et ready to celebrate freedom, justice, and community all month long! The Town of Vienna's Liberty Amendments Month begins with our June-teenth Celebration and Parade, setting the tone for a month packed with meaningful events and activities.

From concerts to cultural events, this celebration honors the ideal s of liberty and inclusion represented in the 13th, 14th, 15th, and 19th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution. There's something for everyone—so don't miss your chance to participate! You can see the full calendar of events by visiting the Town of Vienna website.

HIGHLIGHTED EVENTS:

July 4: Founding Document Reading

Celebrate Independence Day with Vienna's third annual round-robin public reading of the foundational documents of American democracy. Participants will take turns reading aloud key foundational texts. Bound copies will be provided, and the event will conclude with a group recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. There will be a special reading of "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?" by Frederick Douglass, presented by our very own pastor, Dr. Vernon C. Walton. Don't miss this powerful and reflective moment of the celebration.

June 18th Workshop: "Restricted Vienna"

Join a crucial conversation on the history of housing discrimination in Vienna and Fairfax County. This workshop, led by Dr. Krystyn Moon, professor of history and American studies at Mary Washington University, will explore the impact of racial covenants in shaping our communities. Georgia Brown from the Fairfax County Circuit Court's Historic Records team will also provide guidance on how to research historic land records. A hands-on workshop will follow, where legal experts from Tengco Law PLLC and court staff will assist participants in researching their properties and filing paperwork to remove outdated racial restrictions from land records.


If you plan to attend, please register by visiting our link tree, so NVHC will be able to adequately plan for us.





Evangelism? What is it? Why Does it Matter?

Essentially, evangelism is sharing the Good News about Jesus Christ.

s followers of Jesus, The Great Commission. mentioned in the April issue of The Epistle, is the assignment given to ALL who have chosen Jesus as their Lord. Matthew 28:16, 18-20 (NLT) reads, 16 Then the eleven disciples left for Galilee, going to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. 18 Jesus came and told His disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. 19 Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. 20 Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

When you are led to share the Good News, here are some important things to stay focused on:

- Evangelism is not a human-centered effort. In verse 19, where it says, "go and make disciples," the word "go" literally means "as you are going." In other words, we are to share the good news of Christ as we go through life wherever we are: in our family settings, in the grocery store, at the workplace, in our neighborhood, at our places of leisure, etc. We are to go with intentionality to share the Good News to people who are not yet believers in Jesus.
- Why is it crucial to share the gospel to people who have not chosen Jesus as their Lord? It is to let them know that all of us have sinned, and to help them to begin a new life as redeemed followers of Jesus, to have the opportunity to develop a lifelong relationship with Him, and to have their names written in the Book of Life at the day of judgment, which qualifies them to live with Jesus eternally in heaven. As we share the gospel, the focus of our confidence is found in the last sentence, Matthew 28:20, which assures us that Jesus will always be with us.
- In Acts 1:8 (NLT) is found another well-known Great Commission passage, which Jesus gave just before

He ascended to heaven. He tells them: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be My witnesses, telling people about Me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." In both commands, Jesus gives a promise that assures us that we are not alone. His Presence and the Power of the Holy Spirit will be with us as we share the Good News. Remember, evangelism is not a human-centered or human-powered endeavor. "Success in witnessing is simply taking the initiative to share Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit and leaving the results to God." (Bill Bright, Witnessing Without Fear, Here's Life Publishers, 1987, p. 69).

• Pray and ask God to guide you to the people He wants you to be intentional about sharing the gospel. Our "Jerusalem" is in our immediate surroundings. Later, we can also go beyond our immediate context and share the gospel wherever and whenever the opportunity arises.

Did you know that most church members never share their faith? Stay tuned for more details on this fact in the July issue of *The Epistle*.

Money Matters: Emergency Funds, How Much do I Need?

What is an emergency fund?

An emergency fund is a bank account with money set aside to pay for large, unexpected expenses, such as:

- Unforeseen medical expenses.
- Home-appliance repair or replacement.
- Major car fixes.
- Unemployment.

Why do I need an emergency fund?

Emergency funds create a financial buffer that can keep you afloat in a time of need without having to rely on credit cards or high-interest loans. It can be especially important to have an emergency fund if you have debt, because it can help you avoid borrowing more.

How much should I save?

Three to six months' worth of your current living expenses is a good rule of thumb as the target amount for an emergency fund. This sum acts as a financial buffer to help you avoid going into debt from unexpected events, such as sudden car repairs, medical emergencies or job loss. It can be difficult to predict the cost of an emergency, so stocking up lets you be prepared just in case.

If that seems too steep, start with a number that seems more reasonable. For example, having access to \$500 in a savings account could help pay for a surprise car repair or medical bill without debt, so that could be a goal. If you put \$10 a week into savings and don't have to dip into the funds, it'll add up to more than \$500 after a year.

Keep in mind that it's OK if you have to use the funds for emergencies before you reach your first goal. An emergency fund is meant to be tapped and replenished. After you reach your first goal, you can set another one to be prepared for more unexpected expenses later.

Having savings can get you out of many financial scrapes. Put something away now and build your fund over time.

Where do I put my emergency fund?

Ideally, you'd put your emergency fund into a savings account with a high interest rate and easy access. Because an emergency can strike at any time, having quick access is crucial. So it shouldn't be tied up in a long-term investment fund. But the account should be separate from the bank account you use daily, so you're not tempted to dip into your reserves.

A high-yield savings account is a good place for your money. It is federally insured up to \$250,000 per depositor, per ownership category, per financial institution so it's safe. In addition, the money earns interest, and you can access your cash quickly when needed, whether through withdrawal or a funds transfer.

How do I build an emergency fund?

- 1. Calculate the total that you want to save based on the following categories:
- Monthly Rent Or Mortgage Payment
- Monthly Utility Payments (Gas, Electric, Water, Garbage)
- Monthly Telecom Payments (Phone, Cable And Internet)
- Monthly Insurance Payments (Car, Health And Home)
- Monthly Transportation Costs (Car Payment, Gas, Public Transit)
- Monthly Debt Payments (Credit Cards And All Loans Except Mortgage)
- Monthly Grocery Expenses, and Other Expenses.
- 2. **Set a monthly savings goal.** Instead of focusing on one large savings goal, focus on smaller, attainable monthly goals. Reaching monthly milestones can give you positive momentum and encourage you to keep saving. This can help you keep the habit of saving regularly and make the overall task less daunting.
- 3. Move money into your savings account automatically. If your employer offers direct deposit, ask if they

can divide your paycheck between checking and savings. That way your monthly savings goal can be taken care of without the funds touching your checking account.

- 4. Save your tax refund. You get a shot at this once a year—and only if you expect a refund. Saving it can be an easy way to boost your emergency stash. When you file your taxes, consider having your refund deposited directly into your emergency account. Alternatively, you can consider adjusting your W-4 form so that you have less money withheld. If modifying your deductions is a good option for you, you can direct the extra cash into your emergency fund.
- 5. Assess and adjust contributions. Check in after a few months to see how much you're saving and adjust if needed. When you've saved up enough to cover six months of expenses, you might consider putting extra cash in investments.

Here's what to do if you think you might have too much in your emergency fund.

When saving, draw a line between emergencies and everything else. In fact, once you've hit a reasonable threshold of emergency savings, it's a good idea to begin another "rainy day" savings account for irregular but inevitable expenses, such as car maintenance and clothing. If you need help staying organized, consider opening separate savings accounts or subaccounts for different financial goals.

Everyone needs to save for the unexpected. Having something in reserve can mean the difference between weathering a short-term financial storm or going deep into debt.


