Light the Advent Candle One... Now the Waiting Has Begun!

November 30, 2025

Advent is my favorite liturgical season. Why? Because this season reminds us of a joyful hope—something so many of us need, or need to be reminded that we need. Advent gently invites us to lift our eyes, steady our hearts, and remember that God is not distant. He is coming. He always comes.

The Church teaches that Advent has a three-fold purpose, and understanding this helps us enter the season with deeper meaning.

First, Advent prepares us for Christmas, when we remember the historical coming of Jesus—born in a manger in Bethlehem. The Eternal Word becomes flesh, entering our world in humility and simplicity. This fills us with thanksgiving and joy, because God comes close to us—close enough to touch, close enough to save.

Second, Advent points us toward the future, when Christ will come again in glory as judge and king. This is why, for the first three Sundays of Advent, we do not yet hear in the Gospel about shepherds, angels, or the infant Jesus. Instead, the Scriptures speak of watchfulness, readiness, and the final coming of the Lord at the end of time. We prepare our souls, examine our lives, and renew our desire to meet Him with confidence and faith.

Third, Advent awakens us to the ways Christ comes to us right now—in the mystery of the Sacraments, in the Word proclaimed, and in the quiet movements of grace in our daily lives. Christ is not only a memory of the past or a promise for the future—He is present today.

And in all of this, Advent teaches us to wait:

- Wait in joy
- Wait in peace
- Wait in hope
- Wait in love

The Season of Advent reminds us that we are loved by a God who becomes one of us, to love us as we are. **Advent is simple: wait, prepare, reflect, love.**

This Sunday we also begin a new liturgical year—Year A, in which we will listen primarily to the Gospel of Matthew. Matthew's Gospel is often called the Gospel of fulfillment, because again and again Matthew shows how Jesus completes the promises made to Israel. He writes to a people longing for the Messiah—people waiting, searching, hoping. In that way, Matthew is the perfect Gospel for Advent hearts.

Matthew reveals Jesus as:

- Emmanuel God-with-us, dwelling among His people
- the New Moses, who teaches with divine authority
- the Son of David, the long-awaited King
- the Light in the darkness, guiding all nations to salvation

Matthew encourages us to wait in anticipation for the Messiah who comes:

- in history born in Bethlehem, rooted in a genealogy of real people
- in mystery present in the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist
- in majesty returning in glory, a theme that shapes the early Advent readings

Throughout the year, *Matthew will remind us that discipleship is not passive waiting, it is active, faithful living.* His Gospel calls us to build our lives on rock, to forgive seventy times seven, to recognize Jesus in the poor, and to trust that Christ remains with His Church until the end of the age.

As we light the first candle of the Advent wreath, may Matthew teach us how to wait—not with fear, but with readiness; not with anxiety, but with hope; not in darkness, but in the light of Christ who comes

How is Christ inviting me to wait differently this Advent—more patiently, more prayerfully, or more hopefully?

NOVEMBER 30TH - FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Advent is a season of preparation for Christmas in the Catholic Church, observed during the four weeks leading up

to December 24th. It is a time of prayer and reflection, focusing on the "comings" of Christ: his birth at Christmas, his presence in the Church, and his eventual second coming. Key practices include lighting an Advent wreath, wearing purple



vestments to signify both penitence and royalty, and observing specific readings and liturgical themes of hope, peace, joy, and love.

What Advent is about

- •Hope and anticipation: The season is a time to reflect on the hope for the Savior's coming, both to celebrate his birth and to prepare for his second coming.
- •The "comings" of Christ: It acknowledges Jesus's past arrival at Christmas, his ongoing presence in the Church, and his future return.
- •Spiritual preparation: Catholics focus on prayer, reflection, and a spirit of penitence, similar to Lent, to prepare their hearts for Christmas.
- •The colors of Advent have symbolic meanings: purple represents penance, preparation, and royalty; pink (or rose) signifies joy, and is used on the third Sunday (Gaudete Sunday); and white re-presents purity, hope, and the celebration of Christ. In some traditions, a blue candle is used for hope, and a green or gold candle can symbolize faith or love, respectively.

Through this sacrament, an individual is reconciled with God and the Church.

First Friday Devotion to the Sacred Heart Begins December 5, 2025

Our parish will begin observing the First Friday Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on Friday, December 5, with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from after the 7:00 AM Mass until 12:00 Noon. All are invited to come, pray, and

rest in the Lord's merciful love. A sign-up sheet will be available for those who wish to volunteer for a time of adoration to ensure that the Lord is never left unattended.

The First Friday Devotion is a simple, yet meaningful spiritual practice rooted in Jesus' revelations to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, in which He asked the faithful to receive Holy Communion on nine consecutive First Fridays in reparation for sins and in honor of His loving Heart. The Church has embraced this devotion for centuries as a way of drawing the faithful more deeply into Christ's compassion, mercy, and Eucharistic presence.

The Sacred Heart reminds us that Jesus loves us with a human and divine heart, pierced for our salvation. By participating in the First Fridays, we respond to His love with gratitude, conversion, and renewed faith—especially in a world often marked by indifference and spiritual weariness.

As we begin this monthly time of prayer and reparation, may our parish grow in trust, healing, and hope through the Heart of Jesus who says, "Behold this Heart which has so loved."

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us.

Liturgy of the Day: During this season of anticipation, we are reminded that Jesus didn't come into the world only once, as a newborn baby over two thousand years ago, but also comes into the world-and our heart-throughout our lives. Furthermore, as we hear in today's Gospel, he will return to the world without warning on the day of judgment. Therefore, over the Advent season, we have a great incentive to prepare our hearts for his coming. May Jesus' words to his disciples resonate with us today:

"You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

Jesus paints a scary picture of his second coming in today's Gospel, warning his disciples to be ready always. We too must prepare ourselves, not only for his return at any time, but also for his coming into our hearts in a deeper way at a time we least expect. The words of the prophet Isaiah and the apostle Paul can help. "Put on the Lord Jesus Christ," Paul says, or, as Isaiah put it, "Let us walk in the light of Lord." May God's word inspire us to prepare our hearts so that we may all "go rejoicing to the house of the Lord."

Reflection: The message of this Sunday's readings is simple: Wake Up! The grind of life can dull our senses and our minds as we stumble from one thing to the next. Th days turn to weeks and before we know it the seasons have changed and another year is gone. The challenge is to "wake up" and pay attention to each day, each moment. They are precious gifts. We don't need to do more, but less. Slow down and discover the beauty and wonder of the day. Make Advent a time to count your blessings. Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain, that he may instruct us in his way, and we may walk in his paths.


All children are invited to join the St. Catherine's
