

Dear Padre,

I went to confession, and then, months later, my priest was removed for alcoholism and theft. Is my confession still worthy?

Your confession is not dependent on the worthiness or the unworthiness of the priest. Your confession is made to Jesus; the priest is a witness who pronounces the words of absolution that Jesus intended in the sacrament. “From the moment that a sacrament is celebrated in accordance with the intention of the Church, the power of Christ and his Spirit acts in and through it, independently of the personal holiness of the minister” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1128).

The question of the efficacy of the sacrament and the unworthiness of the minister who performs the sacrament in the name of the Church is not new. During the time of persecution, in the early centuries of the Church, some people, including priests and bishops, avoided martyrdom by offering the required oblation to Caesar. Later, they repented and returned to the Christian community, a community that included the surviving family and friends of the men and women who were martyred. The question was asked, and with some animated energy, “How could these ministers who sinned to save their own lives now represent the Church?” The answer, arrived at with patience and discernment, is that the minister is only the representative of the sacrament, not the source of the sacrament. Jesus is faithful, even when his ministers have been unfaithful. ●

Close Enough!

It is the fourth Sunday of Advent. When Christmas is this close, one takes that final leap. Isaiah is centuries from Christmas, but he cannot wait! He sees the “sign” as clear as day: “the young woman, pregnant and about to bear a son” (Isaiah 7:14). And how about that Son! None other than “Emmanuel” himself—God-With-Us! Paul, too, is bursting at the seams! Inspired by what he calls “the obedience of faith” (Romans 5), he is excited to see the gospel thriving even among the Gentiles. For him, the “Spirit of holiness” is a gift offered to all—Christmas every day, you might say.

Speaking of “obedience of faith,” Joseph is the perfect example. The word “obey” comes from the same root as “to hear,” and Joseph has almost supernatural ears! Matthew, the former tax collector, tells “how the birth of Jesus Christ came about” in today’s gospel reading like a bookkeeper—the Holy Spirit in Column A, Joseph in Column B, with Mary in the middle. But when an angel whispers to Joseph at night, his dream comes true: “he took his wife into his home.” Everything is set for Emmanuel!

So, the Bible is brimming with Christmas, that is, “God-With-Us,” from end to end. And when a virgin can conceive, are any of us exempt from “birthing” Jesus in our midst? Even when a “happy holiday” seems impossible in the midst of war or violence or poverty, when our ears hear only silence, let’s sing Christmas carols every day! ●

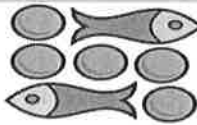

What Is a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)?

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a special way for
individuals age 70½ or older to make tax-free gifts directly
from their Individual Retirement Account (IRA) to a qualified
charity, such as our church.

How Does It Work?

- You must be at least 70½ years old at the time of the
distribution.

- The QCD must be made directly from your IRA to the
charity. You cannot withdraw the funds yourself first.

- You can give up to \$105,000 per year (for 2025; this
amount is indexed for inflation) as a QCD.

The QCD counts toward your required minimum distribution
(RMD) if you are required to take one.

What Are the Tax Benefits?

- The amount of the QCD is excluded from your taxable
income, which may lower your overall tax bill.

- You do not need to itemize deductions to benefit from a
QCD.

Reducing your taxable income may also help lower the tax on
your Social Security benefits and reduce Medicare premiums.
Important Details:

- QCDs can only be made from traditional IRAs (not from
401(k)s or other retirement plans, unless rolled into an IRA
first).

- The distribution must go directly to the charity—ask your
IRA custodian for their process.

You cannot also claim a charitable deduction for a QCD on
your tax return.

Why Consider a QCD? A QCD is a tax-efficient way to sup-
port our church and fulfill your charitable goals, especially if
you do not itemize deductions.

Reflection on the 4th Sunday of Advent

God’s Promise is Fulfilled

The 4th Sunday of Advent Year A reminds us that God always keeps His promises. In the first reading, Isaiah tells Ahaz that God will give a sign. This sign is a child called Emmanuel, which means God is with us. Even when people doubt, God remains faithful. The Gospel shows how this promise is fulfilled in Jesus. He is the child who comes to bring hope to the world. God does not forget His people. He is with them, just as He said He would be. This reading encourages trust in God’s plan. Even when things seem uncertain, God is present...He promises to be with us too.

Salvation is for Everyone

The 4th Sunday of Advent Year A reminds us that salvation is not just for a few. In the second reading, Paul tells the Romans that Jesus came for all people. No one is left out. God’s plan is bigger than any one nation or group. Jesus is the Savior for everyone. No matter where someone comes from or what their past looks like, He welcomes them. Paul calls people to belong to Jesus and follow Him. This is an invitation for all. Advent is a time to remember that Jesus’ coming is a gift. It is not something earned. It is freely given. As we prepare for Christmas, we can open our hearts to that gift and share it with others.

Trusting God Over Fear

The 4th Sunday of Advent Year A shows two very different responses to God. Ahaz, the ruler of Judah, is surrounded by enemies. He is afraid and does not trust God to protect his kingdom. Even when Isaiah tells him to ask for a sign, he refuses. He relies on his own strength instead. Joseph, on the other hand, listens to God. He might not understand everything, but when the angel speaks to him, he obeys. He chooses faith over fear. Because of his trust, he becomes part of God’s great plan. These readings remind us that fear can hold us back from trusting God. Ahaz chose fear, while Joseph chose faith. Advent is a time to ask ourselves which path we are following.
