Easter Sunday ***Resurrection of the Lord***

John 20: 1-9

Resurrection is good news, but at the same time, it is sometimes painful because it involves death. Before the power of the resurrection can take hold in our own lives, we are called to die to sin, to die to self. We may even have to die to our own dreams, so that God can do what He wants to do with our lives for our best good and the good of others. Resurrection is about seeing our world in a new way. Early that Easter morning, Mary Magdalene did not find what she was looking for, the dead body of Jesus. But she found something better than she could have imagined: the Risen Jesus! Sometimes, the things we think we need most are not granted to us. What we get instead is an experience of God's ways of working in the world. That is the power of the Resurrection. When those moments come, we must spread the news-just as Mary Magdalene did: "I have seen the Lord!" (Jn 20:18)

On Easter Sunday the changes in nature all point to the transformation. The death and resurrection of Jesus bring about a transformation within us as we share in His risen life.

The readings testify that if we die with Christ, we will appear with Him in glory; if we cast out the old yeast, we will be fresh dough.

To what newness are we called? To what must we die in order to rise transformed? What old yeast of corruption must be cast out in order that we must be fresh dough? On Easter we renew our baptismal vows. What is it we really renounce? Ours is a world of violence, of prejudice, of indifference. Too often we harbor feelings of anger and resentment, of selfishness and disdain.

Easter proclaims that Christ has died and has risen; with Him we die to all wickedness in our lives and in our world and let us set our hearts on higher things on sincerity and on truth.

The Easter is not only about what happened to Jesus-it is about what happens to us. Especially our failures, our pain, and our disappointments are not final because God can transform them into new beginnings. The resurrection becomes real when it changes us: when fear turns into courage, despair into hope. So the question of Easter is simple: are we becoming new? Christ is risen so that our hearts may rise and our lives be transformed.

Let us not only celebrate the Resurrection today-let us live it.



“He saw and believed.” (John 20:8)

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Alleluia! Jesus is risen! On this Easter morning, the Church gives us the beautiful Gospel from John (John 20:1–9), where we hear of Mary Magdalene discovering the empty tomb, and Peter and the beloved disciple running to see for themselves.

They both run. But one runs faster. The beloved disciple, traditionally understood as John arrives first. Yet he does not enter. He waits for Peter. Then, when Peter arrives, he enters the tomb, followed by the beloved disciple, who then sees and believes.

The Fathers of the Church saw something deeply symbolic in this moment. The beloved disciple represents **love**, while Peter represents **faith**. Love runs ahead, it is eager, it is passionate, it is drawn toward the Lord. But love alone waits. It does not yet fully grasp. It is faith that enters, faith that steps into the mystery, faith that sees what is not immediately clear. And then, together, love and faith, come to be believed.

My brothers and sisters, this is not just their story. This is our story. I have seen this lived out so beautifully here in our parish community. I have witnessed your love, your generosity, your care for one another, your willingness to serve, your devotion to the Lord. I have also seen your faith, your perseverance in prayer, your trust in God through trials, your commitment to the sacraments.

Yet, Easter calls us deeper. There are moments in our lives when we stand at the entrance of the tomb, when we do not fully understand, when things seem uncertain, when God’s plan is not yet clear. The Gospel tells us that the disciples themselves “did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.”

And still, they ran. And still, they entered. And still, they believed.

This Easter, the Lord invites each of us to go deeper into both love and faith. To not remain at a distance, but to enter into the mystery. To trust even when we do not fully understand. To believe that the tomb is empty, and that Jesus Christ is truly alive. And because He is alive, our community is alive and we move forward with hope.

In that spirit of Easter joy, I am excited to share several important celebrations in the life of our parish:

- **The return of the Holy Ghost Feast**, a cherished and beloved Portuguese tradition, will be celebrated once again after 40 years on **Pentecost Sunday, May 24, 2026**. This beautiful feast honors the gifts of the Holy Spirit and invites all of us, young and old, families and individuals, to come together in faith, culture, and community.
- **The 200th anniversary of the arrival of the Catholic faith in Hawai‘i** will be launched with an island-wide celebration on **July 9, 2026**, the Feast of Our Lady of Peace, at St. Raphael Church in Kōloa. This historic moment reminds us that we are part of something much bigger, a living faith handed to us with great sacrifice and love.
- And here in our own parish, we will begin celebrating **the 140th anniversary of St. Catherine’s Parish** starting in the Fall of 2026. As we honor our past, we also look forward with hope to the future in building up our community, strengthening our faith, and celebrating who we are. This includes the possibility of bringing back our beloved **St. Catherine’s Carnival** in early summer 2027.

All of these are not just events. They are invitations.

Invitations to run. Invitations to enter. Invitations to believe. Invitations to get involved.

My dear brothers and sisters, the tomb is empty. Christ is risen. He is calling us together as one parish family to grow deeper in love and stronger in faith. May we run toward Him. May we enter the mystery. And may we, like the beloved disciple, see and believe.

A blessed and joyful Easter to you and your families. **Alleluia! Alleluia!**

Holy Ghost Feast Returns After 40 Years!

After four decades, a cherished tradition returns to our parish family! This year, Saint Catherine of Alexandria Church in Kapa'a will celebrate the Holy Ghost Feast (Festa do Divino Espírito Santo), a beautiful Portuguese devotion honoring the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Church.

This celebration is not only for those of Portuguese heritage, **it is for our entire parish**. All are invited to rediscover the power and presence of the Holy Spirit alive in our lives today.

The Seven Sundays of Easter – The Domingos

Beginning April 12, we will gather each Sunday after the 9:30am Mass for the Seven Sundays of Easter, traditionally known as the *Domingos*. Each week includes prayers and a reflection on the gifts of the Holy Spirit to prepare our hearts for Pentecost.

Pentecost Sunday Feast – May 24, 2026

Our celebration will culminate on Pentecost Sunday, May 24, 2026, with:

- Solemn Mass at 9:30am
- Procession with the Holy Ghost Crown
- Prayers and Fellowship to follow

Pentecost marks the moment when the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles, empowering them to go forth and proclaim the Gospel. In the same way, we are invited to be renewed, strengthened, and sent on mission.

As we revive this tradition after 40 years, may it be a moment of grace for our parish and a time to come together in faith, culture, and community.

Come, Holy Spirit! Viva o Divino Espírito Santo!



Introduction to the Liturgy of the Day:

Alleluia ! With joy and gratitude, we praise God, who raised Jesus from the dead to new life in the eternal kingdom. Truly, this is the day the Lord has made, for is his sacrifice on the cross he conquered sin and death and is his resurrection he has opened the door to our salvation. Let us rejoice ! Let us be glad ! Gathered together today to celebrate the eucharist banquet, let us join with all the saints and angel to sing in praise and thanksgiving to our God.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

Over the last week, we have journeyed with the Lord and his disciples through all the pivotal events that have led to this day. We welcomed him into Jerusalem, ate his Body and drank his Blood at the First Eucharist, prayed with him as he approached the cross, witnessed his crucifixion, and wept with his mother as his body was laid in the tomb. On this most holy day, we join with Mary Magdalene, Simon Peter, and John , the disciple whom Jesus loved, in rushing to the empty tomb to see for ourselves the miracle of the Resurrection.

Reflection:

In the fifth reading from the Easter Vigil Mass, Isaiah reminds us that the Lord is always with us. We do not need to fix our attention on the things of the world that are temporary and passing. All that is needed is for us to seek the Lord in all things – listen to the Lord and seek to do what he asks of us. Even when we fail, we should turn to him, trusting in his forgiveness. If we would only stop trying to control everything and allow God to take control of our lives, we would find that we have what we need and our spirit would be at peace in the Lord. We cannot predict or know what God is doing in our lives. We can only trust that ultimately , whatever happens, it can be turned to our good. Are you willing to let God be in charge?

Divine Mercy Sunday, April 12

What is Mercy Sunday and How to Celebrate it?

In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s, our Lord called for a special feast day to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter.

Today, we know that feast as Divine Mercy Sunday, named by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000.

Nevertheless, Divine Mercy Sunday is NOT a feast based solely on St. Faustina's revelations. Indeed, it is not primarily about St. Faustina — nor is it altogether a new feast. The Second Sunday of Easter was already a solemnity as the Octave Day of Easter. The title "Divine Mercy Sunday" does, however, highlight the meaning of the day.

Extraordinary Graces

In her *Diary*, St. Faustina records a special promise given to her by Jesus. He told her to communicate it to the whole world:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy (699).

In three places in her *Diary*, St. Faustina records our Lord's promises of specific, extraordinary graces:

I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My mercy (1109).

Whoever approaches the Fountain of Life on this day will be granted complete forgiveness of sins and punishment (300).

The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion will obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment (699).

To receive these graces, the only condition is to receive Holy Communion worthily on Divine Mercy Sunday (or the Vigil celebration) by making a good Confession beforehand and being in the state of grace and trusting in His Divine Mercy.

To fittingly observe Divine Mercy Sunday in a solemn way, we should:

1. **Celebrate** the Feast on the Sunday after Easter;
 2. Sincerely **repent** of all our sins;
 3. Place our **complete trust** in Jesus;
4. Go to **Confession**, preferably before that Sunday;
5. Receive **Holy Communion** on the day of the Feast;
6. **Venerate the Image** of The Divine Mercy (To venerate a sacred image or statue simply means to perform some act or make some gesture of deep religious respect toward it because of the person whom it represents, in this case, our Most Merciful Savior);
7. **Be merciful** to others, through our actions, words, and prayers on their behalf:

The Easter lily (Lilium longiflorum) primarily represents the resurrection of Jesus Christ in Christian tradition, symbolizing purity, innocence, hope, and new life. Its white color signifies divinity and virtue, while the trumpet-shaped blooms symbolize the joyous announcement of rebirth and the "trumpet call" of the angel Gabriel.
