

#### What is Frangelism?

Simply put, Frangelism is an intentional effort to reach Friends, Relatives, Acquaintances, Neighbors without a church home. We learn in Mark 5, that after Jesus healed the demon possessed man, the man begged to stay with Jesus. However, Jesus had a different plan. Mark 5:19 says: "However, Jesus did not permit him, but said to him, 'Go home to your friends, and tell them what great things the Lord has done for you, and how He has had compassion on you." This is the essences of our call to Frangelism.



BCV Members Gloria Runyon, Dee Dee Carter, and Sylvia Taylor have compiled a new exhibit at the Freeman Store and Museum entitled "Vienna's African American Trailblazers," which opens on Sunday, March 13. The exhibit highlights:

- Keziah Hatton Carter and Lucy Hatton Carter— Indigenous community leaders
- William "Buck" McKinley Carter—Community leader and the force behind Patrick Henry Library; grandfather of Hoyt Carter
- Charles and Esther "Tippy" Carter—First family who participated in Vienna Little League and Babe Ruth League; parents of Dee Dee Carter
- **Douglas Brown**—Established the Negro Baseball League; ancestor of Dee Carter and Gloria Runyon
- Lillian Blackwell—Civil Rights Activist; Community Leader
- William Alexander West—West St. NW named for his family; an organizer of the Fairfax Co. NAACP in 1944
  - Andrew Minor—Founded Union Baptist Church
- Theodore "Ted" Thomas—Protector of Vienna's African American history and historic sites; late husband of Lorraine Thomas, Uncle of Gloria Runyon
- Louise Reeves Archer—Principal of Vienna Colored School, later renamed Louise Archer School
- Odessa Thomas Carter—First Negro employee at Town Hall; great-aunt of Dee Dee Carter
- **George E Brown**—First Negro Town of Vienna Police Officer; uncle of Gloria Carter and Edward Hansborough
- Raymond Williams—First African American licensed as an electrician in Fairfax County (1945); father of Ann and Louise Williams

The exhibit is located in the hallway adjacent to the Store and the stairway that leads to the upstairs Museum. It will be on display for the rest of the year.

Gloria, Dee Dee, and Sylvia are members of Historic Vienna, Inc. Gloria and Sylvia are also Board Members.

#### Money Matters: How a Federal Tax Credit Differs From Deductions

Tax season is upon us. For some, it may be your first time filing. And even for those who have filed for years, taxes are not the easiest task to tackle.

From credits to deductions, tax terminology can be confusing. So, here's what you should know about tax credits, what they are, how they work, and what makes them different from deductions.

#### What is a federal tax credit?

A tax credit is the dollar-for-dollar amount of money that taxpayers subtract directly from the income taxes they owe. There are different types of tax credits, including: Nonrefundable, refundable, and partially refundable

Both federal and state governments give tax credits such as the Child Tax Credit or Lifetime Learning Credit to sustain and benefit the economy. A federal tax credit is granted by the federal government.

#### Tax credit vs. tax deduction

While they may appear similar, tax credits and tax deductions are two separate things. A tax credit refers to the specific amount taken away from what a person owes. For example, if you receive a tax credit of \$2,000 on a \$4,500 tax bill, it would be reduced to \$2,500.

On the other hand, a tax deduction reduces the amount of your income that is taxed. For example, let's say you have a taxable income of \$60,000 and you receive \$10,000 in deductions. This would reduce your taxable income to \$50,000. The main difference is tax credits impact the total tax, while deductions only affect the amount of your income that is subject to tax.
