

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in the United States, behind only lung cancer. The National Cancer Institute estimates that **152,810 people** in the United States received a diagnosis of colon or rectal cancer in **2024**, and approximately **53,010 died** of it.

Colorectal cancer awareness is important because many cases of cancer of the colon or rectum are preventable. Screening by colonoscopy can help prevent this cancer.

Cancer of the colon or rectum is more common in men than women. The median age of diagnosis in the United States is **66 years**, while about **78% of newly diagnosed patients are aged 55 and older.**

Factors contributing to an increase in early-onset colorectal cancer, according to the AACR (American Association of Cancer Research) Cancer Progress Report 2024, include:

- Unhealthy diet and microbiome
- Obesity
- Chemicals in the environment
- *Use of antibiotics*
- Consumption of alcoholic beverages
- Sedentary behaviors

Symptoms of Colorectal Cancer:

- Rectal bleeding
- Change in Bowel Habits
- Narrowing of the stool
- Abdominal pain
- Fatigue
- *Unexplained weight loss*

According to the AACR Cancer Progress Report, consumption of red meat should be limited to **no more than three servings (a total of 12 to 18 ounces) a week**, and shouldn't include processed meats like hot dogs, bacon, and salami, because these foods can increase the risk of colorectal cancer, among others. On the other hand, a **diet rich in fresh fruits and vegetables, nuts, whole grains, and fish** can help lower the risk of developing certain cancers and many other chronic conditions.

1 Corinthians 6:19-20: reminds us that our bodies are not our own, but rather they belong to God. Therefore, we are called to honor God with our bodies by taking care of them. This includes eating a healthy diet, getting enough exercise, and avoiding things that can harm our bodies.


