 2028 tax years. However, Congress could extend the tax break or make it permanent before it expires in 2029.

This article represents some information that you should be aware of as a senior citizen. Please take some time to review these changes on the IRS website to understand how you might be impacted as you prepare for tax season.


