BAPTISM OF INFANTS

Baptisms of children under 7 years old are offered every fourth Sunday of each our website or contact our office for details and requirements.

CONFIRMATION

At confirmation we receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit and confirm and renew our baptismal promises committing to a life of maturity in the Christian faith. Unconfirmed Catholics wishing to receive the Sacrament should contact the Parish Office to make arrangements for suitable instruction. Unbaptized or non-Catholics can be confirmed at the Easter Vigil when they are baptized or received into the Church as a part of Order of Christian Initiation of Adult. To enroll in OCIA, please call Griselda Cisneros at 992-0901.

EUCHARIST

Parishioners who wish to bring communion to their spouses should contact the parish office to pick up a pyx with the St. Leo's inscription on it. Please use this pyx when approaching to receive a host for your spouse or a family member in the Communion procession during Mass. If you need to receive a gluten free host due to a medical condition please arrive 15 minutes before Mass begins and inform the Sacristan.

RECONCILIATION

Individual confession with a priest is the principal means of absolution and reconciliation of grave sins within the Church. The Sacrament of Reconciliation frees us from sinful patterns of behavior and calls us to complete conversion to Christ. Confessions are heard at 2pm on Saturday in English and 2pm on Sunday in Spanish in the Church. You may also approach any of our parish priests to hear your confession at another suitable time.

THE RITE OF ANOINTING

A person does not need to wait until the point of death to receive this sacrament. A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient. The Sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after the anointing but becomes ill once again, or if, during the same illness, the person's condition becomes more serious. For those who are about to depart from this life, the Church offers the person Penance, Anointing of the Sick, and the Eucharist as Viaticum (food for the journey) given at the end of life. Contact the Parish Office at 992-0901 to be connected with the priest on duty.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

If you are a registered parishioner of St. Leo and plan to marry in our parish please contact our office at least six months prior to the tentative wedding date. Weddings cannot be scheduled until the marriage preparation process is complete and it is determined that the parties are free to marry.

ANNULMENT - Reestablishing the freedom to marry. An annulment is more accurately described as a declaration of matrimonial invalidity. It is an official determination made by an ecclesiastical court that at the time of the marital consent exchanged by the parties a specific component of the marriage was lacking or defective. Hence, the marriage failed to be a marriage as defined by the Catholic Church. If you wish to reestablish your freedom to marry in the Church, please contact a parish priest to be your advocate in presenting your case to the Tribunal.

Sunday, July 20, 2025 Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Love on the Front Porch

"Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things... Mary has chosen the better part." (Luke 10:41–42)

Hospitality in biblical times meant much more than a cheese plate and scented candles. It meant survival. So let's not throw Martha under the chariot. She's doing what any good host would do. She's just doing it with steam coming out of her ears.

Meanwhile, Mary is sitting at Jesus' feet, utterly unconcerned about the roast in the oven. And Jesus gently tells Martha (and us): it's not that the meal doesn't matter. It's that presence matters more.

So much of life pulls us toward performance: be useful, be productive, keep the pace. But God's not keeping score. He's pulling up a chair. The "better part" isn't another item on your list. It's the invitation to be still, be seen, and be loved. **Praver**

Jesus, when I rush around trying to prove my worth, stop me with Your gaze. Teach me to rest in Your presence—where love doesn't have to be earned, only received. Amen.

Monday, July 21, 2025 The Sea Will Part

"The LORD himself will fight for you; you have only to keep still." (Exodus 14:14) There's something almost laughable about being told to "keep still" when Pharaoh's chariots are thundering toward you. Stillness feels irresponsible. Shouldn't we be building rafts? Digging trenches? At least Googling "How to Escape Desert Ambush"?

But Moses knew something we often forget: fear makes noise, but faith can whisper. God doesn't need us to flail—just to follow. He doesn't require panic—just presence.

Stillness isn't passivity. It's trust. And sometimes the holiest act of courage is to stop doing and start believing.

Prayer

God of seas and silence, when the pressures of life chase me down, teach me the stillness that opens space for miracles. Remind me that You're not late—you're leading. Amen.

Readings: Exodus 14:5–18; Exodus 15:1bc–6; Matthew 12:38–42

Tuesday, July 22, 2025 Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene Recognized by Love

"Jesus said to her, 'Mary!'" (John 20:16)

Mary Magdalene didn't recognize Jesus—until He said her name. One word, and the fog lifted, the sorrow turned, and the tomb became a sanctuary.

We, too, spend seasons not recognizing Him. We mistake Him for the gardener, the stranger, the silence. But He keeps showing up anyway—gentle, near, calling us by name.

Mary's story reminds us: resurrection isn't always a dazzling miracle. Sometimes it's as intimate as being known in your grief, your confusion, your search. God finds us not with trumpets—but with tenderness.

Prayer

Risen Lord, call my name again. Speak it into the places where I feel lost. Remind me that even when I can't see You clearly, You never stop seeing me. Amen. **Readings:** Song of Songs 3:1–4b or 2 Corinthians 5:14–17; Psalm 63; John 20:1–2, 11–18

Wednesday, July 23, 2025 Bread in the Wilderness

"Manna... What is it?" (Exodus 16:15)

Imagine waking up and finding breakfast on the ground. No cooking, no shopping, no burnt toast. Just flaky bread from heaven—still warm with grace. Now imagine saying, "What is this?" and grumbling that you miss the buffet back in Egypt. The Israelites remind us that we can get so used to disappointment, we don't recognize provision. Manna wasn't glamorous. But it was exactly what they needed. So is grace.

Some of God's best gifts arrive looking like chores, detours, or mystery meals. But don't dismiss them too quickly. What is this? It's love, disguised as daily bread. **Praver**

Lord, open my eyes to the manna You place around me. When I'm tempted to grumble, teach me to gather. And when I can't name the blessing, help me trust that it's from You. Amen.

Thursday, July 24, 2025

Thunder and Whispers

"On the third day the LORD will come down." (Exodus 19:11)

God came in smoke, thunder, fire, and trumpet blasts. It wasn't a gentle entrance—it was a holy disruption. Sinai didn't become sacred because it was quiet. It became sacred because God showed up.

We often want God to be soothing, subtle. But sometimes He roars to wake us. Not to terrify us—but to remind us we weren't made for spiritual sleepwalking. Revelation requires awe. And awe shakes things loose.

Still, the same God who thunders from mountains also whispers in prayer. And both are love.

Prayer

Lord of fire and cloud, shake me where I need to be shaken. Wake me from spiritual slumber. But when the trembling stops, let me hear You in the silence too. Amen.

Feast of Saint James, Apostle Ambition Reimagined

"You do not know what you are asking." (Matthew 20:22)

James' mom was just doing what any good mom might—advocating for her boys. But her request reveals something deeper in all of us: a hunger for status disguised as spirituality.

Jesus doesn't shame the question. He just redefines success. To be great is to serve. To be first is to be last. And the chalice He speaks of? It's not a reward. It's sacrifice.

Real greatness is rarely shiny. It's often sweaty, unnoticed, inconvenient. But it bears the fingerprints of love.

Prayer

Jesus, when I chase comfort, redirect me to service. Rewire my ambition to want what You want: not applause, but an open heart and calloused hands. Amen. **Readings:** 2 Corinthians 4:7–15; Psalm 126; Matthew 20:20–28

Memorial of Saints Joachim and Anne

Quiet Legacy

"All that the LORD has said, we will heed and do." (Exodus 24:7)

You don't hear much about Joachim and Anne in Scripture—but their legacy lives in Mary and, ultimately, in Christ Himself. Sometimes the most enduring impact comes from the ones who never make the headlines.

Holiness often looks like this: ordinary people making daily yeses to God. Sacrifices unnoticed by others. Prayers whispered in the dark. Meals cooked, hands folded, promises kept.

You may never have your name in lights. But your fidelity is shaping eternity in someone else's story.

Prayer

God of generations, thank You for those who came before me—quiet saints who built a legacy of faith. May I become one, too. Not for fame, but for love. Amen. **Readings:** Exodus 24:3–8; Psalm 50; Matthew 13:24–30

Immigration Enforcement

A Statement from Bishop Frank J. Dewane July 3, 2025

As the new detention center becomes operational at Dade-Collier Airport, or "Alligator Alcatraz," it seems necessary to take stock of recent developments in immigration enforcement and the need for further improvements to our wider immigration system.

Broad Support for Actions Against Criminals

In describing immigration enforcement initiatives, the Trump administration has stated its focus is on removing criminal aliens who endanger public safety. This concern is widely shared. There is no argument with this. However, the need for just immigration enforcement and the government's obligation to carry it out must be undertaken in a way that is targeted, humane and proportional.

Growing Recognition of Contributions of Immigrants

There is also a growing recognition that many, indeed most immigrants, even those who are not lawfully present, are not dangerous but peaceful, law-abiding, and hardworking contributors to our communities and to our economy. President Trump has acknowledged this in his recent remarks establishing a farm pass for those working in the agriculture industry.

Concern for strategies and rhetoric failing to respond to the dignity of persons

It is alarming to see enforcement strategies which treat all unauthorized immigrants as dangerous criminals. Masked, heavily armed agents who fail to identify themselves in enforcement activities are surprising. So is an apparent lack of due process in deportation proceedings in recent months. Along this line, much current rhetoric is obviously intentionally provocative. It is unbecoming of public officials and corrosive of the common good to speak of the deterrence value of "alligators and pythons" at the Collier-Dade facility. I do not speak so glibly in regard to convicted felons in Florida Department of Corrections facilities. Decency requires that we remember individuals being detained are fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters of distressed relatives. This dignity of every person always remains unchanged: it is the dignity of a creature willed and loved by God (Pope Leo XIV, 16 May 2025).

Regarding the Center and Conditions

Observers note that people will be held at the new center in temporary structures, in the heat of the Florida summer, crowded in confined spaces, far from medical facilities and possibly located in the path of hurricanes. I have every hope that for brief stays, the conditions will befit human dignity.

Concern for pastoral needs of detainees and staff

As this and other planned facilities become operational, it should be ensured that chaplains and pastoral ministers will be able to serve those in custody, to their benefit and that of the staff.

Reiterating a call for reforms to U.S. immigration system and support for those involved

The bishops of the United States have long been advocates of reforms to our immigration system. Thoughtful observers of the challenges faced by our country cannot help but recognize that serious reforms are necessary to preserve safety and the integrity of our borders, as well as to accommodate needs for labor, family stability and the ability of those at risk of grave harm to migrate with due process. Enforcement should be proportional. We continue to propose reforms that will enhance our immigration system, respect human dignity and promote the common good.

I call on all people of goodwill to pray for our government officials, for those in immigration custody and their families, for those who work in enforcement, and for justice and prosperity across our nation.

The Ladies' Guild sewing, knitting and crocheting group has been quietly humming along on our parish campus creating handcrafted essentials for local health and community organizations.

During this past 30-week season, 28 women volunteered 552 hours to create 472 necessary items. These consisted of:

•Over 155 baby articles, including blankets, hats, quilts, teddy bears, and NICU mother-baby heart pairs,

•Over 300 adult products including shawls, afghans, quilts, apron bibs, hand squeezers, surgery recovery pillows, walker/wheelchair bags, neck pillows, pillow cases, and tote bags.

Some of the local recipients of these items included The Pregnancy Center of Naples, Lee Health Park, Hospice, Catholic Charities, and The Perpetual Baby Shower.

Bernice Romano, assisted by Judy Richter, coordinates this group of talented ladies and handles the distribution of donations. The group's efforts, and unwavering generosity, have been recognized repeatedly by Lee Health and other community recipients. In July the group has been working with the Catholic Charities Day Campers as the children learn to assemble hygiene kits of "soap sacks" and "ditty bags".
