November is going to be a busy month of stewardship exploration/invitation and Thanksgiving celebrations for Pastor Dee, John and Pastor Jessica.





For Jews and Christians, the faithful people of God at worship are predominantly a community of song."


And, wow! Have we been singing lately with pieces like "The Magic Penny"," Go Now in Peace", "Abundance", "Doxology", three different hymns every week, and many more! We are a singing congregation! The purpose? To help us enter into the spirit of worship, express praise for God, Christ and the church, experience our accord with one another, and witness concepts that we can sing more readily than speak.

(I have my favorite hymns ("In the Bulb There is A Flower" (#433), "God's Eye Is On The Sparrow" (#475). "Bring Many Names" (#11), just to name a few! Knights Community Hospital Equipment Lend Program

Should you experience a planned surgery, an injury, or an illness that requires bed rest, you can turn to KC HELP for hospital equipment to use in your home. KC HELP, a non-profit organization, provides services to all of the Kitsap Peninsula with inventory storage locations on Bainbridge Island and Bremerton.

The storage locations have hospital beds, lift chairs, wheelchairs, walkers, bath and shower chairs, over the bed tables, portable bathroom equipment and more. There is no cost to you for use of the equipment just return it when there is no longer the need.

Should you own hospital equipment you no longer need, they accept donations of equipment for their inventory. All their inventory came from generous members of our community and the volunteers consider it their job to distribute it to anyone who needs it.

There is currently a Capital Campaign in progress for a new storage facility in Bremerton.

KC HELP is a real treasure for the Kitsap Peninsula. Their volunteers are friendly, helpful, and go out of their way to satisfy your medical equipment need....another great example of neighbors helping neighbors.

Facing Apocalypse: Climate, Democracy, and Other Last Chances, by Catherine Keller

"When the Lamb opened the seventh seal, there was silence in heaven for about half an hour." (Revelation 8:1)

John's Apocalypse, otherwise known as Revelation, is the final book of the Christian Bible and has retained over the centuries its climactic position in the Christian canon. Now our age is threatening its own distinctively "apocalyptic" climax: climate havoc. The synchronicity of the ancient imaginary with our own time gives one pause. But as Catherine Keller notes, the meaning of "apocalypse" is not disaster but "unveiling."

In John's first-century text she finds not a foretelling of future events, but an inspired "dreamreading" of fatal human patterns that offers a lens to understand our present reality—and perhaps inspire an ecological and social response that could alter self-fulfilling prophecies of doom.

FROM PILGRIM TO PEACE PAGODA

For the past forty years, the Nipponzan Myohoji of Bainbridge Island, a Japanese Buddhist order, has worked to build a traditional peace pagoda next to Bangor's Nuclear Sub Base - location of the biggest stockpile of deployed nuclear weapons in the world.

Thanks to the generous donations of Japanese monks and nuns, and thousands of hours of volunteer labor, the project is nearly complete. The pagoda will stand for generations as a monument to the understanding that peace is possible, a place to gather in community for the betterment of our world.

Now more than ever, we must value peace.
