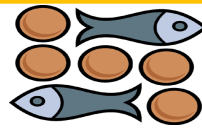

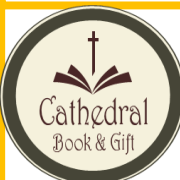
Secretary Trustee

The secretary works with the Pastor/Administrator/Pastoral Leader to oversee corporate, non-financial record-keeping at the parish, such as corporate minutes from the Annual Meeting as well as other documents, notices and correspondence.

All parish records are to be kept in an easily accessible and orderly fashion at the parish in a locked fire-proof safe or cabinet. The secretary trustee is a full member of the parish Pastoral Council and receives minutes from the Finance Council.

Responsibilities of Secretary Trustee:

1. Serves as a full member of the parish Pastoral Council and receives Finance Council minutes
2. Assists the Pastor/Administrator/Pastoral Leader in taking and keeping minutes of all meetings of the corporate board of directors; and is responsible for the corporate book of minutes, i.e., annual meeting
3. Attends to corporate notices and correspondence
4. With the Pastoral Council and Finance Council, assists the Pastor/Administrator/Pastoral Leader to ensure that proxy documents are recorded and filed. Ensures that all corporate reports as prescribed by federal, state, local and diocesan authorities are prepared and filed. (Section X, Federal, State and Local i.e.: W-2, 941, Gambling permits)
5. With the Pastoral Council assists the Pastor/Administrator/ Pastoral Leader in the development of parish policies and strategies to address the needs and mission of the parish.

Reflection on Trinity Sunday

Here is an excerpt from an article titled: “Most Holy Trinity Year A, Sunday May 31, 2026” found on the “Young Catholics” website—young-catholics.com:

The Mystery of God’s Unity

Trinity Sunday Year A invites us to reflect on the mystery of God’s unity. God is one but exists in three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. This mystery is difficult to understand fully, as our human minds cannot grasp the full depth of this truth. We are asked not to fully comprehend it, but to accept it as part of our faith. This is a central teaching in the Church, one that shapes how we relate to God. The most important thing about the Trinity is the perfect unity between the three persons. Even though they are distinct from one another, they share the same nature and work together in harmony. There is no conflict, no separation, only perfect love and unity. This unity is not forced; it flows naturally from the very nature of God. It is a model for us in how we should live with one another.

In our own lives, we are called to reflect the unity of the Trinity. Just as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are united in love, we are called to love one another. This love should not be based on what we get from others, but on a deeper connection that reflects God’s love. Working together in unity, especially in the Church, is part of our response to this mystery...The unity of the Trinity challenges us to overcome division in our own lives. Whether in our families, workplaces, or communities, God’s love calls us to build unity and peace. It asks us to recognize that we are all connected, and that unity in love is the foundation of a healthy relationship with God and each other.

Living in Relationship with God

Trinity Sunday...reminds us that God is not distant or far away. God is relational, and He invites us into a close, loving relationship. The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are distinct but completely united. Their relationship is one of love and giving, a model for how we should relate to one another. The Trinity shows us that our relationship with God is not one-sided. Just as the three persons of the Trinity share life and love, God wants us to share our lives with Him. He is not a distant God who remains far away, but a loving God who desires to be close to us. The Trinity is about community, and we are invited into this community through faith in Jesus Christ.

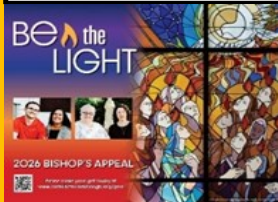
As believers, we are called to reflect the loving, communal nature of God in our own lives. The way we live should reflect the love, unity, and mutual respect seen in the Trinity. We are made in God’s image, and as such, we are meant to live in loving relationships with others. This includes forgiving those who hurt us, offering our help to those in need, and working together in the community.

The readings for Trinity Sunday...also remind us of the gift of salvation. It is not something we can earn by our own effort, but something freely given by God. Jesus came to save us, and the Holy Spirit strengthens us to live as faithful followers of Christ. Through these gifts, we are able to enter into a deeper relationship with God.

God’s Love and Grace

One of the central themes of Trinity Sunday Year A is the incredible love and grace of God. The readings show that God sent His Son to save us, not because we deserve it, but because of His immense love for us. Through the work of Jesus, we are given the opportunity to have eternal life. This is a gift of grace, something we could never earn on our own.

God’s love is not based on our actions or how good we are. It is unconditional and constant. Jesus came to reveal this love, and through His life, death, and resurrection, He opened the way for us to be saved. The Holy Spirit, who dwells in us, is a constant reminder of God’s presence and love. He helps us live as faithful disciples of Christ and empowers us to share God’s love with others. We are also reminded in the readings that God’s love is not just about us receiving grace, but about sharing it... It is a call to live out our faith in practical ways that reflect the love of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.
