

Walk the Talk: Faith in Action, Living With Purpose

"I started praying, asking God, 'Dear God, put someone in my path today that I can witness to. And let that person be receptive, and let me realize that it's not me, but it's the Holy Spirit living in me."

These are the words of someone who walks the talk daily. I sought her out to share with us a glimpse of her passion to tell others about Jesus. This is her story. "God has given me the ability of not being afraid but just knowing that sharing the gospel is what He commanded all of us to do. It was not just given to certain people. And that's why I want to talk to people, it's just natural." She goes on to say, "It's so easy to witness today. Using what's happening in the world today gives me more things to bring up - what God expects of us today. God is speaking to us. There are times you can tell when people don't want you to say anything about Jesus Christ. But God always puts people in my path."

"I believe we're living in the last days, but you can't be afraid. Always allow the Holy Spirit to lead you and direct you. And if you have faith and believe it, He will. But sometimes we say we have faith, but we really don't believe it, because we just can't get the 'me, myself, and I' out of the way. You have to trust in God. Just ask God to put words in your mouth and let the Holy Spirit lead you. If you try to go out on your own, you're going to be on your own. It's not going to work. But if God goes with you, He will give you everything you need, the words to say!"

"I don't call myself good at it. I just know that you must have faith and believe and ask God for it and trust He's going to do it. And it has never failed me. I have witnessed to so many people, since January and what's going on in our country because I said, "God is speaking to us loud and clear."

"In Bible Study, we're reading the book of Habakkuk. What is God's message for us today? Do we just complain about what's going on? Complaining + complacency = complicity. And I think God is using us, His people, to spread the Word because He does not want anyone to suffer. So, when I know that I'm doing what God wants me to do, it's just, it's just a part of me. That's where I am. I've not done anything extraordinary. I'm just letting God lead me."




The potluck luncheon was baked chicken, green beans, deviled eggs, macaroni and cheese potato salad and rolls, along with tea and birthday cake.








For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this world's darkness, and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.

ver the weekend of Oct. 17–19, the men of FBCV came together for fellowship, for encouragement, and for inspiration. We went bowling shared food, fellowship and fun with each other at Fairfax Bowl America. Congratulations to DeWayne Corbett for attaining the high score. Young and old, we enjoyed time together and sharing stories between frames.

Saturday morning the brethren gathered early to hear the message on Godliness and why it is superior in all situations. Rev. Keenan Thomas from Shiloh Baptist Church of Fredericksburg, Va brought the Word and the Spirit... challenging us on why we must seek Godliness above all. He asked us, why more Black Men were not in the Church and opting to go to the gym as their refuge? Just a few themes from Rev. Thomas:

- Godliness blesses everything in this age and the age to come.
- Physical Fitness is important, but Godliness has universal and eternal benefits that never fail.
- The only way to be our best as human beings is by drawing closer to God.

- What is the only offensive spiritual weapon that the Apostle Paul highlights? Why are we to trust in this weapon instead of carnal weapons such as guns, cursing, demeaning and backbiting?
- Why do you think the Apostle Paul is instructing us to not only humbly pray as part of spiritual warfare, but also to be watchful and to pray always!

Deacon Lamont Ruffin asked us to describe prayer to the young men in attendance. This was an incredibly meaningful way for us to close our time together and prepare for Men's Day Sunday service. Deacon Andre Carpenter FBCV's Men's Ministry Spiritual Leader closed us as he opened us in prayer.

This study will help us unpack our identity, strengthen our faith, and learn how to walk boldly even when we don't have all the answers.


Young Adult Friendsgiving Gathering


