Greetings from Buffalo! On April 9, we headed off to Rochester, and participated in the Tartan Day celebration which was held at the Rochester Armory. The beginning of April still brings chill winds through western New York, so the festival is held indoors. If you believe that putting several bagpipe bands together is loud at an outdoor festival, you should really try it indoors! The festival is now in its third year, and continues to grow each year. We were quite fortunate this year, as several Blairs stopped at our tent, where we provided them with Clan Blair brochures, and helped them to sort through the genealogy books.

Most of the festivals in this area don't take place until summer is underway. In August, we headed north of the border, where we attended the Fergus Scottish Festival. The Fergus festival is one of the largest festivals in Canada, and it usually attracts around 50 clans. The festival is well-attended, and features a wide variety of bands, athletic games, dancers, and musical performers. It's only a few hours drive for us, but it is a bit unnerving when you have to explain to the border patrol why you're crossing international lines while carrying so many swords and spears!

August also found us heading south to the Jamestown Regional Celtic Festival. Although it is called the 'Jamestown' festival, it actually takes

place in the town of Mayfield, on the shores of Chautauqua Lake. This festival continues to grow larger each year, with pipe bands coming from several different states. It is a real treat during the summer, as the clan tents are arranged right along the shoreline (many of us regretted not having brought along fishing poles!).

In September, we traveled north once more, to the edge of Lake Ontario, to participate in the Niagara Celtic Festival. Located in the lakeshore town of Olcott, this festival continues to grow larger and larger each year. The festival is held in the town park, overlooking the lake, and on a clear day, you can actually look across the lake and see the CN Tower in downtown Toronto. There is a beautiful canopy of very large elm and oak trees over the entire park, which gives the festival a very unique flavor. We stayed for the entire weekend of the festival, and were very pleased to participate in a special ceremony they held at the end for fallen soldiers.

Our activities for this year are over, but we will be heading down to Erie, Pennsylvania in February, for their annual tartan ball. We're planning on adding a few additional events to our regime for next year, and we hope to see some of you there! Our warmest regards to everyone for the upcoming holidays!

TRIP TO SCOTLAND

My son, Nathaniel, and I traveled with Scottish Dream Tours for two weeks through the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. Even though I had previously been to the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, this was to be a new adventure for

Our holiday began and ended in the beautiful city of Glasgow.

The On-Off Red Bus picked us up at George Square and took us on a guided city tour. We hopped off at Glasgow Cathedral, and while we were there, we were lucky enough to experience beautiful organ music as the organist was practicing. After leaving the Cathedral, we hopped back onto the bus to the People's Palace on Glasgow Green. This museum tells the story of the City of Glasgow and her people from 1750 until the present. After returning to George Square, we explored the lower level of the beautiful marbled interior of the Glasgow City Chambers, as well as Buchanan Street and its many interesting shops.

As we traveled northward on roads not usually taken by larger tours, we experienced the wild beauty of the Highlands in all of its glory. The heather was blooming on every hill, along the roadside, and in

the wide-open fields. Among the heather were an abundance of wildflowers and tumbling waterfalls, as well as many trees turning leaves in the fall mists.

We visited the town of Oban, traveled across the Isle of Mull, and toured the Abbey and Nunnery on the Isle of Iona. On the Isle of Skye we enjoyed a traditional afternoon tea at Kinloch Lodge, home of Lord and Lady MacDonald.

While visiting Glencoe, the site of the massacre of the McDonalds, and Culloden, the site of the defeat of Bonnie Prince Charlie, one could almost hear the cries and feel the anguish of those who suffered and perished in those haunted, but beautiful places.

We traveled north from Ullapool through the Assynt Mountains for about 30 miles until we reached the Kylesku Hotel, which overlooks Loch Glencoul and Loch Glendhu. While sitting in the dining room at breakfast, we could view the awesome mountains and beautiful lochs, and we saw huge seals basking on the rocks near the water.

Our journey took us to many relics of the past that could be mysterious, humbling, and even awe-inspiring. On the Isle of Skye we visited a Black House Farm Museum that gave a sense of what life on the island was like in times past. On the Isle of Lewis, we walked among the ancient and mysterious Callanish Standing Stones. In the Orkneys, we visited many impressive Neolithic relics, including the Ring of Brodgar, the Standing Stones of Stennis, the village of Skara Brae, and the chambered cairn and passage-tomb Maes Howe, where we saw the famous Maes Howe Dragon and other Norse runic graffiti on the walls of the cairn.

Our adventure included castles and palaces such as:

- The Castle of Mey, the most northerly inhabited castle on the British mainland, and home of the Queen Mother;
- Scone Palace, once the crowning place of the Scottish Kings, where a replica of the Stone of Scone now stands;
- Duart Castle, the seat of the Mcleans and site of the sinking of the HMS Swan;
- Dunvegan Castle, where the Fairy Flag hangs and which has been the seat of the Mcleods for 800 years—it is the oldest continuously inhabited castle in Scotland;

- Stirling Castle, where Mary Queen of Scots was crowned (the Palace is now restored, and three of the seven panels of the tapestry “The Hunt of the Unicorn” are currently hanging in the Queen Presence Chambe)
- Blair Castle, which is home of the Murrays and seat of the Dukes and Earls of Atholl, as well as the home base of the Atholl Highlanders. This is the only legal private army in all of Europe.

In addition to all of the above, we attended a play in Pitlochry, visited two whiskey distilleries, visited numerous teahouses, and stopped at many panoramic vistas including Kilt Rock on the Isle of Skye and the Queen’s View outside Pitlochry.

May Day is Lei Day in Hawaii Nei!

Around the world, May Day celebrations range from end-of-winter and consist of Maypole dancing to rallies commemorating workers’ union efforts. Here in Hawaii, May Day is Lei Day — a day dedicated to celebrating Hawaiian culture. You’ll find more than normal music and hula shows on May Day, which is a day popular with residents and visitors. And, on this day in particular, you’ll see our symbol of aloha — fresh, fragrant and colorful leis draped over shoulders everywhere in the Islands.

The origins of Hawaii’s celebration of May Day as Lei Day date back to 1927, when Honolulu Star-Bulletin writer Don Blanding advocated for the creation of a day dedicated to honoring lei-making and the custom of wearing lei. Blanding’s co-worker at the newspaper, columnist Grace Tower Warren,

suggested holding the celebration on May 1 and coined the phrase “May Day is Lei Day.”

Tory MP buys Blair castle as holiday home

One of Scotland's oldest inhabited mansions has been bought by Charles

Hendry, the Conservative MP, and his wife Sallie.

The couple are said to have paid £2.5 million for Blair Castle near Dalry in Ayrshire. The estate was on the market for £8 million but it is understood the Hendrys bought just the castle and a small portion of land.

The 850-year-old property has a pool, a Norman tower and 18 bedrooms. This is the first time it has been sold out of ownership of the Blair family — which traces its ancestry to the time of William the Lion who ruled Scotland between 1165 and 1214. The king

awarded the Barony of Blair to the first holder Jean Francois de Blare in 1165.

The castle has been used for hospitality and the Hendrys are said to want to develop that but will live in their East Sussex home, spending holidays at Blair Castle.
