### From Pastor Dee





I'm going to turn my attention away from my/our church season of change and say a word this month about our nation's time of rapid—and to me, worrisome—change.

I don't think I need to review everything going on that is cause for concern, because you are aware of change as much as I am. Just a few things that are top of mind for me: the presence of masked strongmen who may work for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (or may be masquerading as ICE) rounding up people who speak Spanish or look Hispanic without warrants or cause; shipping them off to hastily-constructed camps where they are kept in inhumane conditions, often without the ability to contact family members or lawyers (they look like concentration camps to me!); the crackdown on free speech while local journalism dies on the vine;...I could go on. I don't like this version of America. I don't want a fascist government.

Are we on a one-way street toward a mean authoritarianism that camouflages itself as a "Christian" nation, with no exits or offramps? By no means, not yet. But it is important for all of us to do what we can to veer away from tyranny, if that's where we're headed.

My little book group has been reading *On Tyranny* by historian Timothy Snyder. I have found it a helpful framing resource for the current season, and recommend you take a look at it. There were a couple of directives that are very much in tune with what a sturdy small church like ours can do as a way to pump the brakes on tyranny.

Snyder's #10 is "Believe in truth." The chapter outlines the death of truth in totalitarian regimes, with the first step being "open hostility to verifiable reality, which takes the form of presenting inventions and lies as if they were facts." Without repeating all the stages, the last step is "misplaced faith." The author warns against putting faith in folks who claim they alone can fix what ails the nation.

The beauty of being part of a faith community is that we have a more profound source to draw on: that we have faith in a faithful God, a liberating, loving, Truth-telling God. Any faith we put in any human—no matter how inspiring they might be—is a lesser faith than the faith we put in the steadfast love and justice of Yahweh, the Holy One. We can resist "misplaced faith" and turn to deeper sources of Truth.

Snyder's #12 is "Make eye contact and small talk." It's part of our responsibility as citizens to stay in touch with others, break down social barriers, engage with the real world, learn who you can trust. Of course, a church like ours has this particular habit sewn into our DNA. We can make eye contact and small talk; we can even handshake, hug and make Big Talk with ease. Don't underestimate the power of community.

It's an annual tradition; our October Caring Coins collection goes UNICEF. Not surprisingly, the need is great! As the UNICEF web site says: "The humanitarian situation remains catastrophic in the Gaza Strip. Most children have lost access to quality health care, education, water and other vital services. UNICEF provides essential services to Palestinian children in the West Bank and Gaza Strip while continuing to help kids most in need worldwide. With your support, UNICEF can reach even more children whenever and wherever they need help."

For every dollar UNICEF receives: 86 cents goes directly toward helping children; 12 cents is spent on fundraising costs; and just under 2 cents is spent on administration.

When I began my job here at EHCC as office manager I was thrilled to be with you all again. Following in Jen Merrill's immense footsteps, trying to learn all the details she knew by heart, was still a daunting task. I had just barely recovered from ministry burnout. How would it feel to serve a congregation again? If I hadn't had such a good experience as your ministerial intern in 2017, I never would've attempted it.

But I trusted you all. I trusted Dee. And I brought my full self to this position. Almost immediately I realized what a blessing this community is to my life.

The role of "office minister" has been more than a job to me. It gave me meaningful purpose at a time when I needed it. It gave me an opportunity to make deep connections with this congregation, and the larger Bainbridge community. And it reminded me why I first felt called to become a minister over a decade ago. In so many ways, big and small, this little niche in this loving community helped me find myself again.

There was always the risk that I might outgrow this position. When I first interviewed for the job I remember Stephen Wilson asking me, as an ordained minister myself, how would I handle being a minister's assistant? But this wasn't just any minister. This was Pastor Dee, my mentor and one of my dearest friends. I assured him that as long as Dee was here, I would be here.

What a joy it has been to work with Dee. My esteem for our beloved pastor and friend has only grown in the last few years. She is one of the truest souls on this planet, who loves and cares and gives from a deep well of compassion. Together with Alice, another true and loving soul, we have had the best time.

As I watched Dee minister to this congregation I learned so much. And as I grew more comfortable, she welcomed me to minister alongside her. And you all welcomed me as well, into your hearts and homes. I can't tell you what a gift this has been. It gave me the courage to pursue recognition as an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ and this July I was granted that privilege.

Since I had fallen in love with this congregation, I tried to figure out how I might stay the "office pastor". I prayed and worried and talked at length to Pastors Mark & Dee, as well as members of the search committee and the mission council. But when all was said and done, my discernment process came to a clear conclusion. I feel called to move beyond office pastor and be a senior pastor again.

For a congregation to "grow" a minister (not once, but twice) is an incredible testament to your deep faith and commitment and love. I will carry that blessing along with me to whatever comes next. Thank you. I am so deeply grateful for all you have given me. And my goodness, I am sure gonna miss you.
