

# FROM THE CATECHISM

Jesus Revealed: The Transfiguration (Para 554-556)

When and how did Jesus allow some of his apostles to see Him in His glory? After entrusting to Peter the keys to govern the house of God– the Church—the Lord began to reveal to His followers that He must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things, including death, but that, on the third day, He would be raised from that death. It is this period, according to the *Catechism*, that He takes Peter, James, and John up on a high mountain and there unveils His divine glory for a brief time.

His clothing, His face, become dazzling with light. He also reveals that He must go by way of the Cross in Jerusalem to enter His glory. All the Trinity is present for the Transfiguration; the Father in the voice declaring Jesus to be His beloved Son; the Son in Jesus; the Spirit in the cloud that covers Jesus.

The transfiguration gives us a window on Jesus' glorious coming and


our own transformation from a lowly body to a glorious body like His.

The Catechism reminds us, however, that "it is through many persecutions that we must enter the kingdom of God." It is called following in the footsteps of the Master.

## **Question of the Week**

Which self-interest of mine will I promise to put aside and what cross will I pledge to carry, transfiguring my life and my little part of the world?



Feasts of some great saints are celebrated between July 29 and Aug. 5—Peter Chrysologus, Ignatius of Loyola, Alphonsus Liguori and Eusebius of Vercelli.

They all spoke words of wisdom.

This year we will highlight St. John Vianney, the patron saint of parish priests, whose feast is on Aug. 4.

He lived from 1786 to 1859. After overcoming many obstacles because he had great difficulty with his studies, he was ordained a priest and assigned to a parish in the French town of Ars.

It wasn't long before people started to flock to him for the sacrament of penance—or reconciliation. Toward the end of his life, he spent 16 to 18 hours a day in the confessional. He had the gift of being able to read souls and reclaimed thousands of lapsed Catholics.

In one of his catechetical instructions on the subject of prayer, St. John Vianney said, "Reflect on these words: the Christian's treasure is not on Earth but in heaven. Our thoughts, then, ought to be directed to where our treasure is. This is the glorious duty of man: to pray and to love. If you pray and love, that is where your happiness lies."

He said that prayer is nothing else but union with God. "When one has a heart that is pure and united with God," he said, "he is given a kind of serenity and sweetness that makes him ecstatic, a light that surrounds him with marvelous brightness."

He described that intimate union as "God and the soul fused together like two bits of wax that no one can ever pull apart."

He said that our hearts are small, "but prayer stretches them and


He said that our hearts are small, "but prayer stretches them and makes them capable of loving God. Through prayer, we have a foretaste of heaven and something of paradise comes down to us."

St. John Vianney compared prayer to honey that flows into the soul and makes all things sweet. When we pray properly, he said, "sorrows disappear like snow before the sun."

He said that prayer also makes time pass very quickly and he gave an example from his own life: "Once when I was a purveyor in Bresse and most of my companions were ill, I had to make a long journey. I prayed to the good God, and, believe me, the time did not seem long." Some people, he said, are able to immerse themselves as deeply in prayer "as fish in water" because they give themselves totally to God. He mentioned St. Francis of Assisi and St. Colette, who used to see our Lord and talk to him just as we talk to one another.

"How unlike them we are!" he said. "How often we come to church with no idea of what to do or what to ask for." And worse still, he said, some people speak to the Lord like this:

"I will only say a couple of things to you, and then I will be rid of you." We would receive everything we ask in prayer, he said, "if we would ask with living faith and with a pure heart."





Seminarian Thomas Dzwonczyk, a parishioner of Saint John Vianney Parish, has taken a step closer to the sacred priesthood after receiving Admission to Candidacy for Holy Orders last month at Marywood University from the Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton. The Rite of Admission to Candidacy for Holy Orders is celebrated when a man has reached a maturity or purpose in his formation and demonstrated the necessary qualifications for ordination to the diaconate. In the presence of the bishop, Dzwonczyk publicly expressed his intention to complete his preparation for Holy Orders and also his resolve to fully invest himself to that end, so as to best serve Jesus Christ and His Holy Church. Let us pray for him, all of our seminarians and those who are discerning a call to Diocesan Priesthood.

## Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570) 862-7551.
