Bend but Do Not Break!

American writer and naturalist Harold "Hal" Borland once said, "If you want to know strength and patience, welcome the company of trees." We see this truth all around us in nature, especially here in Hawaii. Think of the mighty coconut tree: tall, graceful, and resilient. When storms and strong winds blow through, the coconut tree bends low—sometimes nearly to the ground—but it does not break.

That same image is a powerful reminder for our Christian lives. We too are called to be strong and patient, to bend but not break in the face of trials. In today's Gospel, Jesus challenges the large crowd that has begun to follow Him. Many were drawn by His fame, His healings, or His boldness against leaders—but Jesus makes clear that to truly be His disciple requires something deeper. He speaks with strong words: a disciple must place God above everything else, even family and one's own life.

This is not a call to reject our loved ones, but to love God first and most. The Second Vatican Council reminds us that Christians must "strive to please God rather than men, always ready to abandon everything for Christ." True discipleship means loving more, and loving better, with God at the center.

But Jesus also tells us the truth: following Him is not easy. Discipleship comes with a cost—the cross. Throughout the Gospel, Jesus is journeying toward Jerusalem and the cross, where His ultimate sacrifice will take place. He endured insults, beatings, and death, yet He did not break. The wood of the cross—the new tree of life—became the very instrument of our salvation. The cross is our symbol of strength and patience. It bends, but never breaks.

This week, we might ask ourselves: *How can I turn my sufferings into salvation?* Each of us carries a cross—financial struggles, health concerns, family tensions, or the challenge of living faithfully in a world that often pushes against faith. To be Catholic today can feel like a cross! Yet these crosses are not meant to crush us. Instead, they can turn our eyes to Christ, helping us walk His way with courage.

Discipleship is never easy, but Jesus promises that those who follow Him and love Him above all things will share in His glory. So, brothers and sisters, embrace the cross. Trust that God is with you in the struggle. And remember: with faith, with strength, and with patience—like the coconut tree—we can bend, but never break.

Liturgy of the Day:

Over the last two thousand years, Jesus has been given many titles, from Bread of Life to Our Savior. One of his first titles, going back to when he first stood and proclaimed God's Word in the synagogue, is Rabbi, or Teacher. How appropriate to focus on the that title on this First Sunday of September, a time of year when millions of young people are returning to school. Today we hear Jesus teach the crowds what it means to be a disciple. May he teach us as well as we gather together in his name.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

Jesus, our teacher, offers lessons today on being a disciple. These lessons can be difficult – we must carry our own crosses, we must renounce all our possessions, we even must hate our own family—but we gather as a family of faith in this place to hear them and reflect on them. The words of Wisdom may help, as they point out that as much as we try, we cannot possible conceive the mind of God. Therefore, with faith and humility, let us listen to God's Word.

Reflection: We like to think that we are in control of our lives. We make choices everyday that affect the course of our lives. At the same time we are subjected to forces we cannot control - from the actions of Mother Nature to the actions of other people. When things go "wrong" we blame God and when they go "right" we pat ourselves on the back. The truth is that the only thing we can control is ourselves- our choices and actions. Not matter what happens, whether it appears to be good or bac, the important thing is how we respond. It is pointless to blame others or God. We need to look at what we can do and pray for the grace to do it. God is with us and will help us no matter what happens as long as we are open to his grace. Let God be your guide.

Teach us to number our days aright that we may gain wisdom of heart. -psalm 90:12
