Can Catholics Celebrate Halloween? MOST CERTAINLY YES!

As Catholics, we celebrate Halloween not as a glorification of darkness or evil, but as the vigil of one of our Church's greatest feasts — All Saints Day. The word "Halloween" itself comes from "All Hallows' Eve," meaning the evening before the



holy day of All Hallows (All Saints). In other words, Halloween begins a beautiful Triduum of All Hallows — three sacred days that celebrate the communion of saints:

- 1. October 31 All Hallows' Eve (Halloween): The vigil preparing for the feast of all saints in heaven.
- 2. **November 1** All Saints Day: The solemnity honoring all the saints, known and unknown, who now live eternally with God.
- 3. November 2 All Souls Day: The commemoration of all the faithful departed who still await the fullness of heaven.

A Call to Holiness All Saints Day reminds us of our universal call to holiness — to be saints ourselves! The saints are not distant figures, but our brothers and sisters in faith who show us what it means to love God completely. "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy" (Leviticus 19:2). On this day, we rejoice in the victory of Christ made visible in their lives and renew our desire to follow Him faithfully.

Praying for the Dead — A Work of Mercy All Souls Day invites us to pray for those who have died but are still being purified in God's love. Scripture teaches this truth clearly: "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins" (2 Maccabees 12:45). The Catechism of the Catholic Church affirms this as a spiritual work of mercy: "From the beginning, the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice" (CCC 1032).

Even some of the symbols often seen around Halloween, such as the skull, have their roots in Christian imagery. The skull was never meant to glorify death or horror, but rather to remind us of our mortality — that our lives on earth are fleeting, and that we must always live in readiness for eternal life. Many saints kept a skull on their prayer desk as a 'memento mori,' a sign to repent of sin and to live each day seeking God's mercy. Thus, in these three sacred days — All Hallows' Eve, All Saints, and All Souls — we are invited to reflect on the reality of death not with fear, but with faith: to remember that life is a gift, that heaven is our goal, and that prayer, repentance, and acts of love draw us closer to the fullness of salvation. Halloween, therefore, is not about celebrating death, but about rejoicing in Christ who has conquered it.

Redeeming the Celebration It is good and healthy to have fun and even be a little silly on Halloween — dressing up, spending time with family and neighbors, and celebrating life! Joy is part of being Christian. However, we must always celebrate in a way that reflects our faith and not the distorted image that the world often presents.

Over time, Hollywood and secular culture have confused the true meaning of Halloween. **Movies, media, and commercial industries have turned this once holy vigil into a spectacle of fear, darkness, and even the glorification of evil.** What began as a Christian night of prayer and vigil before the Feast of All Saints has, for many, become a night that celebrates what is grotesque, violent, or occult. The growing fascination with witchcraft, horror, gore, and the 'worship of evil' undermines the Christian truth that Christ has conquered death and darkness forever.

As Catholics, we must be discerning. We do not need to reject Halloween, but we do need to reclaim it. We celebrate not death or destruction, but the victory of life and light in Jesus Christ. St. Paul reminds us: "Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them" (Ephesians 5:11). We should never glorify what is evil or contrary to our beliefs — witchcraft, satanism, murder, sexual immorality, or anything that mocks the sacred. Halloween, when rightly understood, becomes a moment to witness to our faith, to show the world that even in the midst of shadows, the light of Christ shines brightly. As St. Paul exhorts us: "Whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31).

A Catholic Way to Celebrate Here are some faith-filled ways to celebrate Halloween and the All Hallows Triduum:

- Attend Mass on All Saints Day.
- Light a candle and pray for your deceased loved ones on All Souls Day.
- Visit a cemetery and offer a decade of the Rosary for the souls in purgatory.
- Dress children as their favorite saints or angels.
- Share the story of your patron saint at home or in your classroom/workplace.
- Say the Litany of the Saints or pray the Rosary as a family before going trick-or-treating.

Halloween, when celebrated with faith, becomes a joyful reminder of our destiny in Christ: that we are all called to become saints, and that our prayers and good works can help others on their journey toward heaven.

The day is dedicated to the Catholic Church's missionary efforts through prayer and financial support. Donations collected on this day go to the Pontifical Mission Societies to support churches, schools, hospitals, and training for catechists and leaders in countries with new, young, or poor churches.

Liturgy of the Day:

We are a needy people. We each stand before God as someone in need. No matter how well off we are, how healthy we are, or how satisfied we are with our lives, we are all in need of God's saving mercy. If we look at ourselves honestly, we see that we are far from perfect, that we in fact are sinful and always in need of forgiveness. May we, like the tax collector in today's Gospel, be aware of our neediness so that no matter our situation in life we too may humbly pray, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner."

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

Centuries before Christ, Sirach writes that the Lord hears the prayers of the lowly, the poor, the weak, and the oppresses. He assures his readers that God will respond. In the Gospel, Jesus applauds those who humbly acknowledge their sinfulness and ask for God's mercy, declaring that God will exalt them. May we realize our own poverty before the Lord as we sing the refrain to the responsorial psalm, "The Lord hears the cry of the poor."

Reflection:

We can always find someone to compare ourselves with so that we feel righteous and superior. The problem is that this is an illusion. As soon as we find ourselves thinking, "Thank God, I'm not like that!" we have failed before God. We have passed judgment on another and for the worst of all reasons: to raise up ourselves. We all have our weaknesses and we all need God's grace and mercy. The Lord is close to the brokenhearted; And those who are crushed in spirit he saves. -Psalm 34:18


