

#### From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Today would be the Feast of St. Agatha however, Sunday takes precedence. Agatha was martyred around 251 during the persecution by the Roman emperor. Legend has it she was arrested as a Christian. She was tortured and mistreated. Her breasts were cut off. She is the Patroness of All Those with Breast Cancer. Agatha is mentioned in the Eucharistic Prayer I.

February 6th is the Feast of St. Paul Miki & Companions. In 1597 twenty-six martyrs of Japan were crucified on a hill now known as the Holy Mountain, overlooking Nagasaki, Japan. The best known is

Brother Paul Miki, a Jesuit and native of Japan. Among other martyred were priests, brothers, and lay people. Missionaries did return to Japan in the 1860's and found that thousands of Christians lived around Nagasaki and secretly preserved the Faith.

February 7th we remember Servant of God Francis Parater (1897—1920). Known as Frank after his birth in Richmond, Virginia, he was intelligent, amiable, and a holy young man who enrolled in the seminary after high school. Eventually he went to study in Rome. He contracted rheumatic fever and died on February 6, 1920. He wrote in a sealed envelope a letter which stated, "I have nothing to leave or give but my life and this I consecrated to the Sacred Heart. I shall be of more service to my diocese in Heaven than I can ever be on earth."

Also on February 7th is the Feast of St. Moses, an Arab Christian who went to the desert on the border of Syria and Egypt. It was home to nomadic tribes that raided Roman troops. A peace treaty was made. The tribesmen agreed to receive baptism and requested Moses as Bishop. Moses devoted his life to the nomads, traveling constantly to administer the sacraments to his wandering flock. Eventually the Arab tribes were dubbed the Saracens. He died in 389. Moses is remembered as the "Apostle to the Saracens."

February 7th is also the start of National Marriage Week. We thank God for the blessing of Marriage and pray for all marriages. As Pope Francis has said in his letter *On Love In The Family*, "The joy of love experienced by families is also the joy of the Church."

February 8th is the Feast of St. Jerome Emiliani (1481—1537). He was a careless and irreligious soldier for the city of Venice. He was captured and chained in a dungeon. While in prison he had time to think and pray. After he escaped he studied for the priesthood. During the plague and famine that swept Northern Italy, he began caring for the sick and the poor. He founded three orphanages and a hospital. In 1532 he established a congregation dedicated to the sick and education of the youth. Jerome died in 1537.

February 8th is the Feast of St. Bakita, which means "Lucky One." In 1877 when she was nine years old she was kidnapped in South Sudan and sold into slavery. Over a period of years she was transferred from one master to another and mistreated. Eventually she was sold to an Italian family who brought her to Italy to be a servant and a nurse maid to their child. Their child went to a boarding school run by the Canossian Daughters of Charity. There she heard about Jesus. The family was going back to Sudan, but Bakita refused to go until it was proven in court that slavery was illegal in Italy, and she had been free all the time she was in Italy. Bakita heard the call to consecrate her life to God and she joined the Canossian Daughters of Charity. She was mostly engaged in tasks such as cooking, sewing, and serving a doorkeeper. No work was unimportant when done for "the Master," her favorite word for God. She earned a growing reputation for holiness. She lived to the age of 78 and died on February 8, 1947. In her honor this day is dedicated as a "Day of Prayer and Awareness Against Human Trafficking."


On February 9th we remember St. Apollonia. She lived in the city of Alexandria in Egypt. A mob seized her and battered her until they knocked out all her teeth. They built a pyre of fire and threatened to burn her alive. Released for a moment to consider her options, she startled the crowd by jumping into the fire. She died a martyr in 249. She is considered the Patroness of Those with Dental Disease as well as Dentists.

February 10th is the Feast of St. Scholastica. She is the twin sister of St. Benedict, born in 480 to wealthy Italian parents. She founded a monastery five miles from where her brother founded the Monastery of Monte Cassino. Scholastica and Benedict both gave their life totally to God and deepening their friendship with prayer and work offered to God.

February 11th is the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. On February 11, 1858 Mary appeared to a young St. Bernadette Soubirous for the first time in a grotto of Massabielle in Lourdes, France. One day she went to the rocky area to collect firewood. Near a big rock she heard a loud noise and saw a very beautiful Lady clothed in white with a rosary hanging on her arm standing in the grotto on the rock. The Lady summoned her to pray the rosary. Bernadette had eighteen apparitions of our Lady starting in February and ending July 1858. On the eighteenth apparition, she asked the Lady who she was. The Lady replied, "I am the Immaculate Conception." She told Bernadette to tell her pastor to have a chapel built on the spot and processions to be held. In previous apparitions she asked that the Rosary and penances be done for the conversion of sinners. At another apparition the Lady ordered Bernadette to dig in the ground, and a healing spring came forth which people bathed in and were cured of illness. That is why St. John Paul II designated this day as the "World Day of the Sick" and why we celebrate the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick on February 11th.





# Gospel Meditation - Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

February 5, 2023 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time

I recently decided to learn to cook. As I sit at the feet of various YouTube cooking masters, I notice how much of cooking is adding ingredients that don't provide any more nourishment, like herbs and other seasonings. But man! They make all the difference because they make the meal delightful to eat and share.

Jesus calls his disciples "salt of the world." No one eats just salt. So, Christians are not meant to replace or do away with the world. They are meant to be agents of preservation and glorification. Notice how often these days the Church seeks to preserve what is threatened: the goodness of marital and family love, the desires of young people for greatness, the value of honest work, healthy economics, and altruistic political engagement, the dignity of the poor and vulnerable. Over and over, we say to a world who wants to throw things out, "It's worth saving! We'll preserve it! We'll show you it's wonderful." If we can't engage the world like that, Jesus says we are the ones who get thrown out, because salt alone is worthless.

Jesus only asks us to do for others what he does for us. He is the "salt" of everything in our lives. Is there something in your life starting to rot a bit? Something tasting bland and boring? Let Jesus salt it and see if you like it better.



Every job has aspects about it that are tedious, messy, and unrewarding, yet they are necessary. However, they can be opportunities to grow in virtue: humility, patience, self-discipline, etc. When you dread doing your work, smile

# Take steps to share your faith during Lent

Jesus didn't intend for the Great Commission – "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) – to be a heavy burden. He meant witnessing to His love to come through the natural course of living a

Christ-inspired life. Consider making more disciples this Lent:

Live a Catholic

life. Non-believers may hear what we say about Jesus, but they are persuaded by seeing how our love for Him shapes our lives. It is critical that worship – Sunday Mass, Confession, Scripture – informs our life choices. When we spend time in Jesus' presence, His character rubs off on us.

Bring Christ out into the world. Jesus asked that we care for the poor and

needy, thus acting as
His hands and feet in
the world. We may not
be able to solve all of
their problems, but
we can show them
the reality of
Christ's love in their
lives.

Talk about God's
plan. God wants us
each to experience
the peace He offers.
Help others know that

God's love is personal and He has a specific plan for each of us.

Invite. Some people will be ready to "come and see," so consider inviting seekers to Mass. Others might be ready to "take up and read." Share your favorite inspirational reading. If you need other suggestions, ask your pastor or favorite religious.

# Why Do Catholics Do That

# Why do Catholics strike their chests?

When we use our voices, our minds, and even our bodies during prayer, we pray with deeper meaning and enthusiasm. During the Confiteor at Mass, for example, we strike our chest three times, saying,

"through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault." It's an ancient symbol of sorrow and repentance for having offended God or hurting our neighbor. Such a gesture reminds us to take responsibility for our actions and pray for forgiveness and grace to change.

# Lent leads us back to God

"For gracious and merciful is he, slow to anger, rich in kindness, and relenting in punishment" (Joel 2:13). Lent may be a penitential season, but it is also a wonderful reminder that no matter how we let sin interfere in our relationship with God, He always wants us back. Gracious and merciful is He.

"Return to me with your whole heart." Throughout the year, sin creeps into our daily lives almost without our noticing. A bad habit such as using bad language or gossiping can keep us from loving God fully. Lent is a time to examine our lives and sweep aside whatever keeps us from giving God our whole heart.

"Rend your hearts, not your garments." God doesn't just want outward acts of repentance. Our Father wants a change of heart. Start with Confession and then practice virtues such as prudence, temperance, and fortitude.

"Gather the people, notify the congregation." Become more active in your parish to build it up. Consider attending Mass more often than just once a week.

# Matthew 4:1-11, Victory in the wilderness

In this passage, Jesus is tempted by the devil. Having witnessed the Father's declaration at His baptism, Satan tested Jesus' identity as the Son of God. His goal was to tempt Jesus to embrace an earthly and political mission and to distract Him from the suffering and death that would lead to the world's salvation.

Satan tempted Jesus to satisfy His hunger with a miracle - to put physical needs above spiritual needs. In His response, Jesus taught us to put spiritual needs first and to entrust both body and soul to God's care. Next, Satan commanded Jesus to jump from

the temple roof in an effort to force God to miraculously save Him. Again, Jesus refused. God is not to be forced or controlled. Finally, Satan

offered to surrender all the kingdoms of the world if Jesus would worship him. That would save Jesus from the Cross. Instead, Jesus

chose the Cross because it was the only way to save us. When tempted to do what's "easy" versus what's morally right, ask for the strength to choose what's right.

# Feasts &

Lent begins February 22, and is devoted to the Passion of Our Lord. One form of observance is to pray the Stations of the Cross and meditate on Jesus' walk to Calvary.

February 1 - St. Brigid of Ireland (525). Born to an Irish chieftain and an enslaved mother in Ireland, St. Brigid founded a monastery for monks and nuns at Kildare and served as abbess until her death.

February 11 - Our Lady of Lourdes (1858). A heavenly "lady" appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous, a poor girl

from a village in France and a miraculous spring emerged from a nearby cave. The "lady" revealed herself as the "Immaculate

Conception," the Blessed Virgin Mary.

February 22 - Ash Wednesday. The first day of Lent. Ashes are placed on the foreheads as a sign of penance.

February 27 - St. Gregory of Narek (1003). Born in Armenia to a devout Christian family, St. Gregory entered the Narek Monastery and was ordained in 977. He wrote treatises, letters, mystical poems, and Scripture commentaries



# What's a simple way to explain the Faith, if asked?

St. Peter says to be ready to "account for the hope that is in you" (1 Peter 3:15). Consider using this simple, five-point explanation, inspired by Bishop Michael Jackels:

Pinky: The smallest finger recalls our weakness and need for a Savior.



Although Jesus redeemed us, we're still weak and must pray for God's graces daily.

Ring finger: To save us, Jesus took on our human nature, "wedding"

Himself to us. At Sunday Mass, we worship God and become one with Him in Holy Communion.

Middle finger: Jesus was raised up on the Cross for sins, then raised from the dead. We attend Confession monthly and receive the saving graces. We hope to be raised to eternal life.

Pointer: Jesus' call is universal, vet personal. He singled you out and chose you to follow Him; only you can give Jesus your "Yes" - in word and deed.

Thumb: Lastly, hitchhikers point their thumbs to ask, "Are you on my way?" Likewise, we're called to ask, "Are you going His Way?" (John 14:6).
