Background Information

❖ We want people to know about the collection and how it will
support ministries that help young men and women answer God’s
call to vocations to the priesthood and to the religious life.

❖ One new priest was ordained by Bishop Ricken at the end of
May. As of the writing of this document, 23 men have been
accepted for priestly formation this fall: 20 in seminaries and three
men taking part in the Kairos Year here in the Diocese.

❖ Most seminarians are in formation for seven to nine years,
which includes at least two years studying philosophy and four
years studying theology.

❖ The Kairos Year is a yearlong formation opportunity dedicated
to helping men who are called to serve Jesus Christ as a priest to
begin their formation to the priesthood. The program will help
these men become the holy priests our Diocese needs.

❖ Seminarians are currently studying at the following seminaries:

- Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary, Winona, Minnesota
- Conception Seminary College, Conception, Missouri
- St. Francis de Sales Seminary, Milwaukee, Wisconsin /
Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology, Hales
Corners, Wisconsin
- Pontifical North American College Seminary, Rome, Italy

Anointing of the Sick

The Anointing of the Sick is one of the seven Sacraments of the Catholic Church. It can be
given to someone who is seriously ill, facing a needed surgery, or in danger of death. It’s
always best to request the sacrament from a priest in advance, rather than waiting until the last
minute, or when death is imminent, because a priest may not always be available at that time.
It is understood though that some critical situations are sudden and unplanned and require
immediate attention, i.e. sudden heart attack, stroke, or other immediate medical condition,
accident, criminal act, appearance of suicide, etc. (Here in the Green Bay Diocese there days
during the year when most of the priests are away at required events, such as the Annual Priest
Retreat in June and the Clergy Congress in October, and may not be available.)

Many parishes have emergency numbers that can be used to request a priest to come and do the
Anointing of the Sick. Here at St. Lawrence/St. Mary’s it is **920-228-1814**. Parish priests will
typically cover the geographic area of their parishes.

When someone is in the hospital however, it is important to understand that **any priest** can
offer the Anointing of the Sick. It does not have to be the person’s parish priest. This is
particularly true when the hospital is located outside of the geographic area that the priest
operates in, and would require him to drive extra distance and take extra time in travelling in
order to anoint the person, which may or may not always be convenient or possible.

Many hospitals are in urban areas that have at least one or more Catholic parishes in them; and
may already have a system set up the notifies priests in the area when someone is in need of the
Anointing of the Sick. Some may even have a dedicated Catholic priest chaplain assigned to
them. When someone is in the hospital, or a family member of the person, would like the
Anointing of the Sick, it is best to first check with the pastoral department of the hospital to see
if an area/assigned, priest is available to anoint them. If, for some reason, there is no area/
assigned priest available to anoint the person, then the parish priest should be notified to see if
he can go to the hospital and anoint them, especially if the situation is urgent.

Some hospitals have pastoral departments that notify the parish when a parishioner is in the
hospital. These are typically courtesy calls, which are a kind and benevolent act. However,
they do not necessarily indicate that the person, or a family member, is requesting the
Anointing of the Sick. The Anointing of the Sick should be specifically asked for.

If it should happen that both an area/assigned priest and the out-of-area parish priest have been
requested to offer the Anointing of the Sick, and the area/assigned priest arrives and anoints the
person, the parish priest should be notified as quickly as possible so as to avoid the awkward
situation of him having travelled to the hospital only to find out that another priest has already
done it.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is intended to be a tangible encounter with Jesus
and an act of grace to bring healing in both soul and body to those who need it, and it is
important to make sure anyone who needs it is able to receive it. Hopefully this little
clarification will help in how to best contact a priest, particularly in a rural area, in order to
receive it.
