Elijah, The Prophet of the LORD

Elijah and King Ahab

Elijah announced the three-and-a-half-year drought (1 Kings 17:1)

He challenged Ahab to a contest on Mt. Carmel (1 Kings 18:17-19)

He predicted the end of the drought (1 Kings 18:41-46)

He pronounced a death sentence upon Ahab and his wife (1 Kings 21:17-24)

Elijah and the Ravens of Cherith

He was supernaturally fed by some ravens beside a drying brook (1 Kings 17:2-7)

Elijah and a Widow at Zarephath

He was fed by a widow through the supernatural provision of God (1 Kings 17:8-16) He raised the widow's dead son back to life (1 Kings 17:17-24)

Elijah and a Backslider Named Obadiah

Obadiah was a secret believer who had ministered to 100 prophets (1 Kings 18:1-15) He reluctantly and fearfully arranged a meeting between Elijah and Ahab (1 Kings 18:16)

Elijah and the Nation Israel

He rebuked and challenged Israel on Mt. Carmel (1 Kings 18:20-24)

Elijah and the Priests of Baal

The priests of Baal were unable to pray down the fire (1 Kings 18:25-29) He had them killed for their paganism (1 Kings 18:40)

Elijah and the Lord God

He fled Israel to escape Jezebel's revenge (1 Kings 19:1-3)

He was ministered to by an angel (1 Kings 19:4-7)

He heard God's still small voice in a cave (1 Kings 19:8-18)

Elijah and Elisha the Prophet

He called Elisha to special service (1 Kings 19:19-21)

He prepared Elisha for special service (2 Kings 2:1-10)

Elijah and Northern King Ahaziah

He predicted wicked Ahaziah will die from a fall (2 Kings 1:1-18)

He called down fire to destroy two companies of soldiers sent to arrest him (2 Kings 1:9-12)

He spared the third company, led by a captain who begged for mercy (2 Kings 1:13-16)

Elijah and a Chariot of Fire


He parted the river Jordan and stood on the eastern bank (2 Kings 2:1-8)

He received a last request from Elisha (2 Kings 2:9-10)

He was carried into heaven without dying (2 Kings 2:11)



Chronicles provides the same historical background as II Samuel - II Kings, with emphasis on David and on Judah (the Davidic Covenant) Ezra 1-6 provides the historical setting for Haggai and Zechariah

The events in Nehemiah set the stage for the historical background of Malachi
