MISSIONARY SISTERS OF MARY HELP OF CHRISTIANS

The Congregation of the Missionary Sisters of Mary Help of Christians, the first indigenous Congregation of North East India was founded on October 24, 1942, in Guwahati, Assam, by Venerable Stephen Ferrando, SDB, the then Bishop of Shillong, with eight girls as the first postulants who entered the novitiate. Reading the signs of the time and responding to the need of the hour, Bishop Ferrando founded the Congregation to evangelize, catechize, heal and educate the far-flung population of North East India. He was also overwhelmed by the poverty, illiteracy and unhygienic living conditions of the people of the region whose misery was doubled by the ravages of World War II. The War prevented the missionaries both priests and religious who were working in the region from freely moving around to help their needy flock. This situation coincided with a group of nine girls coming forward to become sisters led to the founding of the Congregation. He imbued the Congregation with Salesian Spirit and the ability to adapt themselves to any difficult situation of the people in the villages for the proclamation and the spread of the Gospel It was to the Salesian Sisters that Bishop Ferrando entrusted the nascent Congregation for its formation and government. In 1968, when Mother Nellie Nunes FMA was withdrawn, Sr. Magdaline Surin MSMHC who as the Vicar General of the Congregation guided its destinies until the appointment of Sr. Mary Rose Thapa, the first MSMHC Mother General in 1970. The Congregation became a Papal Institute of Pontifical Right on 21 March 1977. It was officially recognized as the member of the Salesian Family on 8 July, 1986. The Lord blessed the humble beginnings with rapid growth and rich missionary harvest. The first 6 pioneers were from Assam. With the passing of time vocations began to come from different parts of the country. Today, the Congregation has many local vocations, and is blessed with 1410 members belonging to 75 ethnic groups from India, Myanmar, Nepal, Hawaii and Lesotho. The Congregation has now 6 Provinces in India, a Delegation in Italy and a Sub-delegation in Africa with 237 Centers. The members work in 65 dioceses, spread out to 14 countries, namely India, Myanmar, Sri Lanka, Italy, Swaziland, Lesotho, South Sudan, South Africa, Mozambique, Ethiopia, the Hawaiian Islands, Germany, Papua New Guinea, and Philippines. The Congregation is dedicated first and foremost to the missionary apostolate; evangelization and catechetical instruction, especially of women folk and children in the villages. Schools, boarding houses, oratories, dispensaries, mobile clinics, homes for the aged, orphans and children at risk, vocational training centers, schools for the differently abled rehabilitation of HIV/AIDS patients, working for the marginalized and the youth are various activities through which the MSMHC serve the Church. Imbued with the Salesian Spirit, the Congregation is pledged to practice Don Bosco's method of Education, known as Preventive System in its own educational institutions and in those it runs for the parishes.

We, the Missionary Sisters of Mary Help of Christians are an international organization of women dedicated to the service of people, especially the less privileged and the marginalized of the society. True to our call as missionaries we aim at building the whole person enabling them to live with dignity and honor finding their rightful place in the society as well as in the life hereafter. The family being the nucleus of the society and woman taking the lead in making the home we focus on her holistic growth particularly paying attention to the formation of her mind and heart. Guided by the wisdom of our Founder we are engaged also in the care and formation of children. Our mission is realized through evangelization and catechesis, educational institutions, boarding houses, youth ministry, health centers, vocational training centers, centers for the differently abled and rendering adequate assistance to the young at risk. Having made substantial contribution towards the growth and development of the Church in North east India, and being aware of our universal commitment we continue spreading our wings to the rest of India and the world around. Our strong conviction to give the best we can for the world urges us to move on forward. Founded by Bishop Stephen Ferrando SDB, an Apostle of Christ from Italy to North East India of the twentieth century, we strive on to live the great missionary legacy passed on to us by our beloved Founder and Pioneers. This official website of our Congregation will give you some idea of our life and work. We are convinced of why we do what we do and the enormous good that can be done by our committed and collaborative efforts.

Liturgy of the Day:





One Faith, Many Communities

From Hanalei's First Mission to St. William's Church

The Catholic presence in Hanalei traces its roots to 1864, when a church dedicated to St. Maxime was built near present-day Hanalei Pier, close to the river. This small mission became the center of Catholic missionary activity for all of Kaua'i's northeastern region. However, as Hanalei's population declined and nearby Kilauea's plantation community grew, the missionary focus gradually shifted eastward. By the 1930s, the aging St. Maxime's Church was ordered to be demolished, yet the Catholic faith in Hanalei endured. The old church site continued to host parish picnics, CYO gatherings, and Boy Scout camps, while devoted families in Hanalei, Wainiha, and Ha'ena opened their homes for catechism and Mass. Faith, even without a building, remained alive and strong.

When the energetic pastor Fr. John McDonald, arrived in the 1950s, he recognized that Hanalei was again growing in its Catholic population. Through his leadership, a new church was built along Kuhio Highway and dedicated in 1956 to St. William of Bourges. Its unique Polynesian-inspired design, with high-arching beams and open-air charm, reflects both the island's natural beauty and its deep faith. St William, a Cistercian monk who became Archbishop of Bourges, France, was known for his humility, fasting, and personal care for the poor and sick He lived during a time of heresy and confusion, courageously leading many back to the truth of the Catholic faith. His feast is celebrated on January 10.

Kilauea's St. Sylvester Church - A Community of Faith and Intimacy

In December 1871, the first resident priest arrived in Kilauea - Fr. Hubert Sylvester Stappers, SSCC -who built a church in honor of his patron, St. Sylvester. He established a vibrant Catholic community composed primarily of Hawaiian faithful and Portuguese immigrants who worked for the Kilauea Sugar Company. The original church, located near the cemetery along Kuhio Highway, was later relocated in 1906 following a land exchange with the plantation. Half a century later, in 1956,a new octagonal-style church was built - at the same time as St. William's in Hanalei -reflecting the forward-looking spirit of the era. Its unique design allows no one to sit more than thirty feet from the altar ,creating a warm, intimate space for worship. St. Sylvester I, Pope of Rome from 314 to 335, guided the Church through a pivotal time in history as Christianity was finally granted freedom within the Roman Empire. He is remembered for overseeing the construction of great basilicas and for shepherding the faithful with wisdom and courage. His feast is celebrated on December 31, the anniversary of his death.
