The Rector writes

Thank you to Ivan and the team. The food bank collection was a little more than last year and, upon speaking to churches trust, I know that it is, unfortunately, still very much needed by some. Thank you to all who participated.



The **City Choir Festival** brought a visiting choir to the our service on Sunday 26th October. The choir members were from Estonia, and the choir was mainly here to compete in the international choral competition. The choir festival seems to go from strength to strength in the city, and the organisers are to be congratulated on the effort and coordination that goes into the event which brings choirs from all parts of the globe.

Our programming with **Musical Capital** is back in full swing. Everywhere I go I am quizzed about the mystery concert which Kieran Dunlop is planning for next Autumn. I can assure you that I do not know who the artist is going to be — and I am very happy not to know! The mystery (and conjecture) remains!

Our own programming has been massively successful too, with two **heritage lectures** now behind us and the next one planned for **6**th **November**. WHEN FEAR SURROUNDS US – (Article by Vivian Bricker)

"Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6)

Vivan Bricker writes...... Fear has weighed heavily on me for the past few years. I was never an easily scared person, but living in an unsafe city for many years has caused this fear and <u>anxiety</u> to develop. Maybe you feel the same way. If you are experiencing fear, whatever the reason may be, know that the Lord is with you. He will protect you and give you the courage you need.

Even if you don't feel it, God is with you and He will strike down every evil attack (Isaiah 41:10). I have seen it in my own life, and I trust He can do the same in your life, too. We should never underestimate God's help in our lives. In truth, we might never know on this side of Heaven how much He has helped us get through. Trust in Him even when the fear is overwhelming.

There will be times when you will have no choice but to be by yourself, and these are the times that can invoke the most fear. Whenever we start having paralyzing fear, we need to consult the Lord, rather than letting the fear fester in our hearts. We can then surrender this fear at the foot of the cross. Pray that the Lord will help you overcome this fear and bless you with the peace that only He can provide (Philippians 4:6-7).

God is greater than all things, and He can give us the courage that we need. God doesn't want us to walk haphazardly into situations, nor does He want us to live our lives in constant fear. He will protect us and keep us safe, even when doubts arise in our hearts (Psalm 121:7-8). There is much evil in the world, but we never need to discount the power and work of God on the earth.

The Bible tells us, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you" (Deuteronomy 31:6). These are the words of Moses to the people of Israel. He is encouraging Israel with these words, yet he is also encouraging us. We need to be strong and courageous because the Lord is with us and He goes before us.

Moreover, God will never leave us or forsake us. Rather than being afraid or terrified of the people in this world or what this world will bring into our lives, we need to find hope in the Lord. When courage comes into the picture, fear flees. Allow God to help you build up courage in your life and take hold of the wonderful future He has for you (Jeremiah 29:11).

There will continue to be times of immense fear in our lives, but we can overcome them with God's help. Pray over every fearful matter and trust God with each situation. Even if a situation feels insurmountable, know that all things are possible with God (Matthew 19:26). God can transform the scariest of situations and ensure they become nothing but a leaf blowing in the wind.





Let's Pray:


Dear God,

All in all only 97 parts to make. Well done again Peter!


THE HERITAGE LECTURES

12th November (12:30pm - 2:30pm) - Church of Ireland, Muff


These workshops are a great opportunity to deepen your understanding of the area's past while connecting with others who share a passion for local heritage.

THE MARK ROXBOROUGH INTERVIEW

Many thanks to Mark for agreeing to tell us something about his background. We are all looking forward to getting to know you a bit better so a big welcome again to you and your family and we trust you will enjoy your stay with us!



Tell us a little bit about yourself and your family

I was born in Coleraine and grew up in Portrush, where I attended Portrush Presbyterian Church. I married my wife, Katrina, in St. Columb's Cathedral, and we have been blessed with three boys — Adam, Isaac, and James. Sadly, our son Isaac passed away last year following a quad bike accident. We have lived for the past twelve years in a small village called Burnfoot, just outside Dungiven. Family, faith, and community have always been at the heart of our lives.

What was your faith journey that led you to train for church ministry?

I grew up in church from a young age and was involved in many organisations, including the Boys' Brigade. When I moved into my own home, there was a period when church life was less central, although I continued to attend regularly. Over time, however, God deepened my understanding of Scripture. I began attending Bible studies and became more active in church life. I developed a real hunger for God's Word and sensed a call to share the Gospel with others. I often feel like the least likely person for such a calling, yet I'm reminded of Paul's words in 2 Corinthians 12:9 — "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."

What was your first job?

I started working at the age of eleven in a shop in Portrush that sold rock and seaside souvenirs. Later, I worked at Barry's Amusements, where I was responsible for operating the various rides and attractions. Those early experiences taught me the value of hard work and dealing well with people — lessons that have stayed with me ever since.

What activities do you enjoy during your free time?

I love being outdoors — walking through the fields, tending the land, and helping my son James with his flock of sheep. I also enjoy reading, spending time with my family, and watching Glasgow Rangers whenever I can.

Who has been the most influential person in your life?

Without a doubt, my mother has been the greatest influence on my life. She continues to work hard and is a wonderful role model. She's also my go-to person for advice — especially when I need honest opinions or "views from the pews."

If you could have lunch with one famous person, who would it be?

I would love to have shared lunch with C.S. Lewis, whose writings continue to inspire me. I also think Fred Dibnah was a fascinating character. More recently, I'd enjoy meeting astronaut Buzz Aldrin — what an experience it would be to hear his stories first-hand.

Do you have any pets?

Yes, we have a sheepdog named Holly. I've heard that Revd Nigel now has three dogs, so I still have a bit of catching up to do in the pet department!

Do you enjoy travelling, and what's been your favourite place so far?

We don't often get the chance to travel far, but one of my favourite holidays was a family trip to Loch Lomond in Scotland a few years ago. My mum and sister came with us, and it was a very special time together. If I could choose a dream destination, visiting Israel would be at the top of my list — perhaps Revd Nigel could share a few tips after his trip in November!

Do you have a favourite book or movie you would recommend?

I'm not a big movie watcher — a trip to the cinema usually happens at the request of our youngest, James, and we recently enjoyed watching Superman together. My favourite book is, of course, the Bible, but I would also recommend Why Everything Matters: The Gospel in Ecclesiastes by Philip G. Ryken. It's a thought-provoking and encouraging read.

Is there any particular type of music you like listening to?

I enjoy listening to Gospel choirs and anthems, and I'm a big fan of the Gettys' music. I often have Premier Christian Radio playing in the background. My son Adam is director of music/organist at Agherton Parish Church. I really enjoy listening to him play when I have the opportunity. I also appreciate traditional marching band music - especially the Britannia Brass Band and the William King Memorial Flute Band.

WORLD WAR 1 HERO

My Grandfather Andrew White served with 10th Battalion Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers (Part of 36th Ulster Division) at The Somme. He held the Rank of RSM when he was awarded the Military Medal and soon after rose to the rank of Warrant Officer Class 1 and awarded the Military Cross.

The following Citation was published in The London Gazette—November 1916

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry on several occasions. He set a fine example of cool courage during the heavy bombardment of our trenches, and rallied and led on parties of men who had been shaken by severe fire. He has always displayed great coolness under fire.



In 1918 he was wounded and taken prisoner and was held as a POW until the end of The Great War when he returned home. He died in 1938 aged 54.
