



For me, **Advent** is one of those 'stand out' days in the church calendar and it is definitely amongst my favourite days in the life of the church. A new liturgical year. **The Advent Collect.** The beginning of a busy but very enjoyable period comprising home communions and children's nativities. We now have a certain familiarity about how this season looks for us. **Antiphons, Readings and Hymns** for **Advent Sunday, Holy Communion** on the Second Sunday of Advent, **Nativity** on the third Sunday, **Carols** on the fourth Sunday and **Communions on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.**


In addition a word of thanks to **Jim Ross** who laid the wreath at the Holy Communion Service which fell on **Remembrance Day, Tuesday 11th November.**

THE COLLECTS OF THE SEASON, from the 'Old' Prayer Book

Some collects have been revised or moved to different times of the year. But in the 1549 BCP. Thomas Cranmer was very deliberate in his placement of the collects and the reformed theology which underpinned his understanding of them. Below is an interesting article based on the original designation of the collects. It is very likely you will find them familiar. Many find a beauty and a spirituality in the collects, and I commend them to your use over the next four weeks.



The Advent Collect (This one has remained!)

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Written by Thomas Cranmer for the 1549 Book of Common Prayer, this collect embodies the double focus of <u>Advent</u>, on preparing for both the first and the second comings of Christ. The first coming was the conception and birth of the Messiah, in which God's "Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility." Equally important, the collect also references the second coming of Christ on "the last day, when he shall come again."

The keynote of the whole prayer is its request for "grace." This is the essential means by which we may "cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armour of light" (Cranmer takes this phrase from (Romans 13:12). In other words, the collect assumes the fundamental sinfulness of man, by which it is not possible for us to turn to God on our own power. Of ourselves, we live in darkness. But by the grace of God, even "in the time of this mortal life," we may humbly receive the humble Christ, whereby we finally "rise to the life immortal."

This prayer was so much loved that the <u>1662 edition of the Book of Common Prayer</u> appointed it to be read every day during the season of Advent – a practice which continues to this day.

The Second Sunday in Advent (This collect is now set for the Fifth Sundy before Advent. There is still provision for its use on the second Sunday in Advent if desired)

Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by patience and the comfort of your holy Word we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

In this collect, Cranmer reflects the reformation emphasis on the importance of Scripture. Just as Cranmer included his "Fruitful exhortation to the reading of holy Scripture" as the first in his Book of Homilies, so he appointed this collect to appear in the first season of the church year. The 1979 Book Of Common Prayer made the unfortunate decision to move it to the later in the church year. Happily, the 2019 Book of Common Prayer restored it to its original position.

Note also that Cranmer mentions here not only the scriptures in general but rather emphasizes "all Holy Scriptures." One of Cranmer's criticisms of the medieval Church was its failure to read the whole corpus of Scripture. To remedy this, Cranmer created a daily lectionary for use at Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, by which one could read nearly the whole Bible in a year. Cranmer's BCP was the original Bible-in-a-year reading plan!

The Third Sunday in Advent (This collect remains but the words are slightly amended in places)

O Lord Jesus Christ, you sent your messengers the prophets to preach repentance and prepare the way for our salvation: Grant that the minister and stewards of your mysteries may likewise make ready your way, by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, that at your second coming to judge the world, we may be found a people acceptable in your sight; for with the Father and the Holy Spirit you live and reign, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

This collect was written for the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, probably by <u>John Cosin</u>. It reflects the Advent theme of preparation for Christ, with reference to the prophets and especially John the Baptist, who "preach repentance and prepare the way." This theme is then applied to our own lives as we pray to Christ that ministers today "may likewise make ready your way." In other words, we prepare for Christ's second coming in the same way that the people of God prepared for his first: by repentance.

The collect includes an elegant description of the purpose of gospel ministry: "turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just." Of course, a minister does not have power in himself to move the hearts of sinful men, but the Holy Spirit accompanies the proclamation of the gospel to convict the sinner and turn him to God. The 1979 Book of Common Prayer revised this collect. It removed this beautiful phrase (in fact the word "disobedient" never appears in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer!).

The Fourth Sunday of Advent (A version of this collect is now set for use on the Sunday before Advent (Collect 1) and there are certain features of it in the post communion collect of the same day).

Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among use; and as we are sorely hindered by our sins from running the race that is set before us, let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour glory, now and for ever. Amen.

In the medieval liturgy at Salisbury, four collects on the Sundays before Christmas began with the Latin word *excita*, translated either as "raise up" or "stir up." Cranmer adapted one for the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final Sunday before Christmas. It is fitting that, on this Sunday, we recognise two truths. We acknowledge both the depth of our depravity ("we are sorely hindered by our sins") and the depth of God's love ("your bountiful grace and mercy").

Cranmer's version included a specific reference to the atonement of Christ at the end of the collect. It says, "Through the satisfaction of thy Son our Lord." The phrase was dropped without explanation in the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, but perhaps it would be timely to reinstate it.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2026 will be observed from **January 18 to January 25**, with the theme "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling" (Ephesians 4:4). Over the last few years, we have joined with other Christian denominations for an event which is usually held on the Monday evening. Once the final plans and arrangements are in place, we will let you know via the weekly announcements.

WALK IN THE LIGHT 2025

Thank you to everyone who supported the Walk in the Light Service in November. It was a great evening of being together, and I believe it was important to establish a Christian presence in the city centre after Hallowe'en. There was great fellowship amongst all who attended, and we particularly enjoyed the slight variation to the route this year. A huge thank you to our neighbours in Long Tower for the tea and refreshments afterwards.







KIDZ KLUB FUNDRAISING AT THE COFFEE MORNING





BOOK RECOMMENDATION

The book of Ecclesiastes is for people who have their doubts about God, but can't stop thinking about him. The author of Ecclesiastes had his doubts, too, and these have enabled him to speak to sceptics as well as believers down through the centuries. Ecclesiastes is a book rich in literary artistry and multi-layered depths of spiritual meaning.

Philip G. Ryken explores this wonderful Old Testament book, and reminds us again of the need to trust God with the questions, even when we do not have all the answers.

This book was recommended by Mark Roxborough in last months magazine.

REVEREND CANON CECIL HEATLEY 'S VISIT TO ST. AUGUSTINE'S CHURCH



SUNDAY 14th SEPTEMBER 2025

We were very pleased to have the Reverend Canon Cecil Heatley join us for worship some months ago. For those of you who may not have been in church that morning or missed it on-line here is a short extract taken from his address.

"I am very grateful for this opportunity because it was here that my story began. My father made it easy for me

to believe in God as a loving Father. Then there was the Sunday School with Miss McGuiness and Mrs Locherie. We never missed a Sunday even on holiday as there was a prize at the end! The songs we sang still echo in my head ,'Jesus loves me this I know', 'Joy, Joy ,Joy'. The cubs and scouts with Danny Thompson, Roy Thompson and Ernie McCarter, Then John Millar's Bible Class. It is a great tribute to Canon McKegney that so many of us went on to full time ministry - Cecil McSparron, John McKegney, George Fleming and Mavis Gibbons.

My faith was increased and enlarged at Queen's University. While there my friend Jimmy Trail announced that he felt called to ordination and then added 'You ought to be doing this instead of me.' It had never occurred to me. I didn't think I was clever enough, but I tested this in the traditional way and ended up training at Ridley Hall Cambridge before being ordained to serve in the Parish of St. Patrick in Belfast. It shows how important it is to encourage people whose potential we see. In 1969 I began a ministry in London serving in 3 parishes , the last one being a diverse Parish in Peckham.

After retirement as well as services in the residential community where we live I helped out at a nearby church and continue to take services once a month. When it was time to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of my ordination I wondered "How can I celebrate my achievements while ignoring my sins and mistakes". I came to see that what I could do was celebrate the grace of God which had enabled me, 'Just an ordinary bloke' to embody the love of God to so many people, many of them much better Christians than I was.

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith - and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God." (Ephesians 2.8)
