Beating Burnout: Sustaining Passion in Challenging Times

Passion fuels our fairs. It's what drives board members, staff, and volunteers to give their time, energy, and heart to their communities. But with rising demands, shrinking volunteer bases, and financial pressures, burnout is no longer just a possibility—it's a reality. Left unchecked, it drains energy, diminishes effectiveness, and threatens the long-term future of fairs and agricultural societies.

Burnout isn't just fatigue—it's when the energy is gone but the demands keep coming. It shows up as exhaustion, disengagement, and doubt. If unaddressed, it doesn't just sap energy—it dismantles identity. That's why leaders must learn to recognize it early and act before it takes hold.

In this breakout session, award-winning advocate Ian Hill will share practical strategies to prevent burnout and reignite energy. Drawing on decades of leadership, he'll show how individuals and boards can build "burnout immunity plans" to thrive under pressure.

- Spot the early warning signs of burnout.
- Create a Personal Burnout Immunity Plan by reconnecting with your WHY, setting non-negotiable boundaries, practicing strategic self-care, and scheduling regular recharge rituals.
- Develop an Organizational Burnout Immunity Plan by clarifying expectations, defining roles, setting achievable goals, and aligning boards and volunteers with purpose.
