

My interest in Management began when I enrolled in Business Academy at Foster Career Technical Education Center at Mt. Blue High School, my junior year. College gives me an opportunity to learn and master all of these skills through courses, business strategies, teamwork, and project management. Going to college allows me to grow as a person. College will push me to join clubs, meet new people, and take on leadership roles. By working with a diverse group of people and accepting new responsibilities, I will grow into someone who can lead and collaborate with peers.
