


From Pastor Walton's Desk

Juneteenth: A Second Independence Day

uneteenth is a federal holiday commemorating the emancipation of enslaved people in the United States. While slavery actually ended January 1, 1863, by President Abraham Lincoln by the Emancipation Proclamation, not everyone in the Confederate Territory would immediately set free. The news of freedom took two and a half more years for the news to reach the faraway Texas Territory where, on June 19, 1865, a Union general, along with 2000 troops, charged with implementing reconstruction issued an order informing all Texans that enslaved people had been freed. The name Juneteenth is derived from combining 'June 'and 'nineteenth' and is observed on June 19th.

Many in the Americans now view Juneteenth as a second independence day. Celebrations marking Juneteenth began in in black churches and homes in the 1860's and have grown larger and more mainstream over the years. In 2021, President Joe Biden signed into law a bill making Juneteenth a federal holiday. Juneteenth has taken on even more importance in recent years in the wake of police treatment of black people and the formation of the Black Lives Matter movement. Juneteenth creates wide focus on issues important to black people.

First Baptist began celebrating Juneteenth prior to the pandemic. Begun as a Church effort, the Town of Vienna has embraced Juneteenth and has actively supported the celebration and been a part of the Church's celebration. The outdoor Juneteenth event includes vendors, speakers from throughout the greater Vienna community and neighbors joining together in celebration and highlighting the importance of African Americans to the country.

This year's celebration will be held on Saturday, June 17, from 11 a.m. – 3 p.m. Our keynote speaker for the opening ceremony is Dr. Gregory Washington, the current president of George Mason University. This year's event will include live entertainment throughout the day with Common Ground headlining our musical entertainment. There will be community organizations, vendors, a free photo booth, free rides and food trucks on site. The James H. Hayes Elks Lodge has partnered with us and our Classic Car and Truck Show will be on their grounds.

There will be shuttle service between First Baptist and the Elks Lodge. Whether you plan to be avvendor, volunteer to serve during the event, or just plan to attend, you won't want to miss this day of celebration.






SUMMER CAMP


The camp offers students the chance to study singing, dancing and acting while rehearsing for a theatrical production. Students will also enjoy theater games, arts & crafts, and much more.

Police Reform Recommendations

Pastor Vernon C. Walton recently served on a community task force asked to review Fairfax County police department policies a suggest improvements. The task force recently issued a report and NBC4 interviewed Dr. Walton as part of the coverage. Here is an edited version of that article by Julie Carey, News4 Northern Virginia Bureau Chief. Published May 18, 2023.



fter a string of police shootings in Fairfax County, a community task force was assigned to review the police department and present some suggested improvements.

Now, that new set of reform recommendations is under review by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, and headed to the office of Fairfax County Police Chief Kevin Davis before he shares his take with the Board.

The recent deadly police shooting of a suspected shoplifter, Timothy Johnson, brought attention back to police practices, as the working group began its examinations amid an uptick in police shootings in the county.

"Timothy Johnson's unfortunate death highlights and reminds us of the urgency of this conversation," said Pastor Vernon Walton, a member of the working group that put together the suggestions.

The group began with 300 suggestions from the community, then distilled them into a report just presented to the Board of Supervisors public safety committee.

"This report in no way indicates a lack of confidence in our Fairfax County police," Walton said during a meeting on Tuesday. "What we do note is there are some things that need to be addressed."

One of the biggest recommendations from the group is that anytime an officer points a gun at a civilian or suspect, the action be reported to the community as a use of force.

"We feel that when an officer points at gun at an individual, that's an actual use of force and should be recorded and reported to the community as a use of force," said Phil Niedzielski-Eichner, another member of the working group.

A police spokesman told News4's Julie Carey that the department is already collecting data on any use of a firearm.

Also as a result of the deadly shooting that killed Johnson, Davis announced his department was starting work to create a foot pursuit policy. The working group has asked that the policy be fast tracked with a report to the community within 45 days.

Other specific police shootings have played a part in the working group's recommendations: Aaron Lynch was killed in 2022 when he came at police with a wooden mask and bottle while suffering a mental health crisis.

The working group wants to see cases like that increasingly handled by clinicians and social work teams—not police officers.

They also suggested that the Board of Supervisors give the police civilian review panel more authority. That would be allowed under recent legislation in Virginia.

"The information they review is given to them by the police," said Walton. "They are not allowed to subpoena or question witnesses. They can only read accounts that are provided for them. This is why we are advocating for an expansion of that authority."

Money Matters: When Should I Collect Social Security? Three Green Lights to Look For

hen is the right time to claim Social Security? This is a tricky question to answer because the right moment is different for people depending on their own unique situation.

If you're on the fence about whether starting benefits right now makes sense or not, watch for these three green lights that could suggest now is the right time for you to claim.

1. You have other income sources

One green light that suggests you can claim Social Security is if you have other income to live on besides your benefits. Your Social Security checks are only going to replace about 40% of the income you were earning before retirement. That's not nearly enough to cover all your needs as a senior, especially as healthcare costs often rise as you age.

2. You have 35 years of work under your belt

Your Social Security benefit is based on average wages in your highest-earning 35 years (after adjusting for wage growth). If you haven't worked that long, then your average wages would be reduced by the inclusion of years of \$0 wages in the calculation.

You don't want to reduce your benefit by not working for enough years. In fact, you'll ideally want to make sure your average wages are as high as possible. So, if you are earning more than you did in the past and want to work an extra year or two to push some lower-earning years out of your benefits calculation, that could be worth doing. If you're satisfied you've got 35 good-earning years under your belt, though, that's a green light that you're ready to claim benefits.

3. You've coordinated with your spouse

A decision of when to claim Social Security impacts both you and your spouse if you're married.


If you were the higher earner, you may want to wait as long as possible to claim benefits as doing so would allow your spouse more income if you pass away first. That's because Social Security survivor benefits allow your spouse to keep your benefit when you die if it's higher than their own retirement check.

If your spouse is waiting on you to claim spousal benefits, though, then an earlier claim might be called for. Spousal benefits can equal up to one-half the higher earner's primary benefit at full retirement age, but they don't become available until the person whose work history they're based on has claimed their own retirement checks first.

Ultimately, you want to be sure you're really ready to file, because it can be hard to undo a benefits claim once you've made it. Watching for these three green lights is a good way to tell if that's the case for you.

If you and your spouse have worked out a strategy together to maximize your combined lifetime Social Security income and to make sure whoever lives longer is provided for, this is a green light that suggests moving forward makes sense.
