The Rector writes

As I sit down to write this note, I do so with a sense of gratitude, humility and hope. **The Service of Institution and Induction** was a truly memorable occasion, and I have been touched by the warmth extended to me by so many people throughout the grouped parish, the wider church family and the local community as my role changes and develops. It was a privilege to gather together in worship as we marked the beginning of a new chapter in the life of our churches. Such occasions remind us that while ministries begin and end, God's faithfulness remains constant. We are part of a much larger story of faith, witness and service that stretches back through generations and continues into the future under God's gracious hand.

I would like to express my heartfelt thanks to everyone who contributed to making the service such a meaningful and uplifting occasion. Thank you to the clergy who took part and offered their support and encouragement. Thank you to the Cathedral Choir for leading our worship so beautifully and helping to create an atmosphere of prayer and praise. Thank you also to the bell ringers whose ringing announced the celebration so joyfully to the wider community. Many others worked diligently behind the scenes. I am grateful to the cleaning team who prepared the church and the halls so carefully, to the administrative team for their considerable planning and organisation, and to those who arranged the flowers which added such beauty and colour. The welcome offered at our refreshments afterwards was greatly appreciated, and I am thankful to all who helped set up beforehand and clear away afterwards. Every contribution, large and small, played a part in making the evening such a special one.

As I begin this new chapter of ministry, I do so conscious that I am building upon strong foundations laid by faithful clergy and parishioners over many years. The ministry of a church is never the work of one individual. Rather, it is a shared calling in which many people offer their gifts, their time and their prayers in the service of God and neighbour. I am thankful for all that has gone before, for those whose faithfulness has sustained our churches through changing times, and for the legacy that has been entrusted to us.

The challenge and privilege before us now is to continue that work together. We are called not simply to preserve what we have inherited, but to discern how God is leading us in the present and into the future. Every generation is invited to respond afresh to God's call. My prayer is that together we may grow in faith, deepen our discipleship, strengthen our fellowship and continue to be a grouping that welcomes all, serves generously and proclaims the love of Christ with confidence and compassion.

As we move through the summer months, we are mindful too of the wider life of our city and community. For many people, summer is a season of enjoyment, rest and celebration. Yet we also know that this time of year can sometimes bring tensions and divisions to the fore. As Christians, we are called to be peacemakers. We are called to model calmness where there is anxiety, respect where there is disagreement, and understanding where there is mistrust. The Church has an important role to play in encouraging all that builds us up for the common good.

In our conversations, our actions and our prayers, may we seek to reflect the character of Christ. Let us continue to pray for our city, for community leaders, for those charged with maintaining peace and good order, and for all who seek to build bridges of understanding between people. The words of the Apostle Paul remain as relevant today as ever: "If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all."

As July and August unfold, I would also like to thank the many groups, organisations and volunteers who contribute so much to the life of our churches throughout the year. Whether through worship, music, youth work, pastoral care, outreach, fundraising, community engagement or practical service, your dedication enriches our fellowship and strengthens our witness. The life of the church is sustained not only by what happens on Sundays but by the countless acts of service and kindness that take place throughout the week. Thank you for all that you do.

May God bless our parish grouping, our community and all who worship in our church buildings. May He grant us wisdom for the future, courage for the challenges we face, and hearts always open to His leading.

The Dean's wife, Alison, and daughter, Megan, delivered the readings from Scripture. His son, Matthew, his Father Billy and other family members were also present to enjoy and share in the special evening.

Musical worship was led by the Cathedral Choirs of Boy and Girl Choristers and Lay Clerks, directed by Mr Nicky Morton and accompanied by Assistant Organist Louis Fields. After the service, the congregation were invited to enjoy tea and refreshments in St Augustine's Church Hall.

On behalf of the congregation of St Augustine's we extend our hearty congratulations to Rev Nigel and his family as we continue to prayerfully support and embrace this exciting new beginning for them and our parish.

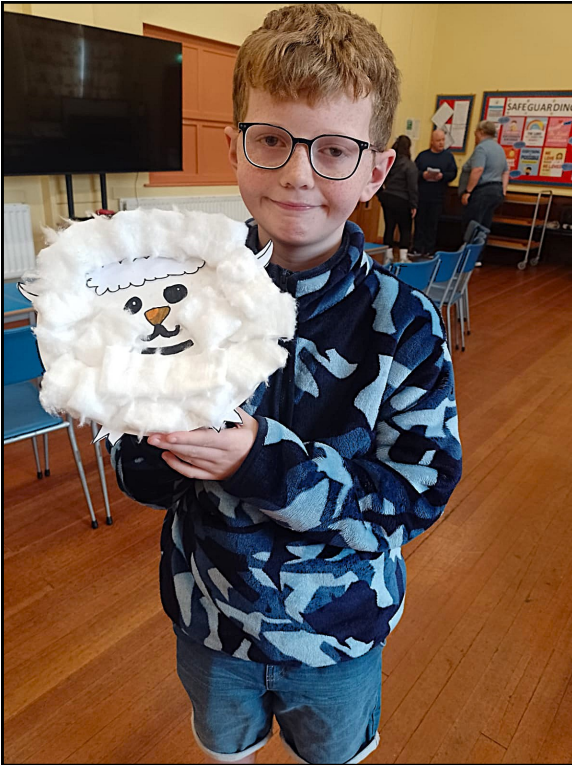






CHILDREN'S DAY SERVICE - SUNDAY 31st MAY 2026

THE ANGLICAN CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL VISIT — WEDNESDAY 1st JULY 2026

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally DBE, paid her first visit to Londonderry as she led a high-powered group of more than 100 senior Anglican clergy and ecumenical guests on a one-day pilgrimage to the city. The international delegation was made up of bishops, clergy and laity from 38 Anglican provinces worldwide and included the Secretary General of the Anglican Communion (the Rt Revd Anthony Poggo), the Chair of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC), Canon Maggie Swinson; and the Vice-Chair, the Most Revd Hosam Naoum, Archbishop in Jerusalem.



The group were in Northern Ireland for the 19th meeting of the Anglican Consultative Council which was taking place this year in Belfast. The organisers scheduled a one-day visit to Derry during which delegates were invited to explore the theme of reconciliation.

There were many highlights throughout the day to send the visitors home with fond memories: a beautiful liturgical service at St Columb's Cathedral, a walk across the iconic Peace Bridge; a visit to the Guildhall to find out more about the city's history and its journey towards peace; and hearing the personal testimony of rubber bullet-victim Richard Moore, who received a standing ovation in St Augustine's Church after sharing the story of how he forgave and eventually befriended the British soldier who blinded him when he was a 10 year-old boy.

The day had been designed as a living encounter with Irish history and the Church of Ireland's ministry in the midst of sectarian conflict and Northern Ireland's peace process. It provided an opportunity for the international delegation to learn from the host church's experience and to reflect on how Anglicans can support peace and reconciliation work around the world.


