

* Parish Lenten Meeting on the Synod *

In recent months, we have published articles in the parish bulletin concerning the upcoming Synod on Synodality to be held by our Holy Father in Rome in 2023. The Synod, or as it were, listening session held in the presence of the Holy Father, will concern itself with the state of the Church and how we listen to one another in church, the Pope, Cardinals, Bishops, Priests, Deacons, Religious, and laity both young and old.

As preparation for this meeting, our Holy Father has asked every parish in the world to discuss what they like and what they do not like about the church today. Each parish is

asked to send a report to the Diocese who will then collate the findings and send it on to the National Conference of Bishops who will collate the gathered responses of the various dioceses and then forward their report to Rome in preparation for the discussions to be held at the Vatican with the Holy Father.

I think you will agree that this is a most interesting event.

To that end, I am asking each of our parishioners to make this part of their Lenten experience this year. You may do so by offering your input on the Synod survey that has been developed by the Holy See.

Finally, I welcome you to attend a one-hour meeting in the auditorium of Saint Paul School on March 16, 2022 at 4:00 pm where those present may make their feelings known.




Ouestion:

When Jesus says, "You cannot serve both God and mammon," what does he mean? What is mammon?


When you hear Scripture proclaimed each Sunday, remember it wasn't originally written in English. Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek — these ancient tongues were the original language of our Old and New Testaments. Most of the time, all of the words are translated into our native language. Sometimes. our native language. Sometimes, a word or two is left in the original language. Such is the case in this Scripture passage.

Mammon is an ancient Aramaic word referring to money, wealth, or profit.

Earthly wealth isn't bad in itself, nor does it automatically exclude us from being a



money — that is, to seek accumulation of wealth for its own sake and to structure our own sake and to structure our lives around it — is morally problematic. What good is our wealth if it isn't at the service of others? What good is our wealth if its pursuit leads us to selfishness, obsession, greed, envy, and comparison? There are many things that can be opposed to our service of God — power, prestige, popularity. Ultimately, something in our lives will be our master. But there is only one God worth serving. ©LPi



The season of Lent is a 40 day period of prayer, fasting and almsgiving (acts of charity) to help Christians prepare spiritually for the commemoration of the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ during Holy Week. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. The season has its roots in early Christianity when those guilty of serious sin were expelled from the Christian community to wear sackcloth and ashes and to make atonement for their sins. They were

reconciled back to the community on Holy Thursday, in time for the celebration of the Paschal Triduum. During Lent, the baptized are called to renew their baptismal commitment as others prepare to be baptized through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, a period of learning and discernment for individuals who have declared their desire to become Catholics.

Catholics are encouraged to devote themselves to seeking the Lord in prayer and reading Scripture, to service by giving alms and to practice self-control through fasting. The faithful are encouraged to dive into God's word in Scripture or pray the rosary with family members.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.



Ash Wednesday

March 2, 2022

The reception of ashes is not mandatory nor required. It is within each individual's own internal disposition and intention to repent and start over.

That is the best fruit of Ash Wednesday and the ashes are an external sign of that internal reality. Individuals may enter into Lent with a repentant heart even if they decide that receiving ashes is not the right thing for them this year.

Because of the continuing COVID-19 pandemic, parishes should not impose ashes by thumb on the forehead of parishioners. Ashes can be distributed to the faithful with no direct contact.

DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES

Any person may take Blessed Ashes to home bound parishioners, using one of the formulas: "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel" or "Remember you are dust and unto dust you will return." You may pick up ashes after Ash Wednesday services. Pre-filled envelopes will be provided.

Diocese of Scranton 2022 Lent and Easter Guidelines Regulations on Fasting and Abstinence

All faithful of the Diocese of Scranton are reminded of Diocesan Statute No. 41, which addresses the penitential aspect of Lent:

"The season of Lent is penitential in nature and during Lent penance should be not only internal and individual, but also external and social (Sacrosanctum Concilium, No. 5, 109).

Pastors are obliged to avoid scheduling activities in the parishes which in any way could possibly detract from the external and social penance required by Lent."

Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2022, marks the beginning of Lent. The following fast and abstinence regulations are observed:

- **-FASTING** is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, April 15, 2022, by all Catholics over 18 years of age to the beginning of their 60th year. On days of fasting, one full meal is allowed. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together should not equal another full meal, unless dispensed or excused.
- **-ABSTINENCE** from meat is to be observed by all Catholics who are 14 years of age or older. Ash Wednesday, all of the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence.

(NOTE: This year, the Feast of the Annunciation falls on Friday, March 25, 2022. Because it is considered a solemnity by the church, the law of abstinence from meat and meat products does not apply specifically on Friday, March 25, this year (per Canon 1251))

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT TYPES OF CHANGES COULD OCCUR IN PARISHES AS A PART OF VISION 2030?

While change to parish life and structure will be necessary during this process, Vision 2030 will allow for the unique needs of each deanery and even special circumstances within each deanery, to be brought forward. While any change prompted by this process may be difficult, Vision 2030 aims to help all of the faithful grow more deeply in the faith.

Some of the possible areas for discussion and pastoral planning that may occur in parishes over the next decade include:

1. Partnership with Neighboring Parishes

Parishes retain their own pastors but begin partnering with others to share ministries and resources such as the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, youth groups and religious education with the goal to avoid duplication as much as possible.

2. Linked Parishes

Linking two or more parishes would involve the parishes sharing the same pastor. Such parishes, while independent, will by necessity cooperate more closely than parishes in partnerships. Linked parishes do many things cooperatively, such as programs, and are encouraged to work toward combining Pastoral Council meetings and establishing common committees where possible.

3. Alternative Types of Parish Leadership

The Diocese of Scranton currently has several Parish Life Coordinators who are entrusted with the responsibility of leading a parish community in the absence of a priest serving as pastor. The Parish Life Coordinator provides pastoral and organizational leadership for a parish community and works with a Sacramental Minister, who is a priest authorized to provide for the liturgical and sacramental needs of the parish community.

4. Merger/Closure

In a parish merger, two or more parishes are united as one parish. Parishes may be considered for a merger when one or more of the parishes involved appears to lack the resources for long-term sustainability. This lack of resources might be financial in nature but might also apply to the number of active parishioners or the ability to maintain a safe and secure facility/property. This option is most generally considered when the membership of a parish has so diminished that the community is unable to sustain the pillars of parish life in Word, Worship, Community and Service and/or financial and infrastructure needs cannot be met.
