

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

There are many stones in our paths that keep us from truly living and being free. Some of these boulders have been there for a very long time. They have been there so long that they have even settled into the soil of our lives with other weeds, vines, and compacted soil keeping them firmly in place. We find them hard to move and trying to do so can be exhausting. What are these suffocating albatrosses that keep us so tethered and immobile? They are many things.

They are past childhood wounds and hurts that stem from disappointment, rejection, or abuse. People may have told us we were unwanted, that the world is frightening, that there are only some acceptable feelings you can have and others you cannot. We may have tried to love someone or struggled to figure out how and were met with rejection. Maybe we trusted someone completely and were betrayed. We come to life collecting barnacles that begin to attach to other barnacles and before you know it, we have a mass of solid matter blocking our vision and keeping us from moving. We live in fear. We are afraid of losing what we have, afraid that the future will be empty, afraid that we won't succeed and even more afraid that we will not be loved. There is so much fear. Didn't Jesus tell us not to worry and to not be afraid?

Either we believe in the message of Easter, or we don't!



Go confidently into the night. Walking with God you will find the light and strength you need. Often without even knowing, God will move those boulders and stumbling blocks that bind us and, with putting one foot in front of the other and looking forward, we will move. The resurrection of Christ is really all about receiving the gifts of trust and faith and doing new things. The rocks that bind us keep us spinning the same wheels and doing the same things. When was the last time you threw caution to the wind and actually did something totally out of character and different? This is where we find God, in the spontaneous, the adventurous, the fun, and the creative choices we make! God is not boring and stuck. God is exciting and engaging. Fruits of Holy Communion

Question: What are the "fruits" of holy Communion?

Answer: The Eucharist, like all sacraments, offers its own unique grace. We receive a special share in God's life that helps us in our faith journey. We are given all we need to sustain and nurture our relationship with God. The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life. Everything we are and everything we hope to become is found in this sacrament. It is essential to the life of the church, to each member of the church. Without it, there is no church.

The Eucharist is the center of our spiritual life and has enormous effects on our growth, our holiness, and our way of life. The fruits of holy Communion are the benefits one receives from the sacrament.

These fruits of holy Communion are discussed in the catechism in the article on the Eucharist. The primary benefit is union with Christ. We become one with him sacramentally, just as we hope to become one with him for eternity. The Eucharist also separates us from sin, both past and future. It forgives the venial sins of the past and, by the love we receive, protects us from mortal sin in the future. The church community is also unified and strengthened by the Eucharist. Did you know... Child abuse comes in many forms. Most people identify child abuse as physically hitting a child. Neglect is also a form of abuse.

Failing to provide a child with proper nutrition, housing and supervision can cause irreparable harm. Expectations that a child be an active

participant in the care of home and family, or even ageappropriate jobs is a part of healthy

development. But excessive demands can cross into a form of servitude that is beyond the societal norms. Child pornography is a form of sexual abuse, with real victims in every image. The viewing of these images is an offence against the human dignity.

Did you know...Child abuse can occur in every culture and every socio-economic demographic. Peer reviewed research, especially that of the past 30 years, repeatedly shows this to be true. This same research indicates that the vast majority of child abuse occurs at the hands of someone known to the victim. Those who seek to do harm to children will pursue opportunities that provide access to children and may even ingrate themselves into the home. You can protect children by respecting the safe environment protocols stablished at youth serving organizations. More importantly, you can implement many of these protocols in your home and be ever observant and vigilant in all public and private setting

Did you know... Hope is rising. Throughout scripture there is evidence that we are called to be ambassadors of hope and healing. Did you know children of abuse long to hear this message of hope. Victims of crime, their family and loved ones need to know that their voices are heard. Organizations throughout the nation are striving to share the message that He has risen and there is hope. Each of us has a unique ability to support individuals who are hurting, to promote healthy relationships, and to build communities that are safe from those who may want to do harm. How has He called you to be an ambassador of hope and healing?

Q: What can parishioners do to help prevent the physical or sexual abuse of children? Are there physical or behavioral signs people can look out for?

Parishioners can certainly help by making sure children are never put in a situation where abuse can occur. This is not just in the case of clergy abuse but in any situation such as school events, sports, youth clubs or anywhere they may be vulnerable to a predator they should not be left alone. Also, if you see or hear of a child being abused, please report it. Many of us have occupations which make us mandated reporters, but anyone can and should report any possible abuse. Reports can be made to Children and Youth, ChildLine of PA or local or State Police. Because of the many types of abuse, there are different signs. Bruising, and any unexplained injuries, burns (particularly cigarette burns), multiple injuries at various stages of healing, and injury marks with a pattern like a hand or belt are common signs of physical abuse. These children will shy away from any touch and will wear weather inappropriate clothing to cover up bruises. They may appear withdrawn and distant to adults and other children. Signs of sexual abuse include avoidance of a certain person, bloody or torn underwear, bruising or bleeding around genitals, signs of sexually transmitted diseases, pregnancy especially under age 14, running away from home, changes in moods and behaviors. The behavioral changes may include withdrawal or acting out, grades dropping in school, low self-esteem and depression, frequent headaches and stomach aches and delays in speech, learning and emotional maturity. One of the key signs of sexual abuse in young children is sexual activity or knowledge they are too young to know about.
