Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4 / 2 Tim 1:6-8, 13-14 / Lk 17:5-10

October 2, 2022

About 20 years ago, Country Music artist Craig Morgan wrote a hit song entitled "That's What I Love About Sunday." In it, he paints a picture of the simple joys that make Sundays special: Raymond, usually covered in grease, dressed in his Sunday best; the Martin family walking into church with that mischievous kid who broke a window last week; sweet Miss Betty singing

off-key in the pew behind him. He goes on to describe porch swings, backyard football games, baked chicken and beans, and the blessing of doing "not much of anything." For him, Sundays are about faith, family, rest, and hope.

That raises the question for us: what do you love about Sundays? For Christians, Sunday is unlike any other day of the week. It is the day of the Lord's Resurrection, the day we recall His passion, death, and rising to new life. Every Sunday is a little Easter—a day to rejoice and give thanks for our salvation. It is a day of worship, of rest, of being renewed in body and spirit. It is a day of hope, to reflect on who God is and what He has done for us.

Our readings today point us toward that same hope. In the first reading, the Prophet Habakkuk is told to write down the vision: even if delayed, God will fulfill His promise, restoring His people to right worship and covenant. "The just one, because of his faith, shall live." In the Gospel, the apostles cry out, "Increase our faith!" and Jesus tells them that even faith the size of a mustard seed can move mountains—or in this case, uproot a mulberry tree and plant it in the sea. Both readings remind us that faith is the key to unlocking God's grace and keeping hope alive, even in hardship.

And we know the hardships are real. Looking at our world today, it can feel as though sin and corruption have the upper hand. Injustices spread like a virus. Family life is under attack. Hope can be hard to hold on to. Yet God's vision remains: He will judge the wicked, and He will save the faithful. Our part is to wait in patience, strengthened by faith, trusting that He will pull us through.

That's what I love about Sundays. We are given a holy time to be renewed, to hear the voice of the Lord, and to worship Him. It is a day when our hearts are strengthened against the world's troubles by the promise of God's Kingdom. Will we see its final coming? Only God knows. But we remain faithful and hopeful as we wait.

So today, bring your burdens, your impatience, your sins to the Lord in worship. Be recreated by His Word and Sacraments. Leave here with a stronger faith, renewed hope, and a joy that spills into the week ahead.

That's what Sundays are all about—and that's what I love about it!

Effective Oct. 1 - Baptism will be scheduled on the 2nd Sunday at St. Catherine after 9:30 mass and 3rd Saturday at St. Sylvester after the 5:00 pm mass.

Liturgy of the Day: Each week, we gather here as a family of faith, expressing our faith and deepening our faith as we celebrate the Eucharist together. Yet, we may still feel that our faith is weak, especially if we compare ourselves to others we know. But do you know what? So did the twelve apostles. Today we hear them ask the Lord to increase their faith. May his response hearten us, his present-day disciples, as we struggle with our own faith.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

The prophet Habakkut cries out to God in frustration, upset that nothing is being done about the discord and violence in Judah.

"Patience," God answers. The apostles cry out to Jesus, complaining their faith isn't strong enough. "You have plenty, Jesus assures them. May we not be too timid to cry out to God in our need, may we listen for God's reassuring voice, and, as we sing the psalm, may we harden not our hearts.

Reflection: Are you ashamed of your faith? Do you refrain from objecting to the off color remarks, gossip, backbiting or other things that you believe to be unkind or cruel? We often choose to remain silent for fear of rocking the boat or being laughed at but is that God's Spirit moving us or our own ego? What good is a faith that is reserved for the privacy of our hearts and never put into action? The Spirit of God has given us is no cowardly spirit, but rather one that makes us strong, loving and wise. 2 Timothy 1:7

In the Catholic faith, **Baptism** is a sacred rite that welcomes a person into the Church, forgives original and personal sins, and bestows sanctifying grace, making the individual a new creation in Christ. The ceremony involves the use of water and the words "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," symbolizing death to sin and a new spiritual life. Receiving this sacrament also marks the soul with an indelible spiritual mark, uniting the person to Christ and the Church.

Key Aspects of Catholic Baptism

Spiritual Rebirth: Baptism is seen as being "born again" and made into a new creature in Christ, receiving the Holy Spirit.

Forgiveness of Sins: It cleanses a person of original sin and all personal sins committed up to that point.

Entry into the Church: The sacrament initiates one into the body of Christ and the Catholic Church, serving as the foundation for all other sacraments.

Sanctifying Grace: The baptized person receives sanctifying grace, allowing the Holy Spirit to begin dwelling within them and enabling a supernatural life.

Indelible Mark: Baptism confers a permanent spiritual mark on the soul, known as a sacramental character, which means it can only be received once.

The Baptism Ritual

Water and the Trinity: The essential elements are water and the invocation of the Holy Trinity ("I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit").

Symbolism of Water: The use of water represents dying to a former life of sin and rising to new life in Christ.

Oil: The newly baptized are anointed with Chrism oil, symbolizing strength and healing.

White Garment: A white garment is worn, symbolizing purity and the white garments Jesus wore after his death. Candle: A lit candle signifies keeping the flame of faith alive in the heart.

Requirements and Responsibilities

Parents and Godparents: For infant baptisms, parents and godparents commit to raising the child in the Catholic faith and live a moral life.

Necessity for Salvation: Catholicism teaches that baptism is necessary for salvation, as it's required for entrance into the Kingdom of God.



In Catholicism, October is the Month of the Holy Rosary, a time to focus on praying the Rosary, a meditative prayer centered on the life of Jesus and Mary. The tradition stems from the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7, established by Pope St. Pius V in 1571 to commemorate the Christian victory at the Battle of which was attributed to prayers of the Rosary. Catholics are encouraged to pray the Rosary daily during this month to deepen their faith, find peace, and ask for the intercession of the Virgin Mary.

Father EJ's October Month of the Rosary




