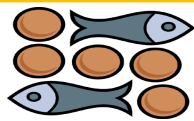

Reflection on the All Saints Day and All Souls’ Day

Why All Saints Day Matters

All Saints Day is very important in the Catholic Church. It reminds us of all the saints in heaven. These saints lived holy

The two days work together. All Saints’ Day reminds us of the hope of Heaven and the example of the saints. All Souls’
Day reminds us of our duty to pray for the souls still in need of our help. Both days teach us that we are connected to
those who have died, whether they are in Heaven or Purgatory.

In short, All Saints’ Day is a celebration of those already in Heaven, while All Souls’ Day is a day of prayer for those still
waiting to get there. Both days help us remember the importance of eternal life and our connection to the whole Church,
in Heaven and on earth.
