

Congratulations to our Deacon Emeriti from Pastor Walton and the Deacons Ministry!

We thank God that He has ordered the steps of Melvin R. McCoy Jr. for over 30 years of service and Charles A. Basil Jr. for over 27 years of service throughout their strides of servitude and leadership to the FBCV Diaconate, people of this flock, and community. We have been truly blessed by their honest report, spirit-filled life, words and words of comfort, words of wisdom, faithful leadership and their willingness "to serve and not be served." May the Lord bless and keep you and your families and give you peace.

So, what is a Deacon Emeritus? The designation of Deacon Emeritus is a conferred title and not an entitlement. The title is intended to merit special recognition to an FBCV Deacon whose life, and long and distinguished service to the Church as a Deacon meets Ministry eligibility conditions, or the Deacon encounters special circumstances prematurely. In either condition, the Deacon has elected and/or agreed to conclude his/her active status as a Deacon at FBCV. The title of Deacon Emeritus should not be confused with that of an "inactive Deacon" where that status is self-directed and typically with the intent of returning to active status. A Deacon Emeritus may continue to serve in a consultative or mentorship capacity to assist with strengthening the quality and character of FBCV Deacons.



DEACON MELVIN R. McCOY, JR.

elvin McCoy, Jr. was born in Petersburg, VA on March 6, 1938, to Rudolph and Ella Williams McCoy. His parents had two children: Mel and his older sister Geraldine McCoy Anderson. Growing up in Petersburg during segregation, he attended all-Black Virginia Avenue Elementary, Henry Williams Middle, and Peabody High Schools. As a boy he attended and became a member of Gillfield Baptist Church where his father was a deacon, and his mother sang in the choir. Mel received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Virginia State University and his master's in business management from the University of Northern Colorado.

Mel met his wife, Shirley, at Virginia State. After they married, he was inducted into the military as a U.S. Army second lieutenant serving first in the Adjutant General Corp and switching to the Army Intelligence Corp. While stationed in Arizona, Mel served as the head of the Aerial Surveillance and Reconnaissance Department of the Army Intelligence School. During his career he served in Korea, Vietnam (twice), Germany, Arizona, New Jersey, Maryland, and The Pentagon. Upon completion of 20 years in the military, he retired to the Washington area and eventually served as an intelligence analyst for the Department of Defense. He later was a foreign service officer for the Department of Defense and after qualifying in French, was stationed in the American Embassy in Port-Au-Prince, Haiti. Upon leaving that position, he returned to the Department of Defense as a supervisor of a section of military and civilian imagery analysts. He retired as a GS 15.

Mel joined First Baptist Church and immediately sought to learn all that he could about the Word. First attending Bible study and later teaching the Wednesday Night Bible Class and the Discipleship Classes (a class that he truly loved teaching). Mel has served First Baptist in many ways: chair of the Five Year Planning Committee and subsequent Building Committee, which was responsible for the renovation of the church; trustee; deacon; secretary, vice chair and chair of the Deacon Ministry; member of the Pastor's Compensation Committee; Bible Class instructor; Discipleship instructor for several years; and advisor to the Deaconess and Greeters ministries. He continues to enjoy attending Sunday School and Wednesday night Bible class, as well as several of the Book Study groups. For a number of years, he served as the First Baptist Representative to the Board of the Baptist Children's Home in Petersburg, VA. He continues to enjoy streaming First Baptist worship services and following events in the life of the church.

In addition to his service in church Mel has contributed to his Vienna community as well serving on several town committees, participating in the Community Watch Program, as FBCV representative to the Shepherd Center, and as a commissioner on the Town Planning committee, where he also served as chairman. Recreationally, he often enjoyed playing senior league basketball, swimming, racquetball, bowling, walking, and reading.

Mel and Shirley have three daughters, two sons-in-law, and three grandchildren and reside in Vienna, VA.

harles Arthur Basil Jr. has lived his life in pursuit of service. His ministry has touched countless lives through the quiet strength of prayer, compassion, and presence.

Charles's journey with Christ began early at Austin Grove United Methodist Church in Bluemont, Virginia. On September 16, 1959, after marrying his high school sweetheart, Armeata Wilkins, he joined Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Middleburg, Virginia, where he was baptized and began to grow in his faith.

After relocating to Fairfax County, Charles and Armeata united with First Baptist Church Chesterbrook in McLean. There, he was ordained as a Deacon on June 16, 1991, and faithfully served as superintendent of Sunday School, president of the Prayer Band, and a dedicated member of both the choir and men's chorus.

After retirement, what many saw simply as a lawn service, Charles embraced as his "lawn ministry." With each yard he cared for, he also tended to hearts and souls, offering prayers and encouragement, especially to those facing illness or hardship. His service was never just about the work of his hands, but the witness of his faith.

In 2006, following God's leading, Charles and Armeata joined First Baptist Church of Vienna (FBCV), where his ministry flourished even more. He served as Deacon, Vice Chair of the Deacon Ministry, spiritual advisor to both Women's and Men's Ministries. He has represented the men of the church at Northern Virginia Baptist Association. He was honored by the Baptist General Convention for his dedicated work. Charles contributed to the Marriage Ministry, Christian Learning Academy (CLA), and Greeters Ministry until health reasons required him to step back.

Over the years at FBCV, Charles's heart for outreach is evident in his work with the Feed the Homeless Ministry in Washington, D.C., Thanksgiving basket deliveries, and his commitment to visiting the sick and shut-in. He also mentored younger deacons, shaping the next generation of servant-leaders.

Through it all, Charles has remained steadfast in his love for God and FBCV. He has been blessed by Pastor Walton's Spirit-filled preaching, uplifted by the fellowship of his church family, and encouraged by the music ministry that continually feeds his soul.

Those who know him describe Charles as a man of humility, faith, and family. He and Armeata celebrated 66 years of marriage in September 2025, blessed with two sons, Anthony (deceased) and Gary; four grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; and eight godchildren.

In recognition of his faithful service, Charles has been honored with the title of Deacon Emeritus. His legacy is one of love, humility, and steadfast devotion to God. Truly, his life reflects Micah 6:8: "What does the Lord require of you but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Black Veternality: Patriot's Paradox

n Saturday Nov. 15, FBCV veterans gathered to dwell deeper into the meeting of what it means to be African American in the military. Dr. Bryon Garner, the author of *Black Veteranality: Military Service and the Illusion of Inclusive Patriotism*, gave a stirring keynote address where he laid out his views regarding the service of Black people in a nation that did not consistently embrace us. Dr. Garner gave personal examples from his own service in the Navy and described the institutional challenges that Black service members have faced over the years. Following Dr. Garner's remarks, a panel of FBCV veterans gave their perspectives and shared their stories of service.

Marion Devoe represented the US Army sharing his lifethreatening experiences in Vietnam and how soldiers were mistreated when they returned home. Valerie Smith provided the Air Force and women's perspectives from her time in service with her husband Michael Smith. Peter Stinger gave us the story of being a Marine and his service story.

The panel was moderated by Sinclair Harris who served in the Navy. Our audience was very engaged and entirely interactive with our speaker and panelists.

While there were many points made throughout the session, a few key take-aways were clear in describing the unique and complex experience of serving a country that has not always fully fought for us in return:

• **Discrimination and Racial Bias** has changed over time but is still present.

- The "Microcosm" of American Society continues in the military as it does in our nation.
- Hypervigilance and a "Double Burden" needing to be better than their peers to compete.
- Challenges in Transition and Benefits Access requiring greater professional support and awareness.
- Importance of Mentorship/Networking to make progress while in uniform and after leaving service.
- Resilience and Coping Mechanisms typically supported by our faith and God.

Even with its challenges, Dr. Garner and our panelists all agreed that Service was worthwhile, and they would recommend it to young Black women and men today.




